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## THE MISCELLANEOUS IRON AND STEEL PRODUCTS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1926.

Production in the miscellaneous iron and steel products industry in Canada during 1926 amounted in value to \$10,949,751; this was the highest output value reported since the record of 1920 and exceeded by 17 per cent the value of \$9,397,206 for 1925.

This industrial group covers the operations of factories in Canada which produce as their principal product such commodities as fabricated steel shapes; ornamental and architectural iron work; safes, vaults and fittings; brass and iron beds; steel furniture, railway track equipment and many other articles which cannot be readily classified to the other iron and steel industries.

Of the 67 plants engaged in this line of production, 41 were located in Ontario, 19 in Quebec, 4 in British Columbia, 2 in Manitoba and 1 in Alberta. These concerns employed a capital of \$10,772,202, gave work to an average of 2,612 people monthly, paid \$3,522,233 in salaries and wages, and by manufacturing processes added \$6,311,137 to the value of purchased materials which cost \$4,638,614.
