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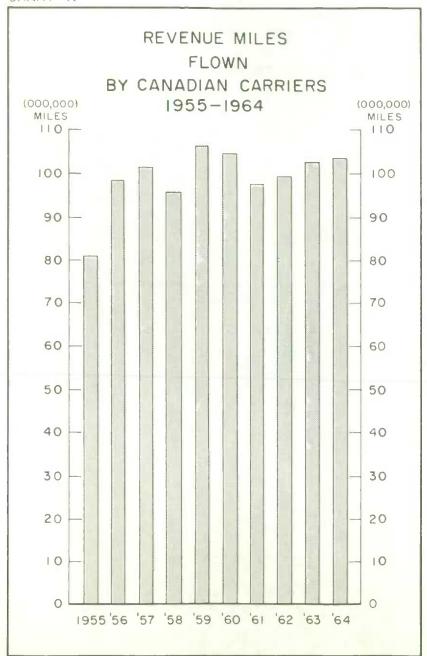
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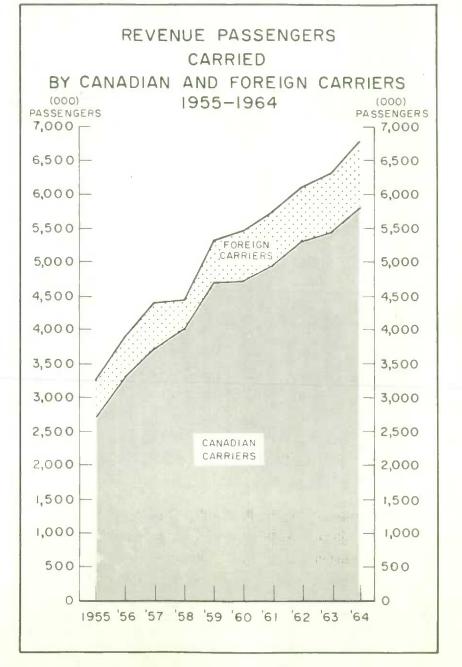

INTRODUCTION

The figures presented in this publication cover the operating and financial data submitted by Canadian and foreign air carriers doing business within Canada or between Canada and other countries. Statistics of Canadian airlines include both their domestic and international flights while figures for foreign companies cover their hours and miles flown over Canadian territory only. Passengers and goods in transit through Canada are not included. Because the coverage given to Canadian airlines differs from that given to foreign airlines the statistics shown under similar headings are not directly comparable.

The five groups of Canadian air carriers used in this report are based on gross annual flying revenues and the type of service (scheduled or non-scheduled) performed. Definitions of these groups and of other terms used are given on the last page of the publication. The number of Canadian carriers which submitted annual reports for 1964 in each group is as follows:

The total number of air carriers varies from year to year (in 1963 reports were submitted by 390 companies). Reasons for this fluctuation are entries, withdrawals and amalgamations of small air lines. Changes in the number of small firms are of little significance in the total figures for all categories but there can be significant changes within groups and from one group to another depending upon the activities of individual companies. These changes tend to produce distortions in comparisons of specific groups over a period of years.

Although groups are defined according to revenue and whether services are scheduled or non-scheduled there are exceptions to the definitions. For instance, Nordair Ltd. is included with Group III for statistical purposes because it did not operate scheduled routes during 1964 even though its revenue was sufficient to qualify the company as a Group II carrier.

Since Group V carriers file reports on a quarterly basis only, data on their operations are not available for monthly publication but are shown in a special table in the monthly report for March, June, September and December. This Group V information is not included however, in totals for all carriers shown in other tables throughout the report. To be consistent with the monthly publications this practice has been continued in the annual report. Although they are by far the largest Group in terms of

numbers, the Group V carriers are not significant in terms of revenue; their reported operating revenues usually amount to less than 4 per cent of the total operating revenues of all Canadian carriers.

Domestic operations are not shown separately from international operations of Canadian carriers except in Table 5. In this table statistics are categorized according to areas of service.

Wherever it is practical to do so, figures for services sold on a unit toll basis are subdivided into scheduled operations and non-scheduled operations. However, a complete breakdown is not possible because some air carriers offer both types of service on different routes. In such cases the route is designated scheduled or non-scheduled according to the class of service which predominates.

Bulk flying operations include additional detail in this issue. For the first time bulk passenger-miles and bulk goods ton-miles have been listed separately.

