# THE MISCELLANEOUS NON-FERROUS METAL PRODUCTS INDUSTRY 1954 

The industry for which statistics are presented In this bullatin covers the operations of a miscellaneous group of concerns which cannot properly be classified to any of the other industries included in the manufactures of the non-ferrous metal group.

In 1954 there were 23 plants included in this group, 11 being located in Ontario, 8 in Quebec, 2 in Manitoba and 2 in British Columbla. Factory shipments from these factories were valued at $\$ 6,148,876$; the number of employees was 536 ; payments for salaries and wages totalled $\$ 1,717.996$ and the cost of materials for use in manufacturing processes was $\$ 2,835,061$.

Output included electroplating supplies, weatherstrip, rallway and marine lamps and lanterns, window screens, name plates, metallic packing.
stellite, etc. Output of weatherstrip amounted to $\$ 266,435$ compared with $\$ 309.011$ in 1953. Figures for the other commodities cannot be published as there were only one or two producers in each case.


#### Abstract

Note: Figures for value added by manufacture, shown in Table 1, prior to 1952 were obtained by subtracting the cost of materials used, including fuel and electricity, from the value of production. In 1952, the gross value of production was replaced by value of factory shipments, f.o.b. plant. As no information un inventory change is avallable for 1952 and 1953, value added figures for these years were obtained by subtracting from the value of shipments the cost of materials, fuel and electricity. In 1954, information on the value of year-end inventory holdings at plant and plant warehouses was collected as part of the annual Census of Industry and information thus made available was taken into account in calculating the value added figure for 1954.
