INTRODUCTION

This report presents a summary of monthly statements filed by Canadian and Foreign air carriers licensed to operate in Canada. A more comprehensive annual report based on audited yearly statements will be published later under the title "Civil Aviation 1968". Data shown in this report are subject to revision.

For reporting purposes, Canadian air carriers are classified into five groups on the basis of flying revenues and type of service performed. Descriptions of these groups are found from page twenty to page twenty-two of this publication. In January 1968, two former Group III carriers were transferred to Group IV, and this, combined with the reclassification of some carriers from Group V to reflect their increased volume of business, enlarged Group IV by a total of nine companies. It should also be noted that Nordair Ltd., classified as a Group II carrier by the Air Transport Committee for purposes of regulation, is included with Group III carriers for statistical purposes. The largest number of carriers (325) is found in Group V. These are smaller companies which report on a quarterly basis only and whose traffic is highly seasonal. Statistics concerning their operations are excluded from those of the approximately 120 carriers who report on a monthly basis.

Whenever feasible the unit toll services are broken down into scheduled and non-scheduled. A complete breakdown is not possible as some carriers offer both services on specific routes. In such cases the route is assigned to the class of service which predominates.

Domestic and international operations of Canadian carriers are combined in all tables except Table 6 which provides a breakdown of domestic and international operations for Canadian carriers operating international unit toll and bulk services.

Table 7 provides data on traffic leaving and entering Canada on an area of service basis. The table contains the operations of both Canadian and Foreign carriers with separate totals for each.

Operations of those Foreign carriers having scheduled services into and out of Canada are shown. Bulk transport data is therefore incomplete, since charter services by foreign carriers not otherwise operating in Canada are excluded. Foreign carriers report only hours and miles flown over Canadian territory. Statistics concerning passengers and goods in transit through Canada have been excluded.

Civil Aviation, 1968 Operations

During 1968 airline operations showed divergent trends according to the size and type of company. Air Canada and Canadian Pacific Airlines showed increased traffic and improved financial positions but the regional carriers (Eastern Provincial Airways (1963) Ltd., Quebecair, Transair and Pacific Western Airlines) as a group recorded a deficit despite increased traffic. Smaller local airlines and companies providing charter services and specialty flying recorded larger totals for traffic carried. The net income of Group III carriers declined sharply from \$3.8 million in 1967 to less than \$1 million in 1968. However, companies in financial reporting Group IV increased their total revenues and expenses by 50 per cent and their income by one third.

Group V carriers increased in number from 275 in 1967 to 325 in 1968 as new licencees began operations and a few companies formerly in Group IV were reclassified on the basis of revenues belonging in Group V. Although the number of hours flown in transportation services (unit toll and charter) was lower by about 12 per cent there was a corresponding increase in the amount of specialty flying reported by Group V. The major portion of this increase was accounted for by a growth in the amount of flying training of over 25,000 hours. Larger totals were also recorded for recreational flying, aircraft rental and aerial photography and survey.

Net income figures for Air Canada and hence for Group I & II and Group I-IV totals are somewhat unusual when compared to other years. Air Canada revised its estimate of the useful life of turbo-prop aircraft and as a result depreciation expense in 1968 was reduced by \$5,350,000 thereby producing an improvement in net income after tax of \$2,675,000.

The net income of carriers operating only helicopters increased by \$250,000. To accomplish this the same number of companies as in 1967 used more machines and flew 10,000 more hours. Helicopter operations continued to become more widespread as the value of these specialized machines in developing and exploring remote or inaccessible parts of the country made itself known. Turbine-powered helicopters were used more extensively as their greater capacities, speeds and ease of maintenance created a demand for them.

Foreign airlines carried slightly smaller volumes of passenger traffic in 1968 as they were unable to match the record levels set during the Centennial Year with its very popular World's Fair Expo '67 in Montreal. However, goods traffic measured in pounds showed an increase of almost one third.

During 1968 there was an increase of 64.7 per cent in the number of bulk passenger-miles flown by Canadian carriers. Long distance jet charter flights open to groups have become increasingly popular. Europe, the Caribbean and Hawaii have come within the reach of increasing numbers of associations who arrange "package" holidays and tours for the benefit of their members. Modern jet equipment has come into use by Group III carriers such as Wardair and Nordair. The 100 per cent increase in bulk passenger-miles reported by Group III carriers during 1968 testifies to the successful promotion and development of this type of service.

Bulk goods ton-miles reported by carriers in Groups I-IV showed an increase of over forty per cent in 1968. This increase was largely concentrated in the movement of supplies into the far north as a part of a wide ranging series of resource exploration and development programs. The most notable gains in freight charter traffic were shown by Pacific Western Airlines whose bulk goods ton-miles increased by two and one half times to 6.7 million. This amounted to well over one half of the total for this type of service for all carriers in Canada. The use of specialized large capacity Hercules aircraft suited to the short, unpaved landing fields of the Arctic regions made it possible to move all the equipment, supplies and machinery needed for oil drilling. Transair also carried large volumes of charter freight into the north and ranked second with 2.7 million bulk goods ton-miles. Air cargo traffic between metropolitan centres is of growing interest to the major carriers. Air Canada reported no charter freight ton-miles in 1967 but showed almost a million in 1968. However, this type of service is peculiar to the bush operators who fly to areas which are inaccessible except by air. The importance of such small operators can be seen by the fact that Group IV carriers as a group reported over one million bulk goods ton-miles in 1968 using aircraft of the DC3 size or larger.

