#### CIVIL AVIATION IN CANADA

The statistics in this report are collected from the operators of aircraft with commercial operators' licences with the exception of data on licences which are supplied by the Civil Aviation Division of the Department of Transport. That division has jurisdiction over the licensing of all airports, aircraft pilots and engineers and, consequently, the licensed aircraft and pilots also include private aircraft and pilots.

The commercial carriers have been divided into three classes: scheduled, non-scheduled and foreign. Scheduled carriers are those operating a scheduled service between designated points, although they may also operate some non-scheduled services. Non-scheduled carriers are those licensed to operate only non-scheduled services. Under foreign carriers are comprised the routes operated by United States companies between United States and Canadian airports. The international operations of Canadian carriers except Trans-Atlantic services are included in the data for scheduled carriers. Non-commercial carriers include provincial government forestry patrol services and the air operations of mining companies. All Canadian commercial carriers are under the jurisdiction of the Air Transport Board and are required to keep records and accounts in accordance with the Board's regulations.

The end of the war came too late in the year to allow any important revival of civil aviation to be reflected in the statistics in this report. However, the civilian flying clubs, restricted during the war, have started activities again and a slight increase in instructional flying time is reported for 1945, although the total is still only a small fraction of that reported for 1940.

Operators in the northern districts of Canada are engaged mainly in serving mines, trappers, prospectors, etc., the mines supplying the greater part of their traffic. Their aircraft are equipped with floats in the summer and skis in the winter and lakes serve as landing surfaces. Consequently there are periods each spring and fall when ice conditions make operation impossible. All flying under these conditions is daylight flying. These aircraft have carried all kinds of freight, including shipments of gold, horses and cattle, cances, mining machinery, bundles of furs, dynamite, etc. They furnish the most economical transportation service to many northern mines and it is this traffic, coupled with construction of air bases in the north country during the war years, which accounts for the heavy freight traffic by air as compared with freight carried by aircraft in other countries.

Time and miles for foreign operators are only over Canadian territory. The time must necessarily be estimated but any error should be small. American companies report the gusoline and oil purchased in Canada only. This amount, together with that used by the Canadian operators, is the total consumption by civil aircraft exclusive of private and Dominion Government aircraft.

Consumption by military aircraft is also not included. The international operations of Canadian carriers include complete data for their operation in the United States. In the monthly reports for 1945, the Canadian portion only was included, so that the totals of these will not correspond to that given in this report.

Excess baggage is included with freight. International mail includes both incoming and outgoing mail. Passengers carried by international operators include passengers in both directions, and for companies flying between United States points via Canada they include through passengers on board while flying over Canadian territory.

The number of revenue passengers carried during the year was 490,809, compared to 371,397 in 1944 and 282,886 in 1945. The increase over the previous year was 32 per cent, slightly bettering the percentage increase of 31 per cent in 1944. Revenue passenger miles totalled 153,504,833, compared

with 111,127,010 in 1944, an increase of 58 per cent. Parc of this increase, however, must be attributed to the already mentioned change in the data for 1945 to include mileage of Canadian international routes made in the United States. If this is excluded the increase over 1944 would be 28 per cent.

Pounds of freight carried showed an increase over the previous year, the first of such since 1941, but there was a small decline in ton miles. Mail pounds carried was lower than in 1944 although there was a slight increase in ton miles.

Operating revenues of Canadian carriers increased to \$17,535,154 in 1945, compared to \$17,119,291 in 1944. Operating expenses decreased to \$17,520,689 from \$17,847,346, reducing the net operating deficit from \$728,055 to \$185,535. Revenues include \$449,060 from repairs and service sales and sale of fuel and oil. Expenses against these items of \$59,265 are included in operating expenses.

The number of employees of Canadian carriers was 4,430 compared with 4,201 at the end of 1944. Wages and salaries paid amounted to \$9,252,371, compared with \$8,355,928. The scheduled carriers account for all but a small portion of the amounts shown. Not included in the above totals are the employees of American companies who are domiciled in Canada. There were 67 of these in 1945 who were paid \$185,021, compared with 131 paid \$255,116 in 1944.


