



Presented in this publication are statistics of Canadian and foreign carriers operating commercial air services within Canada or between Canada and other countries. Statistics of Canadian carriers refer to total operations; i.e., domestic and international, while data for foreign airlines relate to their activities in Canada only; i.e., hours and miles flown over Canadian territory, and passengers and goods entering and leaving Canada, excluding passengers and goods in transit through Canada. Thus, figures presented for Canadian and for foreign carriers are not actually comparable with the exception of traffic data shown in Table 6 by geographic area. For the purposes of this table, Canadian airlines operating international scheduled services are required to file passenger and freight data on the basis used by foreign carriers in order to have a complete picture of the traffic leaving and entering Canada.

In this report, Canadian carriers are classified into five groups on the basis of gross annual flying revenues and type of service performed. These groups are described in the last two pages of this publication along with definitions of other terms used herein. The number of carriers included with each group during 1962 is as follows:

The total number of air carriers may vary from year to year (in 1961, there were 297). This is mainly due to the additions or withdrawals of small operators. The variation in number has very little impact on the statistics presented for the Civil Aviation industry as a whole. However, there could be significant changes from one group to another depending on individual company growth or contraction. This would tend to distort a true comparison of specific groups over a period of years.

In an effort to maintain continuity in the "Civil Aviation" series, a breakdown of the carriers into scheduled and non-scheduled is included in this report. Eastern Provincial Airways Ltd. and Nordair Ltd. are included with Group III for statistical purposes (because they did not operate scheduled routes during 1962) although the scale of their services qualifies these carriers for Group II.

As Group V carriers file reports on a quarterly basis only, data on their operations are not available for monthly publication but are shown in a special table in the monthly report four times a year.

These statistics are not included, however, in industry totals shown in other tables throughout the report. For consistency purposes, this practice has been followed in the preparation of this annual publication. The exclusion of the Group V carriers is not considered significant as the operating revenues of these carriers usually amount to less than 3 per cent of the operating revenues of all Canadian carriers.

Domestic and international operations of Canadian carriers are combined in all tables except number 5, in which all the information available for each type of operation has been assembled.

Whenever feasible, the unit toll services are broken down into scheduled and non-scheduled. However, a complete breakdown is not possible as some carriers offer both services on specific routes. In such cases, the route is assigned to the class of service which predominates.

Statistics on traffic transported into and out of Canada by foreign carriers are presented in Table 6, by geographic area. This distribution has been made possible by the co-operation of the airlines which now provide separate traffic statistics for each area of service.

Financial statistics of Canadian carriers are shown in Tables 8 to 16. These data are presented in accordance with the "Uniform System of Accounts and Reports for Commercial Air Carriers" introduced in 1960.

Table 18 is designed to provide separate data on companies which operate helicopters only. It has been estimated that these companies operate approximately 64 per cent of all helicopters engaged in commercial services in Canada. Helicopters flown by firms which also have fixed wing aircraft are excluded.

Review of 1962 Operations

The number of revenue passengers transported by Canadian air carriers during the year under review increased 6.4 per cent to 5,268,799 in 1962. The volume of revenue goods rose to 236,578,023 lbs. (118,289 tons) an increase of 3.7 per cent. Revenue hours flown showed a slight decline to 626,302 from 631,412 but revenue miles flown were up 1.8 per cent to 99,317,367. Unit toll operations showed a decline in hours flown while there was a slight increase in bulk services. However, freight carried on unit toll services rose 15.1 per cent to 93,064,818 lbs. (46,532 tons) while bulk freight declined 5.8 per cent to 105,082,430 lbs. (52,541 tons).

Revenue passengers carried on unit toll services rose to 4,792,409, an increase of 5.5 per cent; and passengers carried on bulk trips rose to 476,390, an increase of 16.8 per cent.

Despite the drop in revenue miles flown on unit toll services, revenue passenger miles flown increased 9.7 per cent to 3,463,727,291 while the goods ton-miles rose 15.4 per cent to 60,716,992.

The six scheduled carriers transported 5.3 per cent more revenue passengers and 13.1 per cent more revenue goods in 1962 than in the previous year (Table 2). Passengers carried totalled 4,695,464 and goods aggregated 142,192,333 lbs. (71,096 tons) compared with 90,830,190 passengers and 125,744,000 lbs. (62,872 tons) of goods in the previous year.

Foreign airlines licensed to operate in Canada carried into and out of this country during 1962, 795,275 revenue passengers (up 0.8 per cent) and 23,505,980 lbs. (11,753 tons) of revenue goods (up 6.9 per cent from 1961) (Table 2).

Operating revenues and expenses of Canadian carriers reached an all time high in 1962 (Table 1). Revenues increased 11.7 per cent to \$284,618,321 while expenses rose 7.7 per cent to \$277,333,944. As a result, an operating income of \$7,284,377 was reported for the first time in three years. However,

after deductions for income taxes and other charges were made, there was a net deficit of \$4,597,327 compared with a deficit of \$13,146,423 for 1961.