Financial statistics of Canadian carriers which are shown in Tables 8 to 16 are collected and compiled according to definitions and procedures outlined in a manual entitled "Uniform System of Accounts and Reports for Commercial Air Carriers".

For the first time Table 17 "Specialty Flying Services - Groups I to IV" indicates whether these services were performed by fixed-wing aircraft or by helicopters.

Table 18 "Statistical Summary of Canadian Carriers Operating Helicopters, Groups I to IV" has been altered to include the operating statistics and balance sheet items of the helicopter operations of carriers operating both helicopters and fixed-wing aircraft. The statement of income for helicopter-only carriers normally found in this table has not been published because of a lack of space but it Is available on request.

Name change

Although Trans-Canada Air Lines announced in 1964 that it was going to change its official name to Air Canada, the switch did not become officially effective until January 1, 1965. For this reason, the old name of Trans-Canada Air Lines has been used in the tables.

Review of 1964 Operations

The number of revenue passengers transported by Canadian air carriers during 1964 (the year under review) increased 6.5 per cent to 5,782,088 from 1963. The volume of revenue goods carried rose to 135,213 tons, an increase of 7.7 per cent. Revenue hours flown showed an increase to 661,508 from 630,573 and revenue miles were up 0.9 per cent to 103,451,614. Unit toll operations showed an in-

crease in hours flown of 0.7 per cent. Freight carried on unit toll services rose 18.6 per cent to 58,749 tons while bulk freight decreased 3.6 per cent to 53,062 tons.

Revenue passengers carried on unit toll services rose to 5,197,579 an increase of 6.8 per cent; and passengers carried on bulk trips rose to 584,509 an increase of 3.9 per cent.

Revenue miles flown on unit toll services increased 0.9 per cent to 76,404,782 while revenue passenger-miles increased 8.7 per cent to 3,939,075,129 and goods ton-miles increased 26.2 per cent to 89,805,590.

The six scheduled carriers transported 7.0 per cent more revenue passengers and 12.2 per cent more revenue goods in 1964 than in the previous year (Table 2). Passengers carried totalled 5,248,038 and the weight of goods aggregated 87,207 tons compared with 4,906,134 passengers and 77,743 tons of goods in the previous year.

Foreign airlines licensed to operate in Canada carried into and out of this country during 1964 a total of 992,564 revenue passengers (up 16.6 per cent) and 15,534 tons of revenue goods up 25.1 per cent from 1963 (Table 2).

Operating revenues and expenses of Canadian carriers reached an all time high in 1964 (Table 1). Revenues increased 8.4 per cent to \$334,930,874 while expenses rose 7.3 per cent to \$315,569,629.

As a result an all time high operating income of \$19,361,245 was reported. After deductions for income taxes and other charges, there was a net income of \$8,393,110 compared with an income of \$1,390,060 for 1963.

Total assets of Canadian carriers (Table 8) as at December 31st 1964 were valued at \$371,064,840 which represents an increase from 1963 of \$7,333,455.

Helicopters

Beginning in 1964 statistics for Specialty Flying services (Table 17) have been broken down into specialty flying by fixed wing aircraft and helicopters.

Companies operating helicopters only and helicopters in conjunction with fixed wing (Table 18) have been included in Table 18 for the first time, a statement of income for these carriers may be obtained on request. The helicopter—only companies had total assets of \$10,143,995 at the end of 1964 compared to \$6,937,629 the previous year.

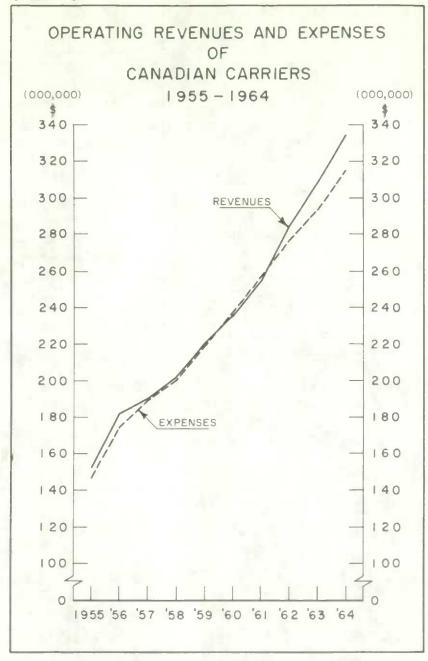
Accidents

Commercial aircraft were involved in 105 accidents of all types in 1964 as against 104 in 1963. Over 50 per cent of these were attributed to errors of pilots or crew members. Although the number of accidents remained almost the same the number of fatal accidents decreased in 1964 from 211 to 78. Accidents occurring to all aircraft registered in Canada (including aircraft engaged in non-commercial operations) totalled 268 in 1964 compared with 259 a year earlier.

