## COAL

## AUGUST 1929

Coal production in Canada during August was 4 per cont hichor than in July and 13 per cent more than the average for the month in the five preceding years. The output for the month was $1,544,192$ short tons including $1,075,187$ tons of bituminous coal, 54,928 tons of sub-bituminous coal, and 214,077 tons of lignito coal. Nova Scotia produced 652,252 tons; New Brunswick, 16,282 tons; Saskatchewan's output amounted to 27,259 tons; Alberta produced 463.362 tons including 221,616 tons of bituminous coal, 54,928 tons of sub-bituminous coal, and 186,818 tons of lignite coal; Britieh Columbia's output was 184,933 tons while the Yukon output was estimated at 104 tons.

All coal producing provinces except Saakatchewan and Alberta showed increases in production as compared with the preceding month.

Imports of coal into Canada during August amounted to $1,883,468$ tons including $1,742,093$ ton from United States and 111,514 tons from Great Britain. By kinds of coal the importb were, anthracite, 349,156 tons; bituminous, $1,533.898$ tone; and lignite, 414 tons. Imports in July, 1929 totalled 2,023,309 tons.

Exports of coal in August amounted to 65,187 tons comprising 21,089 tons through the ports of the eastern provinces and 44,098 ton from the western provinces.

Coal made available for use in Canada during August amounted to 3,162,473 tons, comprisink 2,544.579 tons of bituminous cosl, 349,156 tons of arthracite coal, 54,928 tons of oub-bituminous coal and 213,810 tons of lignite coal. Classified according to origin the tonnage of coal made available for consumption was divided as follows: from Canadian mines, $1,010.681$ tons of bituminous, 54,928 tons of sub-bituminous, and 213,296 tons of lignite; from the United States, 215,892 tons of anthracite, $1,525,787$ tons of bituminous, and 414 tons of lignite; from Great Britain, 103,403 tons of anthracite, 8,111 tona of bituminous coal; and 29,861 ton of anthracite coal from other countries.


## COKE

Production of coke in Canada during August amounted to 226,515 tons, a slight increase over the total of 225,445 tons for the preceding month and 18 per cent more than the output of 191,284 tons for the corresponding month of a year ago, according to atatement issued by the Eominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa. This tonnage replaced that of July a the third highest on record; the high for all time was established in May of this year at 230,739 tons.

Data for August, compared with the figures for the previous mnnth, showed that production increased in the eastern provinces but declined in both Ontario and the western provinces. In the eastern provinces the tonnage rose to 71,158 tons from 69,332 tons; in Ontario the output dropped to 138,433 tons from 139,024 tons and in the western provinces to 16,924 tons from 17,089 tons. Statements on the disposition of the coke by the makers showed an increase in sales to 64,482 tons from 63,072 tons, gain in the tonnage used in coke plants to 20,969 tons from 20,337 tons but a slight decline in the quantity transferred to associated smelters to 118,480 tons from 118,735 tons.

Production for August included 15,031 tons of coke breeze of which 4,450 tons were made in the eastern provinces, 9,412 tons in Ontario and 1,169 tons in the western provinces. Sales of breeze totalled 3,752 tons in Ontario, $\hat{2} 80$ tons in the eastern provinces and 337 tons in the western district.

Coke oven charges for August included 80,104 tons of Canadian coal and 234,735 tons of imported coal, or a total of 314,839 tons of bituminous coal. For the year to date $2,457,377$ tons of coal wer carbonized to produce 1,774,305 tons of ccke.

Customs' records show that 90,054 tons of coke were imported during August and 3,391 ton were exported. The apparent consumption of coke in Canada, obtained by deducting the exports from the sum of production and imports, amounted to 313,178 tons in August. For the year to date the total, thus computed, waz $2,541,075$ tons.
