

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OPERATING REVENUES, EXPENSES & STATISTICS RAILWAYS IN CANADA WITH ANNUAL OPERATING REVENUES OF \$500,000 OR OVER

SEPTEMBER, 1950



Following sharply reduced revenues for August caused by the nine-day strike, earnings of Canadian railways reporting monthly rebounded to \$90,823,971 in September compared with \$64,864,106 in August, \$85,115,749 in July and \$79,455,261 for September of last year. The increase from the same month of 1949 was thus \$11,568,630 or 14.5 p.c., and the total under review is the highest ever racorded by the railroads for any month's operations. Operating expenses were only fractionally higher than one year earlier, rising from \$70,830,980 to \$71,062,461 or by \$231,481. Net operating revenue climbed to \$19,761,510 against \$8,624,301 in September of 1949, but tax accruals jumped from \$1,747,335 to \$6,226,117. The debit on hire of equipment eased \$401,248 to \$645,975 in a similar comparison while joint rents were \$73,509 higher at \$139,918. The resulting operating income for the month at \$12,749,500 was some \$6,986,166 better then for the same month of last year and is the most encouraging in post war years. For the first nine months of the current year a credit of \$44,409,171 is shown against \$6,208,311 in 1949, \$6,460,533 in 1948 and \$29,918,537 in the same period of 1947. In 1945 operating income to the end of September was nearly \$81,420,000.

Freight revenues for the month reached a record \$73,420,056, some 17.4 p.c. or \$10,868,062 above September, 1949. Passenger fares were off only 2 p.c. from \$7,584,320 to \$7,430,337. Mail revenue, including considerable retroactive mail pay, rose to \$1,327,144 from \$749,274 one year earlier. Express improved 2.2 p.c., while water line was up 11.2 p.c. Other passenger train receipts and the miscellaneous account declined slightly.

Most of the expense items were heavier but maintenance of way and structures charges decreased \$1,215,645 or 8.1 p.c. to \$13,799,312. Equipment maintenance required \$16,112,050 for the month or \$455,805 above September last year. Traffic and transportation expenses rose \$178.225 and \$619,143, respectively, with transportation totalling \$34,642,796. Miscellaneous operations were up 3.6 p.c., while general expenses advanced 4.3 p.c.

Revenue freight carried by the reporting lines totalled 14,267,821 tons, up 2.4 p.c. compared with a revised 13,932,234 tons for September last year, including Newfoundland. Ton miles increased only 1.5 p.c. as average haul was 567 miles against 370 last September. Revenue passengers aggregated some 10.5 p.c. or 272,014 less at 2,321,080, but average journey lengthened from 106 to 115 miles and passenger miles dropped only 2.6 p.c. to 267,516,000 miles for the month under review. Heavier use of aquipment was indicated in data on freight car miles which registered a gain of 6.3 p.c. in loaded car miles and a decrease of 12 p.c. in empty mileage.

Total pay roll for 185,342 employees advanced to \$44,210,197 compared with \$42,266,550 paid to 183,107 employees in September of 1949. Average earnings were \$238.55 against \$230.83 one year earlier.

Freight traffic has continued very active since the end of September and gives promise that the railways as a whole should record a much improved financial showing this year despite the strike.

CANADIAN NATIONAL MALLWAYS: With revenues increasing \$5,737,900 or 14.4 p.c. over September 1949 to \$45,558,600, and expenses up only \$2,086,214 or 5.5 p.c. at \$33,364,345, the Canadian National had an encouraging month and reported gross operating revenues greater than for any month on record. Tax accruals rose \$60,105 to \$670,868 but hire of equipment and rents were less. Operating income at \$6,420,069 compares with \$2,600,588 for September 1949 and \$2,426,165 in 1948.

Revenue from freight transported totalled \$36,508,000 or 19.5 p.c. above September of 1949. Revenue tonnage was up 5.4 p.c. and ton miles 5.5 p.c. Passenger receipts declined 6.9 p.c. or \$251,500 to \$5,452,500 but mail improved \$81,579 to \$412,061. Considerable second and third class mail had piled up during the strike and was moved early in the month. In pay real pay real for 106,766 employees was \$25,147,770, an increase of 8.7 p.c. above \$25,138,029 paid to 101,921 employees in September, 1949. Employees rose 4.8 p.c. or 4,845 in the same comparison. American lines of the System reported operating income of \$819,800 for the month against a loss of \$119,372 one year earlier. For the first three quarters of the current year the entire System had an operating income of \$20,959,884 compared with a debit of \$6,314,376 last year. Canadian lines take credit for \$15,772,544 of the total against a loss of \$7,356,642 to the end of September, 1949 - a remarkable recovery of \$23.1 millions due to higher rates and increased freight traffic.

CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY COMPANY: Operating revenues advanced \$4,358,204 or 13.5 p.c. over the previous September to \$36,711,912, while expenses declined 7.3 p.c. or \$2,138,597 to \$26,992,014. The net operating income for the month was a healthy \$9,719,898 but railway tax accruals took a lusty bite of \$4,930,000 and with other charges and credits, operating income was \$4,926,268, or \$2,710,632 above September, 1949 with \$2,215,636. This is the best showing of any month back to November of 1948, and is the highest September since 1944. Freight receipts at \$29,866,818 were up 14.4 p.c. or \$3,761,428, passenger 3.6 p.c., express 21.3 p.c., while mail, including ratroactive payments, jumped from \$340,394 to \$831,904. Maintenence of way and structures, down 21.9 p.c. from the previous September, took \$5,194,428 during the month, of which \$1 million was from deferred account, while equipment required \$6,066,557 compared with \$6,803,227 one year earlier and \$100,000 listed as from deferred. Traffic charges rose but transportation eased slightly at \$12,779,927 against \$12,862,109. Fevenue freight carried declined 6.4 p.c. in tomage, partly due to a later harvest while ton miles essed 5.2 p.c. Passengers declined 12 p.c. in number but mileage advanced 3.7 p.c., with average journey up from 126 to 148 miles. Empty freight car mileage was reduced sharply. Total pay roll required \$16,337,697 for 68,224 employees compared with \$16,530,517 for 70,975 one year earlier, representing a decrease of 1.2 p.c. in pay roll and 3.9 p.c. in employment
