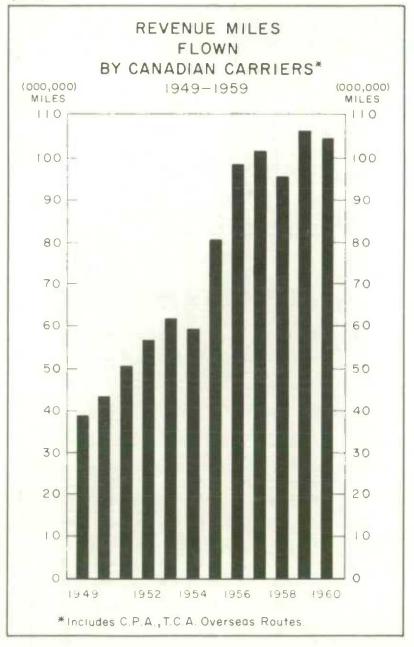
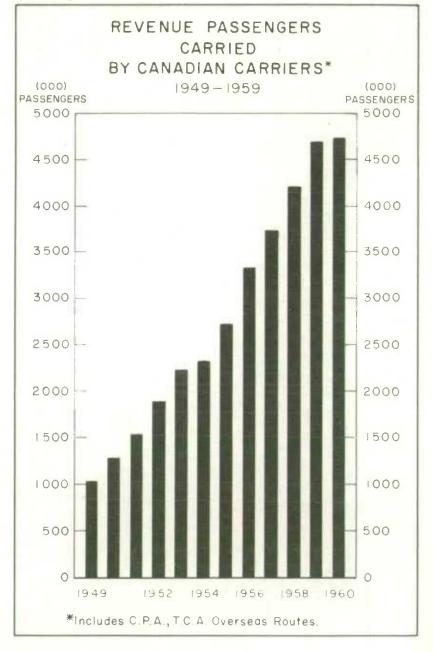

## 1961

#### Concepts

During 1959, the Air Transport Board, the Department of Transport, and the Dominion Bureau of Statistics completed, jointly, a major revision of the civil aviation statistical schedules filed by Canadian commercial air carriers. These revised reporting forms went into effect January 1, 1960, and necessitated a complete review of the monthly and annual "Civil Aviation" publications produced by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The more important conceptual changes in these publications are:

- 1. A revision of the "Uniform System of Accounts and Reports for Commercial Air Carriers";
- 2. A revision of the basis of classifying commercial air carriers;
- 3. The exclusion from industry totals of the operations of Group V carriers;
- 4. The consolidation of the domestic and international services of Canadian carriers.

The revised "Uniform System of Accounts and Reports for Commercial Air Carriers" conforms more closely with the one used by the Civil Aeronautics Board in the United States. Although this new classification of accounts is not entirely comparable with the old one, it provides a more comprehensive picture of the air carriers' financial operations.

Commercial air carriers are now classified on the basis of their annual gross flying revenues. This new classification comprises five carrier groups, each with different reporting requirements whereas the previous classification was based on gross annual revenues and contained four classes of carriers. The present groups and the former classes are defined below.

#### The 1960 Classification of Commercial Air Carriers:

Group I- Trans-Canada Air Lines and Canadian Pacific Air Lines.

Group II — All other carriers licensed to perform scheduled service plus two major transport carriers: Nordair Ltd. and Wheeler Air Lines Ltd.

Group III - All carriers with gross annual flying revenues of \$400,000 and over which are not included in Groups I and II.

Group IV—All carriers having gross annual flying revenues of \$60,000 and over but less than \$400,000 and, in addition, any carrier licensed to perform unit toll service with gross annual flying revenues under \$60,000.

Group V-All carriers other than those licensed to perform unit toll service with gross annual flying revenues of less than \$60,000.

#### The 1959 Classification of Commercial Air Carriers:

Class A - All carriers licensed to perform scheduled service.

Class B-All carriers licensed to perform nonscheduled service and having gross annual revenues of \$100,000 and over. Class C-All carriers licensed to perform non-scheduled service and having gross annual revenues of between \$25,000 and \$100,000.

Class D — All carriers licensed to perform nonscheduled service and having gross annual revenues of \$25,000 or less.

The number of carriers included with each group or class is indicated below:

As the foregoing table demonstrates, the 1960 groups are not comparable with the 1959 classes. The larger number of carriers reporting in 1960 includes a number of small Group V carriers which did not file any returns with the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in previous years. Nordair Ltd. and Wheeler Air Lines Ltd. which are classified as Group II carriers have been included with Group III carriers in this report for statistical purposes. As a result, Groups I and II consist of scheduled carriers only and combined are equivalent to the 1959 Class A carriers.

