

ANNUAL INDUSTRY REPORTMANUFACTURES OF THE NON-FERROUS METALS GROUPTHE JEWELLERY AND SILVERWARE INDUSTRY, 1940

Manufacturers of jewellery, silverware, and other precious metal products reported the value of their 1940 production at \$17,151,503, which was 20.6 per cent over the total of \$14,229,560 reported for 1939.

In 1940 there were 113 plants engaged in this line of manufactures, including 69 in Ontario, 34 in Quebec, 6 in British Columbia, 2 in Manitoba, 1 in Alberta and 1 in Saskatchewan. Eighty-nine works in the jewellery manufacturing division of this industry employed 2,110 people to make goods worth \$7,494,557; 14 silverware plants with 1,581 employees made products worth \$6,220,764, and the remaining 10 plants which were occupied in recovering precious metals from scrap or in preparing gold and silver for use in the arts and industries employed 154 people and had a combined output valued at \$3,526,182.

Altogether the 113 plants gave work to 3,845 people as against 3,300 persons working in 116 plants during 1939. Payments in salaries and wages advanced to \$4,815,861 in 1940 from \$4,095,783 in the previous year.

Capital employed in 1940 amounted to \$11,837,692, of which \$3,495,707 represented the value of lands, buildings and equipment, \$4,512,658 the value of inventories and \$3,829,327 the operating capital. In 1939 capital was reported at \$10,631,884.

Materials used in manufacturing processes, exclusive of fuel and electricity, cost \$8,636,509 in 1940 as against \$7,210,524 in the previous year. Among the principal materials were gold and gold alloys, silver and silver alloys, nickel-silver, precious and semi-precious stones, jewellers' findings and watch and clock parts.

Chief import items under jewellery and silverware in 1940 were: clocks, watches and parts and movements, \$3,109,519; electro-plated and gilt ware, n.o.p., \$1,583,674; spectacle frames and metal parts, \$767,000; jewellery n.o.p., \$1,079,168 and manufactured articles consisting wholly or in part of sterling silver, \$309,464. Exports of jewellers' sweepings were reported at \$934,374; clocks, watches and parts at \$444,520; plated ware at \$46,258, and jewellery at \$62,930.

As reviewed in this bulletin, the jewellery and silverware industry includes all plants in Canada which made the following classes of goods as their main products: (a) clocks, watches, rings and other jewellery; (b) sterling silver and silver-plated wares; and (c) dental supplies, gold leaf, gold and silver melted or rolled or otherwise prepared for the arts and industries, and precious metals recovered from old materials and jewellers' findings. Wholesalers, retailers, or shops engaged only in repair work have not been included.