Total assets of Canadian carriers (Table 8) as at December 31st 1962 were valued at \$363,817,740. This is a decrease of \$2.4 million from the previous year.

Companies operating helicopters only (Table 18) reported an operating income of \$369,507, and a net income after provision for income taxes and other charges of \$283,401, in 1962 compared with an operating income of \$481,792 and net income of \$280,586 during 1961. These companies had total assets of \$6,755,299 at the end of 1962 compared to \$6,971,240 the previous year.

For the first time, the number of aircraft owned and leased by Canadian carriers are presented in this report (Table 19) by group of carrier, by category of aircraft and weight group.


Commercial aircraft were involved in 107 accidents of all types in 1962 as against 118 in 1961. The majority of these were attributed to errors of pilots or crew members. The number of fatal accidents was one less than the previous year, but the number of persons killed rose to 50 from 34. Accidents occurring to all aircraft registered in Canada (including aircraft engaged in non-commercial operations) totalled 281 in 1962 compared with 320 a year earlier.



CIVIL AVIATION DEFINITIONS

Unit Toll Transportation	Public transportation of passengers and goods at a toll per unit. It includes: (i) the scheduled services, which provide public transportation between designated points in accordance with a schedule (Class 1); and (ii) the non-scheduled services, which provide public transportation either between designated points on a route pattern and with some degree of regularity (Class 2) or from a designated base to serve a defined area or a specific point or points (Class 3).
Bulk Transportation	 (1) Public transportation of passengers or goods from a designated base at a toll per mile or per hour for the charter of the entire aircraft (Class 4); and (2) Transportation of passengers and goods in accordance with one or more specific contracts (Class 5).
Specialty Flying Services	Non-transportation flying services, such as flying training, aerial photography, aerial pest control and aerial advertising (Class 7).
Scheduled Carriers	Carriers operating a scheduled (Class1) service.
Non-Scheduled Carriers	Carriers not operating any scheduled (Class 1) service.
Classification of Canadian Carriers:	
Group I Carriers	Trans-Canada Air Lines and Canadian Pacific Air Lines.
Group II Carriers	All other carriers licensed to perform scheduled (Class 1) service plus one major transport carrier: Nordair Ltd.
Group III Carriers	All carriers with gross annual flying revenues of \$400,000 and over which are not included in Group I and II.
Group IV Carriers	All carriers having gross annual flying revenues of \$60,000 and over but less than \$400,000 and, in addition, any carrier licensed to perform unit toll service with gross annual flying revenues under \$60,000.
Group V Carriers	All carriers other than those licensed to perform unit toll service with gross annual flying revenues of less than \$60,000.
Passenger	A person occupying a separate seat on a one-way trip. For statistical purposes an infant-in-arms is not considered a passenger and a round trip passenger is counted as two passengers.
Revenue Passenger	A child or adult for which a fare or part of a fare is paid.
Non-Revenue Passenger	A child or adult carried on a revenue transportation flight for whom no fare is collected, including company personnel.
Air Cargo	Air freight and air express.
Goods	Air cargo plus excess baggage and air mail.
Tons	Short tons of 2,000 lbs.
Miles	Statute miles of 5,280 ft.
Passenger-Mile	The transportation of one passenger over the distance of one mile.
Available Seat-Miles	Seats available for the transportation of passengers multiplied by the miles flown on each inter-station trip.
	Ratio of revenue passenger-miles performed to available seat-miles.
Ton-Mile	The transportation of one ton of load over the distance of one mile.
Available Load	Load capacity available for the transportation of goods and passengers after deduction of the operating load of gas and oil, crew, stewards' supplies, etc.
Available Ton-Miles	Available load capacity multiplied by miles flown on each inter-station trip.
Weight Load Factor	Ratio of revenue ton-miles performed to available ton-miles.
Interline Traffic	Passengers and goods received by a carrier either from foreign carriers (foreign interline) or from other Canadian carriers (domestic interline) or from other operating divisions of the same carrier (division interline).
International Services:	
Trans-Border Services	Services between Canada and the United States.
Southern Services	Services between Canada and Bermuda, the Caribbean, Mexico or South America.
Trans-Atlantic and Polar Services	Services between Canada and Europe
Pacific and Orient Services	Services between Canada and points in the Pacific Ocean or the Orient.
Five Freedoms of the Air:	
First Freedom	The right to fly over the territory of a foreign country without landing.
Second Freedom	The right to land on the territory of a foreign country for non-traffic purposes.
Third Freedom	The right to put down in a foreign country, passengers, mail and cargo taken on in the territory of the state whose nationality the aircraft possesses.
Fourth Freedom	The right to take on in a foreign country, passengers, mail and cargo destined for the territory of the state whose nationality the aircraft possesses.
Fifth Freedom	The right to take on in a foreign country, passengers, mail and cargo destined for the territory of any other foreign state and the right to put down in a foreign country, passengers, mail and cargo coming from any such territory.

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