As Group V carriers file reports on a quarterly basis only, data on their operations are not available for monthly publication but are shown in a special table at the end of each quarter. These statistics are not included in industry totals shown in other tables of the report and the same practice has been followed in the preparation of this annual publication. The total number of carriers covered in the summary tables of this annual report, therefore, is considerably less than in previous years. The effect of this change, however, is not considered significant as operating revenues of all Group V carriers in 1960 accounted for only 2.9 per cent of the operating revenues of all Canadian carriers.

Domestic and international operations of Canadian carriers are shown together, contrary to past practice. However, all the information available separately for each type of operation has been assembled and presented in Table 5.

Data for foreign carriers operating in Canada, as in the past, are not comparable with those shown for the Canadian carriers as foreign companies are required to report hours and miles flown over Canadian territory only and passengers and goods in transit are excluded.

Despite the changes described above, every effort has been made to maintain continuity between this issue of "Civil Aviation" and previous annual reports. The data shown in the statistical summary (Table 1) contains most of the items for which con-

tinuity has been maintained and this table has been revised to enable a direct comparison for the six year period. It should be noted however that complete continuity is no longer possible. This applies particularly to financial detail due to the revision of the "Uniform Classification of Accounts". It is considered that although there has been a break in the continuity, the revision has resulted in a substantial improvement in the coverage, and quality of civil aviation statistics as well as an expansion of the amount of information available for analytical purposes.

Additions to the annual report include tables showing the interline traffic on mainline services of Canadian carriers (Table 5) and unit toll traffic carried into and out of Canada by foreign carriers, by geographic area (Table 6). It should be noted, however, that totals shown for individual geographic areas are not entirely accurate. Some carriers, operating under fifth freedom rights, transport passengers and goods between Canada and more than one geographic area and are not in a position to provide separate figures for each of these services. For example, all Air France traffic to and from Canada is shown as originating from or destined to Europe although this carrier has a fifth freedom license to transport passengers and goods between Canada and the United States.

Also available for the first time is a cross classification of operating expenses on an objective and functional distribution basis (Tables 14, 15, 16).

Table 17 is a special table designed to provide separate data on companies which operate helicopters only. It has been estimated that these companies operate approximately 75 per cent of all helicopters engaged in commercial services in Canada. Helicopters operated by firms which also have fixed wing aircraft are excluded.

Wherever possible, unit toll services of Canadian carriers are broken down into scheduled and non-scheduled. A complete breakdown is not possible, however, as some carriers offer both services on specific routes. In such cases, the route is assigned to the class of service which predominates.

#### Review of 1960 Operations

A review of 1960 operations (Table 1) reveals that Canadian carriers transported a record number of revenue passengers during the year, a total of 4,727,415. This represented an increase of one per

cent over the previous year's record of 4,681,264. Revenue goods carried, including mail, aggregated 203,353,000 lbs. This was above the 1959 total of 202.988,362 lbs. but considerably below the 1956 high of 310,003,135 lbs. Passenger-miles, which are available for the unit toll services only, advanced 13.3 per cent to 2,671,926,081 from 2.357.386.420 and goods ton-miles (cargo, mail and excess baggage combined), on these same services, increased 15 per cent to 49,022,425 from 42,620,851, Foreign airlines transported into and out of Canada 724,301 revenue passengers and 16.706,880 lbs. of revenue goods as compared with 634,737 passengers and 14,066,974 lbs. of goods carried in 1959. This represented increases of 14.1 per cent in the number of passengers and 18.8 per cent in the volume of goods (Table 2).

Operating revenues and operating expenses of Canadian carriers reached new highs in 1960. Revenues amounted to \$235,973,562, an increase of 7 per cent over the previous record of \$220,423,558 established in 1959 and operating expenses totalled \$237,714,284, a rise of 8.3 per cent above the 1959 previous peak of \$219,487,993. As a result there was an operating loss of \$1,740,722, the first since 1950 when Canadian carriers reported operating expenses which exceeded operating revenues by \$151,645. In 1959, an operating income of \$935,565 had been realized. The deficit after income taxes, in 1960, was the highest ever recorded. It amounted to \$6,450,886 as compared with a deficit of \$2,484.178 reported in the previous year (Table 1).

Total assets of Canadian carriers, as of December 31, 1960, were valued at \$335,049,663 and were much above the assets of \$262,341,755 shown in the carriers' books at the end of 1959. Scheduled carriers were responsible for this entire increase as their 1960 assets were worth \$304,574,765 as opposed to \$231,137,625 in the previous year. Of all accounts, Property and Equipment showed the largest increase as a total value of \$231,756,403 was reported under this item in 1960 compared with \$183,880,747 in the preceding year (Table 8).

