

INTRODUCTION

"Civil Aviation" publications are prepared from monthly, quarterly and annual reports filed with the Air Transport Committee of the Canadian Transport Commission and the Aviation Statistics Centre, Dominion Bureau of Statistics by Canadian commercial air carriers, and from monthly reports filed with the Dominion Bureau of Statistics by foreign carriers operating scheduled services into Canada.

For reporting purposes, Canadian air carriers are classified into five groups on the basis of gross annual flying revenues and type of service performed. Descriptions of these groups are to be found from page twenty to twenty-two of this publication. In January 1969, 3 former Group III carriers were transferred to Group IV but ten other carriers were raised from Group IV to Group III thus increasing Group III by a net figure of 7 companies. Transfers between Groups IV and V resulted in an enlargement of Group IV by three companies.

It should also be noted that Nordair Ltd., classified as a Group II carrier by the Air Transport Committee for purposes of regulation, is included with Group III carriers for statistical purposes. The largest number of carriers (approximately 320) is found in Group V. These are smaller companies which report on a quarterly basis only and whose business is highly seasonal. Statistics concerning their operations are excluded from those of the approximately 120 carriers which report on a monthly basis (Groups I-IV).


Whenever feasible the unit toll services are broken down into scheduled and non-scheduled. A complete breakdown is not possible as some carriers offer both services on specific routes. In such cases the route is assigned to the class of service which predominates.


Domestic and international operations of Canadian carriers are combined in all tables except Table 6 which provides a breakdown of domestic and international operations for Canadian carriers operating international unit toll and bulk services.

Table 7 provides data on traffic leaving and entering Canada on an area of service basis. The table contains the operations of both Canadian and Foreign carriers with separate totals for each.

Operations of those foreign carriers having scheduled services into and out of Canada are shown. Bulk transport data is therefore incomplete, since charter services by foreign carriers not otherwise operating in Canada are excluded.

Information published concerning foreign carriers is also different from that shown for Canadian carriers in that hours and mileages reported by foreign carriers cover flying over Canadian territory only. Passengers and goods intransit through Canada have not been counted.





BUNDEW OF EXPROARY OPERATIONS

Consider air carriers in reporting Groups 1 - IV showed increased traffic and revenues in 1969 compared to February 1968. Inlative increases in 1969 would have appeared even larger if 1968 had not been a leap year. The number of hours flown in unit tell service increased by just over one per cent but the number of niles flown increased by over ten per cent indicating the use of more modern aircraft capable of higher speeds. Turbo prop aircraft especially have increased in use among the regional and smaller airlines providing unit tell services. The number of passengers carried increased by over 50,000 and the number of passenger-miles was larger by over 70,000,000. In comparison to this fourteen per cent increase in passenger-miles, the number of goods ton-miles performed in unit tell services grew by seventy-three per cent to over 20 million.

In charter flying growth during February was larger in percentage terms than was the increase in unit toll activities. The number of miles flown increased by over twenty-five per cent to 2.4 million and the number of passengers carried in charter services grew by over 11,000 to 47,729. Freight shipments also increased and a gain of more than 2 million pounds was reported. In terms of passenger-miles the increase was more than two and one-half fold to over 42 million while the number of goods ton-miles reported grew at a similar rate to over 2.3 million.

Along with a growth in traffic there was an increase of 1,200 in the number of airline employees and their total salaries and wages grew by over \$3 million to \$19,008,183.

The statements of income for carriers in Groups I - IV showed noticeable improvement over February of the previous year. That toll revenues were larger by over \$7 million at over \$40 million while bulk transportation revenues increased by almost sixty per cent to over \$4 million. Total operating revenues increased to \$46,251,134 from \$37,389,613 but total operating expenses also increased from \$43,059,722 to \$48,446,268. Expenses for flying operations increased by over \$2 million and amounts reported for general services and administration were \$2 1/2 million larger. Hence, operating income for the normally off-season month of February was still a deficit of Dr. \$2,195,134 and net income after taxes was Dr. \$4,224,913. This was a substantial improvement over February 1968 figures of Dr. \$5,670,108 for operating income and Dr. \$6,919,156 for net income.

The six major carriers as a group showed the greatest improvement in net income for the month. Whereas in 1968 they reported a net deficit for the month of Dr. \$5,459,173 in 1969 they showed a deficit of Dr. \$2,445,396. Unit toll passenger transmit for the six carriers increased by over \$5 million and charter revenue increased by over \$1 million. Expenses also increased however, especially in the flying operations and general services and administration accounts where additional costs of over \$2 million were experienced in each.

The traffic carried by the six major carriers during February showed increases in all units of measure. The most outstanding gains were shown by Air Canada and CP Air in unit toll operations. Freight traffic was once again the item of grantest increase. Air Canada carried reported over 3 1/2 million more pounds of goods and almost 7 million more freight tormalls than in 1968. CP Air reported an increase of almost fifty per cent in freight ton-miles to 3.7 million and Quebecair showed over sixty per cent more ton-miles with a figure of 62,000.

Charter traffic during February carried by the six major companies increased spectacularly as flights to Hawaii attracted puople sucking an escape from the Canadian winter. Particularly active in charter flights were Air Canada, CP Air and Pacific Mastern Airlines. The latter company more than tripled the number of miles it flew and doubled the number of passengers it carried. Charter shipments of freight were substantial for Air Canada which reported over a million good ton-miles compared to no charter freight business in February 1968. Pacific Western Airlines reported over half a million goods ton-miles for treight charters as a part of their involvement in moving equipment and supplies to the far north.

