THE MISCELLANEOUS NON-FERROUS METAL GOODS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1928.

According to a statement just issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa, the output from plants classified in the miscellaneous non-ferrous metal goods industry was valued at \$1,106,639 in 1928 as compared with \$947,705 in 1927 and \$998,512 in 1926. This group includes firms which make, from non-ferrous metals, certain commodities which cannot be listed readily under any of the main industrial groups; metal weatherstripping, railway and marine lamps, mine lamps, lamp and lantern burners, screens, gasoline stoves, lamps and lanterns were the more important products. Seventeen plants were classed in this industry in 1928; 13 were located in Ontario and 4 in Quebec. These concerns reported fixed and working capital at \$943,914 in 1928 and employed a monthly average of 227 people to convert materials costing \$304,387 into finished products worth \$1,106,639 at the works.