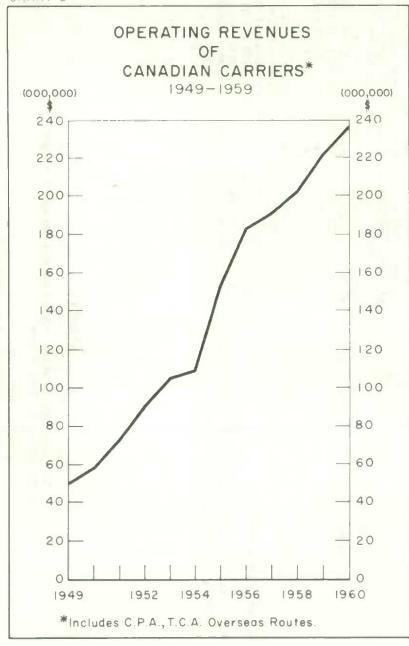
More accidents occurred to aircraft of Canadian registry in 1960 (331) than in the previous year (309) (Table 19). Commercial aircraft were involved in 126 accidents as compared with 106 in 1959 and the total number of persons killed in all aircraft accidents dropped to 57 from 91. There were 5,318 aircraft of all types registered as of December 31, 1960, and 483 established airports (Table 21).

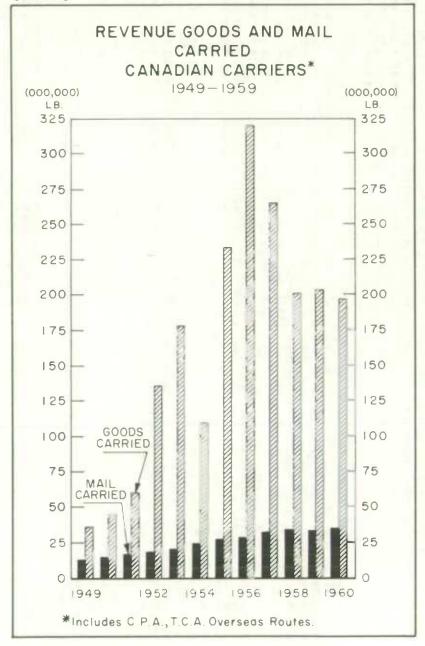

# CIVIL AVIATION DEFINITIONS

Unit Toll Transportation	Transportation of passengers or goods at a toll per unit. It includes:  (i) the scheduled services, which provide transportation between designated points in accordance with a schedule; and  (ii) the non-scheduled services, which provide transportation either between designated points on a route pattern and with some degree of regularity or from a designated base to serve a defined area or a specific point or points.
Bulk Transportation	Transportation of passengers or goods at a toll per mile or per hour for the entire aircraft (charter), or in accordance with a specific contract.
Specialty Flying Services	Non-transportation flying services, such as flying training, aerial photography, aerial pest control and aerial advertising.
Scheduled Carriers	Carriers operating some unit toll scheduled service.
Non-Scheduled Carriers	Carriers not operating any unit toll scheduled service.
Revenue Classification of Canadian Carriers:	
Group I Carriers	Trans-Canada Air Lines and Canadian Pacific Air Lines.
Group II Carriers	All other carriers licensed to perform scheduled service plus two major transport carriers: Nordair Ltd. and Wheeler Air Lines Ltd.
Group III Carriers	All carriers with gross annual flying revenues of \$400,000 and over which are not included in Groups I and II.
Group IV Carriers	All carriers having gross annual flying revenues of \$60,000 and over but less than \$400,000, and, in addition, any carrier licensed to perform unit toll service with gross annual flying revenues under \$60,000.
Group V Carriers	All carriers other than those licensed to perform unit toll service with gross annual flying revenues of less than \$60,000.
Air Cargo	Air freight and air express,
Goods	Air Cargo plus excess baggage and air mail.
Passenger Load Factors	Ratio of revenue passenger-miles performed to available seat-miles.
Weight Load Factor	Ratio of revenue ton-miles performed to available ton-miles.
Interline Traffic	Passengers and goods received by a carrier either from foreign carriers (foreign interline) or from other Canadian carriers (domestic interline) or from other operating divisions of the same carriers (division interline).
International Services:	
Trans Border Services	Services between Canada and the United States.
Southern Services	Services between Canada and Bermuda, the Caribbean, Mexico or South America.
Trans Atlantic and Polar Services	Services between Canada and Europe.
Pacific and Orient Services	Services between Canada and points in the Pacific Ocean or the Orient.
Five Freedoms of the Air:	
First Freedom	The right to fly over the territory of a foreign country without landing.
Second Freedom	The right to land on the territory of a foreign country for non-traffic purposes.
Third Freedom	The right to put down in a foreign country, passengers, mail and cargo taken on in the territory of the state whose nationality the aircraft possesses.
Fourth Freedom	The right to take on in a foreign country, passengers, mail and cargo destined for the territory of the state whose nationality the aircraft possesses.
Fifth Freedom	The right to take on in a foreign country, passengers, mail and cargo destined for the territory of any other foreign state and the privilege to put down in a foreign country, passengers, mail and cargo coming from any such territory.
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