International unit toll passenger traffic by Canadian scheduled carriers showed concentration in the Trans-Atlantic area and in the Southern services area. International unit toll freight ton-miles tripled in the Trans-Atlantic area and almost doubled in the Southern services area. Increases of over twenty per cent in freight ton-miles were reported for a canaborder services and for services to the Pacific and Orient area.

International charter traffic showed major increases in the Trans-Atlantic area, the Pacific and Orient area and the transborder area. The total number of bulk passenger-miles reported by carriers in Groups I - IV increased from 13.4 million is bebruary 1968 to 34.6 million in 1969.

Foreign carriers operating scheduled services to and from Canada also reported increased traffic. The number of passengers carried increased by 14,000 and the number of pounds of freight carried rose by 2.6 million pounds to 8,219,493. The amount of mail carried by foreign airlines increased by over two thirds to 944,846 pounds.

Specialty flying activities of carriers in Groups I - 1V operating fixed-wing aircraft declined from February 1968 totals and a specialty flying by helicopters increased. Flying training on fixed-wing aircraft was lower by more than 2,000 hours while only slight increases were reported for aerial photography and survey, recreational flying and aerial inspection, reconaissance and advertising. The major changes in helicopter specialty flying activities were an increase of over 250 hours in A.I.R.A. and a decline of over 140 hours in recreational flying.

The thirty one companies operating helicopters reported that they used only 276 machines compared to 300 in February 1968 reported by thirty companies. Better utilization of the aircraft was recorded however, as they flew 300 more revenue hours.

The operating revenues of companies flying only helicopters decreased by \$30,000 to \$613,841 but an even greater decrease of \$42,000 in operating expenses reduced the operating deficit for February to Dr. \$493,244 from Dr. \$506,886 in 1968.

CIVIL AVIATION DEFINITIONS

Available seat-miles: Aircraft miles flown multiplied by the number of seats on the aircraft, representing the total passenger-carrying capacity offered.

Available ton-miles: Aircraft miles flown multiplied by the weight capacity of the aircraft, representing the load-carrying capacity offered for passengers and goods.

Bulk transportation: Transportation performed under the following classes of licence as issued by the Air Transport Committee of the Canadian Transport Commission:

Class 4 or 9-4, Charter licences: Public transportation of passengers or goods from a designated base at a toll per mile or per hour for the charter of all or part of the capacity of an aircraft.

Class 5 or 9-5, Contract licences: Transportation not available to the public performed in accordance with one or more specific contracts.

Cargo: Property carried on an aircraft other than mail, stores and baggage. Cargo comprises freight and express.

Express: Property receiving priority shipment within North America including doorto-door service on the ground. Transportation is performed at premium rates.

Freight: Property carried at standard rates.

Goods: Cargo, mail and excess baggage.

Group I carriers: Canadian air carriers licenced to perform domestic and international scheduled services (Air Canada and CP Air).

Group II carriers: Canadian air carriers other than Group I carriers licenced to perform domestic scheduled services. (Nordair Ltd. is considered to be in Group II by the Air Transport Committee for regulatory purposes but for statistical purposes this carrier is shown as being in Group III.)

Group III carriers: Canadian air carriers not included in Groups I and II with either annual unit toll and bulk transportation revenues of over \$500,000 or unit toll revenues of over \$150,000.

Group IV carriers: As of January 1, 1969, Canadian air carriers not included in Groups I, II and III, with gross annual flying revenues of over \$150,000.

Group V carriers: As of January 1, 1969, Canadian air carriers with gross annual flying revenues of less than \$150,000.

Mile: Statute mile of 5,280 ft.

Non-scheduled carrier:

An airline operating unit toll transportation services under authority of a Class 2, 9-2, 3 or 9-3 licence on a regular or irregular basis between specific points. Carriers providing any services under authority of a Class 1 and Class 8 licence are excluded from this category.

Pacific and Orient services: Services between Canada and points in the Pacific Ocean, Orient and Australasia.

Revenue passenger: Person receiving air transportation from carrier for which a fare is collected. Infants paying 10% of adult fare are not counted.

Revenue passenger ton-mile:

One ton of passenger weight transported one mile for which fare is collected. Passenger weight is 200 lbs. comprising the passenger and his free baggage allowance.

Scheduled carrier:

An airline with a Class 1 or Class 8 licence serving designated points in accordance with a service schedule and at a toll per unit. (Group I and Group II carriers.)

Southern services:

Services between Canada and Bermuda, the Caribbean, Mexico, Central and South America.

Specialty flying:

Revenue flying services performed for special purposes other than the transportation of passengers and goods.

Short ton of 2,000 lbs.

Trans-Atlantic and Polar services: Services between Canada and Europe.

Transborder services: Services between Canada and the United States except Hawaii.

Unit toll transportation:

Includes transportation performed under the following classes of licence as issued by the Air Transport Committee of the Canadian Transport Commission:

Class 1 or Class 8; Scheduled service licences: Public transportation of persons and/or goods between designated points in accordance with a service schedule and at a toll per unit.

Class 2 or Class 9-2, Regular specific point licences: Public transportation of persons and/or goods between designated points on a route pattern and with some degree of regularity, at a toll per unit.

Class 3 or Class 9-3, Irregular specific point licences: Public transportation of persons and/or goods from a designated base within a defined or specific points at a toll per unit.

Weight load factor: Sum of revenue goods ton-miles and revenue passenger ton-miles as a proportion of available ton-miles.

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