CIVIL AVIATION DEFINITIONS(1)

Bulk Transportation:

- (1) Public transportation of passengers or goods from a designated base at a toll per mile or per hour for the charter of the entire aircraft (Class 4).
- (2) Transportation of passengers and goods in accordance with one or more specific contracts (Class 5).

Classification of Canadian Carriers by Groups

Group I Carriers:

Canadian Air Carriers licensed to perform both domestic and international scheduled services, (Air Canada and Canadian Pacific Air Lines Ltd.).

Group II Carriers:

Canadian Air Carriers other than Group I carriers licensed to perform domestic scheduled services and Nordair Ltd.(2).

Group III Carriers:

Canadian Air Carriers licensed to perform non-scheduled services with gross annual flying revenues of \$500,000 or over (excepting air carriers included in Group I and II).

Group IV Carriers:

Canadian Air Carriers licensed to perform non-scheduled services with gross annual flying revenues of \$100,000 and over, but less than \$500,000.

Group V Carriers:

Canadian Air Carriers licensed to perform non-scheduled services with gross annual flying revenues of less than \$100,000.

Cargo:

Air freight and air express (excluding mail and excess baggage).

Carrier, Air:

One authorized to operate aircraft in or over Canada for hire or reward.

Non-Scheduled Carriers:

Carriers not operating any scheduled (Class I) service.

Scheduled Carriers:

Air Carriers serving designated points in accordance with a service schedule and at a toll per unit.

Express, Air:

A package service operated only within the U.S.A. and Canada; the rates cover door-to-door service. Because Air Express shipments take priority over Air Freight, they command higher rates.

Freedoms of the Air:

First Freedom: The privilege to fly over the territory of a foreign

country without landing.

Second Freedom: The privilege to land on the territory of a foreign

country for non-traffic purposes.

Third Freedom: The privilege to put down in a foreign country, passen-

gers, mail and cargo taken on in the territory of the

state whose nationality the aircraft possesses.

Fourth Freedom: The privilege to take on in a foreign country, passen-

gers, mail and cargo destined for the territory of the

state whose nationality the aircraft possesses.

Fifth Freedom: The privilege to take on in a foreign country, passen-

gers, mail and cargo destined for the territory of any other foreign state and the privilege to put down in a foreign country, passengers, mail and cargo coming from

any such territory.

Freight, Air: Articles carried on unit toll flights at standard per

pound rates or as bulk transportation.

Goods, Revenue: Air Cargo (freight and express) plus mail and excess

baggage.

Interline Traffic:

Domestic Interline: Passengers and goods received by a carrier at Canadian

points from other Canadian Air Carriers.

Foreign Interline: Passengers and goods received by a carrrier from Foreign

Air Carriers.

Divisional Interline: Passengers and goods received from other operating

divisions of the same carrier.

International Services:

Transborder Services: Services between Canada and the United States, except

Hawaii.

Southern Services: Services between Canada and Bermuda, the Caribbean,

Mexico, Central or South America.

Trans-Atlantic and

Polar Services: Services between Canada and Europe.

Pacific and Orient

Services: Services between Canada and points in the Pacific Ocean

the Orient and Australasia.

Load Capacity Available: Load capacity available for the transportation of goods

and passengers after deduction of the operating load of

gas and oil, crew, stewards' supplies, etc.

Load Factor, Passenger:

Ratio of revenue passenger-miles performed to available

seat-miles.

Load Factor, Weight:

- See Weight Load Factor.

Miles:

Statute miles of 5,280 ft.

Passenger:

A person occupying a separate seat on a one-way trip. For statistical purposes an infant-in-arms is not considered a passenger. A round trip passenger is counted as two passengers.

Passenger Load-Factor:

- See Load Factor, Passenger.

Passenger-Mile:

The transportation of one passenger one mile.

Non-Revenue Passenger:

A person, (including company personnel other than crew) carried on a revenue transportation flight, for whom no fare is collected.

Revenue Passenger:

A child or adult for which a fare or part of a fare is paid.

Seat-Miles Available:

Seats available for the transportation of passengers multiplied by the miles flown on each inter-station flight.

Specialty Flying Services:

Non-transportation flying services, such as flying training, aerial photography, and aerial inspection.

Tons:

Short tons of 2,000 lbs.

Ton-Mile:

The transportation of one ton of goods one mile or any combination of weight in pounds and number of miles flown the product of which is 2,000.

Ton-Miles Available:

Available load capacity multiplied by miles flown on each inter-station flight.

Unit Toll Transportation:

Public transportation of passengers and goods at a toll per unit. It includes:

- (1) the scheduled services, which provide public transportation between designated points in accordance with a schedule (Class I); and
- (ii) the non-scheduled services, which provide public transportation either between designated points on a route pattern and with some degree of regularity (Class 2) or from a designated base to serve a defined area or a specific point or points (Class 3).

Weight Load - Factor:

Ratio of revenue ton-miles performed to available tonmiles.



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
