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

NOTICE

THE JEWELLERY AND SILVERWARE INDUSTRY 1957

Manufacturers of jewellery, silverware and other precious metal products reported the value of their 1957 shipments at \$52,789,040, which was a decline of 1.3 per cent from the total of \$53,460,985 reported in 1956.

In 1957 there were 220 plants engaged in this line of manufacture including 105 in Ontario, 86 in Quebec, 18 in British Columbia, 4 in Manitoba, 3 in Saskatchewan, 2 in Alberta, 1 in Nova Scotia and 1 in the Yukon. The 203 works in the jewellery manufacturing division of this industry employed 3,028 people to make goods worth \$24,552,777; the 11 silverware plants with 1,215 employees made products worth \$12,751,897 and the remaining 6 plants which were occupied in recovering precious metals from scrap or in preparing gold and silver for use in the arts and industries, employed 488 people and had a combined output valued at \$15,484,366.

Altogether, the 220 plants gave work to 4,731 people as against 4,877 persons working in 1956. Payments in salaries and wages increased to \$14,572,549 in 1957 from \$13,990,509 in the previous year.

Materials used in manufacturing processes, exclusive of fuel and electricity, cost \$28,885,750 in 1957 as against \$29,449,839 in the previous year.

Among the principal materials were gold and gold alloys, silver and silver alloys, nickel-silver, precious and semi-precious stones and jewellers' findings.

As reviewed in the bulletin, the jewellery and silverware industry includes all plants in Canada which made the following classes of goods as their main products; (a) rings and other jewellery; (b) sterling silverware and silver-plated ware; and (c) dental supplies, gold leaf, gold and silver melted or rolled or otherwise prepared for the arts and industries; and precious metals recovered from old materials, jewellers' sweepings and scrap. Wholesalers, retailers, or shops engaged only in repair work have not been included.

Note: Due to lack of inventory data, figures for value added by manufacture prior to 1954 were obtained by subtracting the cost of materials used, including fuel and electricity, from the total value of factory shipments. In 1954 and 1955 the "Value added" adjustment incorporated the increase or decrease to shipments values resulting from changes in the value of inventories over the period. For these two years, the adjustments that were made used only the change in finished product inventory owned by manufacturers. Beginning with 1956 the calculation of the "Value added" figures was further adjusted to take into account the "Goods in process" as well as the finished goods held at plant or plant warehouse.

(b) Beginning with 1954, information on the value of year-end inventory holdings at plant and plant warehouses is being collected as part of the annual Census of Industry. These data were formerly collected by a separate survey. The summarized results for the Jewellery and Silverware Industry for the year under review are shown in the above table.

(c) The opening inventory for 1957 does not necessarily agree with the closing inventory for 1956 because of the addition of new plants, the transfer of plants to other industries and plants going out of business, etc. However, the value added figures for the previous year have not been recalculated to allow for the changes mentioned above.
