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CIVIL AVIATION

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Introduction

The Bureau of Statistics in collaboration with the Air Transport Board, has published monthly reports since January, 1941, showing certain statistics for each scheduled Canadian carrier and the totals for most of the other air carriers operating in Canada. The current report includes statistics on the same basis as the monthly summaries and, in addition, some statistics for "D" class or specialty carriers.

Corrections in the preliminary or monthly summary have been made in this report as derived from the annual reports of each company. Commercial operators are presently divided into four main classes, "A" - scheduled, "B" and "C" - non-scheduled and "D" - specialty carriers, such as aerial survey, training, dusting, etc.

Only the "A", "B" and "C" operations are included in the monthly reports on Civil Aviation published by the Bureau. The annual totals, however, include the available data on "D" class carriers. Consequently the preliminary annual report will not agree with the current annual in such items as miles flown, gasoline and oil consumed and their cost, or number of hours flown.

Freight or goods includes freight, express and excess baggage carried, and also mail matter when transported for clients other than the post office department.

Statistics in Table 1 are not comparable throughout as totals for 1948 to 1946 do not include certain non-commercial operations which, however, represent but a small segment of the industry. In fact, the statistics during the war years shown (1942-1945) must be considered with reservations, and only in 1946 does a modern civil aviation industry evolve. Operations in the pre-war period were carried on principally by our renowned "bush fliers" and few inter-city scheduled services were then available. During the war, traffic was controlled both by emergency regulations, non-availability of new planes and equipment and by the absence of qualified personnel who had flocked to the Air Force. Aircraft miles flown in Canada have more than tripled since 1939 when they were slightly under 11 millions. The wartime peak occurred in 1945 at some 20.1 million miles. Regular inter-city commercial service has become commonplace only since 1946. The Trans-Canada Air Lines was being organized when war was declared in 1959 and development up to the end of 1945 was greatly retarded by war conditions. At present, over 80 p.c. of the passenger miles flown are scheduled on inter-city services which did not exist previous to 1939.

Review of 1948 Operations

The total mileage flown by commercial aircraft continued to advance during 1948 with a 6.4 p.c. gain over 1947 and was 35.6 p.c. greater than in 1946, the respective totals being some 38,334,100, 36,052,600 and 28,268,800 miles. The 1948 record is over four times the pre war average of the years 1935 - 1959. Revenue passengers carried during the year exceeded for the first time a million passengers at 1,054,778 compared with 856,047 in 1947, an increase of 218,751 or 26.2 p.c. This is an all time high in the history of Canadian aviation.

Revenue passenger miles aggregated 321,704,118 miles compared with nearly 238,000,000 in 1947, an advance of 35 p.c. Comparison with the gain in aircraft mileage of 6.4 p.c. indicates the use of large capacity planes as well as greater patronage. Illustrating the tremendous growth of the past decade, in 1959 only 21,840,000 revenue passenger miles were logged. The volume of air freight also continues to

advance with a total of 57,262,712 pounds transported during 1948, a gain of 5,021,354 pounds over 1947.

Freight between foreign stations rose from 250,412 to 932,925 pounds while revenue freight increased from 51,653,457 to 33,633,045 pounds. Total freight ton miles also rose appreciably over 1947 from 3,670,240 to 5,458,260 ton miles, an increase of nearly 49 p.c.; of this total, revenue ton mileage was a record 4,248,630 compared with 2,985,618 ton miles for 1947.

With the air lift accorded first class mail, new peaks were established in poundage, ton miles and mail revenues, surpassing the war time record of 1945. Pounds of mail carried exceeded 10 million for a gain of 45 p.c. over 1947 volume and equivalent to 5.3 times the 1959 poundage. Mail ton miles advanced from 1,646,156 ton miles in 1947 to a new high of 2,860,796 in the year under review for an increase of nearly 74 p.c.

Aircraft of reporting carriers logged 299,538 hours of flying time compared with 285,462 hours during 1947. Of the 1948 total 230,857 hours were flown on revenue transportation as compared with 218,715 in 1947. Gasoline consumption was 17,030,205 gallons for the year as against 13,922,451 gallons in 1947, a 22.3 p.c. increase. With total mileage up only 6.4 p.c., the use of planes with more and stronger engines is indicated. Oil consumption also showed a gain rising 40,785 gallons over 1947 to 225,259 gallons for the year.