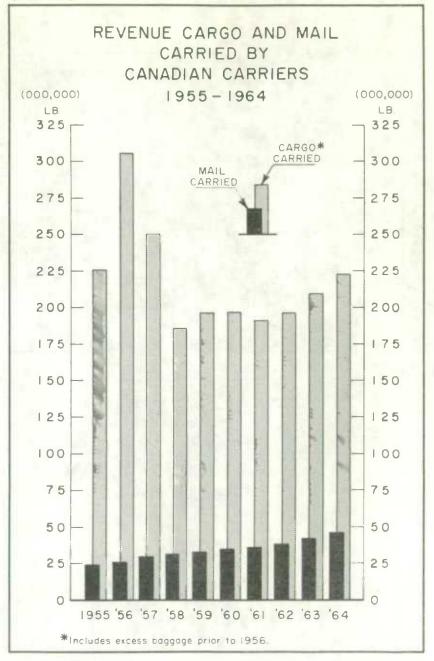

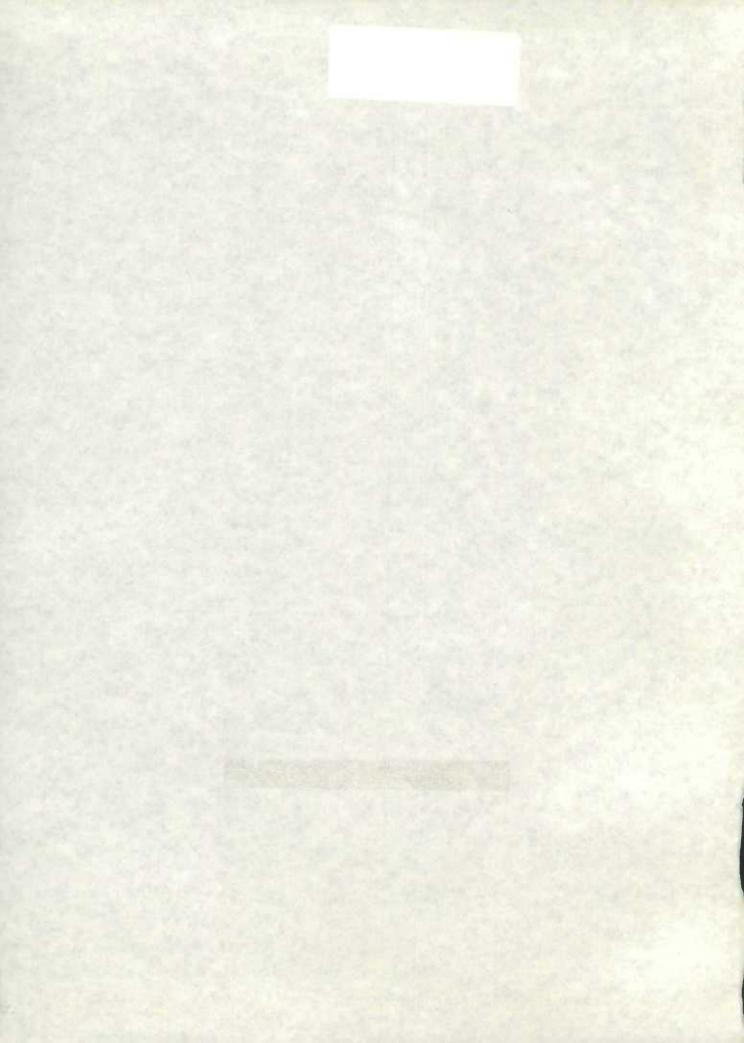
CIVIL AVIATION DEFINITIONS

Bulk Transportation	 (1) Public transportation of passengers or goods from a designated base at a toll per mile or per hour for the charter of the entire aircraft (Class 4); and (2) Transportation of passengers and goods in accordance with one or more specific contracts (Class 5).
Cargo, Air	Air freight and air express.
Carrier, Air	
Carrier, Non-scheduled	Any person who operates aircraft in or over Canada for hire or reward. Carriers not operating any scheduled (Class 1) service.
Carrier, Scheduled	Air Carriers serving designated points in accordance with a service schedule and at a toll per unit.
Express, Air	It is a package service operated within the U.S.A. and Canada only; the rates cover door-to-door service. Because Air Express shipments are carried on all flights and take priority over Air Freight and because Express shipments receive priority on the ground too, they take higher rates.
Freedoms of the Air:	
First Freedom	The right to fly over the territory of a foreign country without landing.
Second Freedom	The right to land on the territory of a foreign country for non-traffic purposes.
Third Freedom	The right to put down in a foreign country, passengers, mail and cargo taken on in the territory of the state whose nationality the aircraft possesses.
Fourth Freedom	The right to take on in a foreign country, passengers, mail and cargo destined for the territory of the state whose nationality the aircraft possesses.
Fifth Freedom	The right to take on in a foreign country, passengers, mail and cargo destined for the territory of any other foreign state and the right to put down in a foreign country, passengers, mail and cargo coming from any such territory.
Freight, Air	Articles carried on regular flights at standard per pound rates when space is available.
Goods	Air cargo (freight and express) plus mail and excess baggage.
Group I Carriers	Canadian Air Carriers licensed to perform both domestic and international scheduled services. (Air Canada and Canadian Pacific Air Lines Ltd.).
Group II Carriers	Canadian Air Carriers other than Group I carriers licensed to perform domestic scheduled services and Nordair Ltd.
Group III Carriers	Canadian Air Carriers licensed to perform non-scheduled services with gross annual flying revenues of \$500,000 or over (excepting air carriers included in Group 1 and 11).
Group IV Carriers	Canadian Air Carriers licensed to perform non-scheduled services with gross annual flying revenues of \$100,000 and over, but less than \$500,000.
