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### CIVIL AVIATION

### NOVEMBER, 1943

Passengers carried by civil air carriers during November increased from 16,720 in 1942 to 22,726, freight increased from 310,521 to 507,448 lbs. and mail from 499,515 to 547,279 lbs.

The average number of revenue passengers per aircraft mile increased from 7.3 to 7.9. Revenue freight increased from 120 to 199 lbs. and mail decreased from 363 to 323 lbs. per aircraft mile. The average passenger journey for the licensed Canadian operators was 452 miles as compared with 446 miles in November, 1942. Data for international operators include only operations over Canadian territory, which makes the average journey relatively short.

The average flying speed on revenue transportation service was 155 miles, which was only slightly faster than in 1942.

The load factor of Canadian licensed operators reporting seat miles was 74 per cent, whereas for international carriers it was 58 per cent.