Commercial flying accidents claimed a total of 44 lives during 1948 of which 56 were passengers and 8 crew members. In addition 18 persons were reported injured. This is a worsening from 1947 when 24 were killed and 16 injured, while in 1946, 9 were killed in flying accidents and only 4 in 1945. On a revenue passenger mileage basis one passenger was killed for each 8,936,000 passenger miles flown compared to one per 15,199,000 miles in 1947 and one per 68,925,000 passenger miles during 1946.

Assets of Canadian carriers increased from \$44,433,141 at the end of 1947 to \$51,558,673 as at December 31, 1948. All items of property account increased except buildings and land. Additions were considerably below those of 1947 and were halved at some \$10,484,000 compared with \$21,433,000, while retirements were increased to nearly \$6 million from \$4,162,000.

The Income Account in Table 3 indicates that despite record passenger, freight and mail traffic, most Canadian airlines again had little to show for the year's operations. Rising costs combined to offset the highest revenues in aviation history. Maritime Central alone of the scheduled carriers had a belance to transfer to Profit after payment of Income Taxes.

Total revenues of all Canadian carriers were \$33,712,329 compared with \$26,834,090 in 1947, while expenses advanced from \$29,321,502 to \$34,799,670. Thus revenues were up \$6,878,239 or 24.1 p.c., while expenses by \$5,478,168 or 18.7 p.c. Net income for the year 1948 after income tax shows an overall industry deficit of \$1,750,581 compared with \$2,787,882 for 1347 which was a decide; increvenent.

Passenger revenues at nearly \$18,855,000 for the year represented 56.5 p.c. of total revenues, mail revenues 18.8 p.c. at \$6,274,501, and goods and excess baggage 5.3 p.c. Aircraft operation and maintenance took

\$20,875,000 or 60.0 p.c. of total expenses, ground operations 26.0 p.c., traffic expenses 7.8 p.c., and general administration 5.8 p.c.

The ratio of revenue passenger miles to available seat miles was 65.1 p.c. for scheduled airlines in 1948 against 50.9 p.c. in the preceding year, indicating an encouraging gain in patronge.

The monthly average number of employees in civil aviation for 1948, including these of interparticular carriers domiciled in Canada, was 6,181 compared with 5,872 in 1947. Their earnings at \$16,219,852 for 1948 compare with \$13,710,606 in the previous twelve months, an average increase per employee of \$289.24 or 12.4

International Service

Unta given in Table 6, etc., on Foreign International carriers cover only their operations over Canadian territory. No financial statistics are available other than salaries and wages paid to employees comiciled in Canada. Overseas services of Trans-Canada Airlines are not detailed in the monthly and preliminary annual statistics. However, the following statistics on Trans-Canada Airlines (Atlantic) operations, as reported to the Air Board, are of interest to show the expansion in overseas service during 1948, while a more complete table is given on page 5 of this report. On May 1, 1947, T.C.A. assumed responsibility for operations previously provided by the Canadian Government Trans-Atlantic Service.

Non-Commercial

1. Flying Clubs

There were 36 flying clubs reporting activities for 1948 against 58 one year earlier. Hours flown totalled 35,529 of which 12,162 were dual instruction, 12,429 hours solo instructional, 9,176 recreational and 1,760 non-revenue. An estimated 3,057,749 miles were flown. Fuel consumed cost some \$72,600 and represented 187,300 gallons of gasoline and 5,341 gallons of oil. Employment was accorded to 107 who received \$187,695 in salaries and wages. Club membership was reported to number 4,459 with 1,921 persons receiving

instruction. Some 415 members and pupils passed private pilot tests, 48 secured limited commercial pilot licences, 30 public transport pilots, 5 air engineers and 29 qualified as instructors. A total of 162 aircraft were operated by the clubs with the largest having a fleet of 10.

2. Non-Commercial Carriers

In addition to the regular licensed carriers which numbered 135 reporting operations during 1948, some companies and government departments operated air services. The Hudson Day Air Transport Ltd., for example, carried company employees and considerable freight during the year with employees carried numbering 2,359 and freight 281,575 pounds. Operating expenses for this company were \$164,910 and included \$24,107 in wages. Forestry and fishery patrols, photographic survey, pest control, instruction and exhibition flights, etc., also were responsible for considerable flying time.

Arrivals by Air

The Lamigration Branch of the Mines and Resources Department records arrivals by plans of returning Canadians and tourists, etc., at the principal airports in Canada. A summary table giving this information by provinces for 1947 and 1948 appears below. It is not possible to divide these totals into commercial, non-commercial, private or itinerant planes. This inward traffic has increased tremendously since pre-war and its contribution to our tourist industry is considerable. Totals are not comparable with statistics for foreign international carriers, which include traffic in both directions.