Group V Carriers	Canadian Air Carriers licensed to perform non-scheduled services with gross annual flying revenues of less than \$100,000.
Interline Traffic:	
Divisional Interline	Passengers and goods received from other operating divisions of the same carrier.
Domestic Interline	Passengers and goods received by a carrier at Canadian points from other Canadian Air Carriers.
Foreign Interline	Passengers and goods received by a carrier from Foreign Air Carriers.
International Services:	
Pacific and Orient Services	Services between Canada and points in the Pacific Ocean or the Orient.
Southern Services	Services between Canada and Bermuda, the Caribbean, Mexico, Central or South America.
Trans-Atlantic and Polar Services	Services between Canada and Europe.
Trans-border Services	Services between Canada and the United States.
Load Capacity Available	Load capacity available for the transportation of goods and passengers after deduction of the operating load of gas and oil, crew, stewards' supplies, etc.
Miles	Statute miles of 5,280 ft.
Passenger	A person occupying a separate seat on a one-way trip. For statistical purposes an infant-in-arms is not considered a passenger. A round trip passenger is counted as two passengers.
Non-revenue Passenger	A child or adult carried on a revenue transportation flight for whom no fare is collected, including company personnel.
Revenue Passenger	A child or adult for which a fare or part of a fare is paid.
Passenger Load-factor	Ratio of revenue passenger-miles performed to available seat-miles.
Passenger-mile	The transportation of one passenger one mile.

CIVIL AVIATION DEFINITIONS - Concluded

Seat-miles Available:	Seats available for the transportation of passengers multiplied by the miles flown on each inter-station flight.
Specialty Flying Services:	Non-transportation flying services, such as flying training, aerial photography, aerial pest control and aerial advertising.
Tons	Short tons of 2,000 lbs.
Ton-miles	The transportation of one ton of goods one mile.
Ton-miles Available	Available load capacity multiplied by miles flown on each inter-station flight.
Unit Toll Transportation	Public transportation of passengers and goods at a toll per unit. It includes:
	(i) the scheduled services, which provide public transportation between designated points in accordance with a schedule (Class I); and
	(ii) the non-scheduled services, which provide public transportation either between designated points on a route pattern and with some degree of regularity (Class 2) or from a designated base to serve a defined area or a specific point or points (Class 3).
Weight Load Factor	Ratio of revenue ton-miles performed to available ton-miles.
