PRODUCTION OF GYPSUM IN CANADA, MAY, 1932.

Gypsum production in Canada during May reached a total of 66,139 tons as compared with 23,087 tons in April and 95,240 tons in May, 1931, according to a statement issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa. During the first five months of the current year the Canadian production totalled 112,300 tons, a decline of 33.1 per cent from the total for the corresponding period of 1931.

Quarries in Hants county, Nova Scotia; Albert county, New Brunswick; near Paris and Hagersville, Ontario; Gypsumville and Amaranth, Manitoba; and at Falkland, British Columbia, were in operation during May.

Crude gypsum exports from Canada amounted to 11,110 tons valued at \$12,512; in April no crude gypsum was exported from Canada. Exports of calcined plaster of Paris during May rose to 127 tons worth \$2,185 from the April total of 23 tons at \$1,061. Plaster of Paris, not calcined, imported into Canada in May amounted to 28 tons, made up of 24 tons from Great Britain and 4 tons from the United States. Calcined plaster of Paris imports were recorded at 101 tons appraised at \$2,272 as against 54 tons at \$1,769 imported in April.
