PREFACE

Annual railway transport statistics in Canada are published in a series of six reports each of which covers specific aspects of the industry; services and equipment available, traffic handled, the labour force involved and the financial aspects of railways operating in this country.

Statistics on railways have been collected and published in Canada since 1875, first by the Department of Railways and Canals until 1918, and by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics since its inception in 1918. During this time the data have been published in varying degrees of detail. Until 1950 one volume contained all railway statistical data. In 1951 there were three; 1952-1957 there were five, and since 1958 six separate parts have been required to reflect these annual operations. The present report encompasses the following six parts which are not necessarily released in the order they are numbered.

- Part I. Railway Transport Summary Statistics (Five years)
 - II. Railway Transport Financial Statistics
 - III. Railway Transport Equipment, Track and Fuel Statistics
 - IV. Railway Transport Operating and Traffic Statistics
 - V. Railway Transport Commodity Statistics
 - VI. Railway Transport Employment Statistics

Several other annual reports and three periodicals dealing with rail transportation are also available. A list of all titles published in this field is located on the inside cover of each report.

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics is indebted to the individual railway companies operating across the nation which have prepared and submitted their data for inclusion in this statistical series; to the Railway Association of Canada for its cooperation; and to the Railway Transport Committee of the Canadian Transport Commission, with which joint collection arrangements exist, for their promotion of the uniform accounting principles used for rail statistical purposes.

PART I

(Comparative Summary Statistics 1965-69)

Presented in this report is a five-year summary of statistics pertaining to all aspects of common

carrier railway operations in Canada during the period 1965-1969 inclusive.

TECHNICAL NOTES AND DEFINITIONS

The term, "common carrier" as referred to herein indicates any railway which holds itself out to the public to transport passengers and/or goods for compensation.

Financial data pertaining to the Cartier Railway has never been available for inclusion in Parts II and VI of this annual series. However, details of physical characteristics and work performed by that road have been shown in Parts III, IV and V and for the years 1964-1966 were presented independently of industry aggregates. To enable more meaningful comparisons of statistics, revisions have been made to include the Cartier (except in the case of financial data) throughout the historical detail appearing in this report.

To eliminate duplicate reporting and to uncover statistical gaps, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics uses the Canadian Standard Industrial Classification (S.I.C.), (Catalogue No. 12-501) which provides a set of groups and classes suitable for the compilation of statistics related to different industries. The building block (reporting unit) which is fitted into the above structure is the "establishment". An establishment can be defined as the smallest unit which is a separate operating entity capable of reporting principal elements of input and output. While the establishment is typically a factory, mine, store or similar unit and in most

cases is a separate firm, it may encompass two or more operating units which are not necessarily in the same location. It can also be an individual working on his own account.

Industry 506, Railway Transport, as classified in the S.I.C. includes establishments primarily engaged in operating railways. The kinds of activities normally carried on by railway establishments embrace the operation of commuter service (but not street railways), maintenance of way and structures, maintenance of equipment (including that carried on in railway shops) dining car and sleeping car services, freight, express and the operation of railterminal facilities. Truck transportation services operated by railway establishments and providing pick-up and delivery for the freight or express services of the railway are included in this industry but long distance trucking operations owned by railway companies are usually set up as separate establishments classified to the trucking industry and included under S.I.C. industry 507. Truck Transport.

Commercial communications facilities providing service to the general public as well as to the railway are treated as separate establishments and are included in S.I.C. Industries 544, Telephone Systems and 545, Telegraph and Cable Systems.

STATISTICAL ANALYSIS

Track Operated

The total point-to-point first main track mileage of line-haul railways in Canada (including mileage operated jointly by two or more roads) was 43,613 at the close of 1969 up 445 miles from the previous year. The total route mileage of all tracks operated by these rail lines, including main track, industrial track and sidings, aggregated 59,114, up 456 miles during the last year and 712 miles over the five-year period. The bulk of this growth occurred in Alberta and the Northwest Territories.

Investment, Capital and Reserves

Net investment for the year 1969 in road and equipment property was \$280.5 million, an increase of \$94.7 million over 1968 and \$69.4 million over 1967 which was the previous high year. This increase reflects higher road investment as new investment in equipment continued below that of most recent years. Cumulative investment reached \$8,066 million, up from \$7,285 million in 1965.

On December 31, 1969 the capital stock of railways was recorded as \$5,388 million, up \$87 million over 1968. Funded debt guaranteed by both the Federal and Provincial Governments were down again in 1969 by 7.2 per cent and 4.5 per cent, respectively. Reserves, other liabilities, and deferred credits at \$2,889 million were \$100 million more than at the end of 1968 and \$464 million above those shown four years earlier. Amounts set aside for depreciation, which accounted for 91 per cent of total reserves, increased by \$90 million in 1969. In 1965 depreciation accounted for 90 per cent of all reserves.

Financial Summary

Railway operating revenues at \$1,584 million in 1969 represented a record high for the industry, 3.6 per cent above the previous year and 15.4 per cent higher than in 1965. Operating expenses including both rents and taxes, rose even more rapidly to \$1,496 millions, up 4.1 per cent from 1968 and 15.8 per cent over the 1965 total. As a result railway operating income eased to \$87.7 million in 1969 compared with \$91.2 million in 1968, but up from \$80.5 million in 1965. However as total funded debt rose to \$2,425 million from \$2,188 million in 1965 and interest rates kept climbing, fixed charges rose even more sharply. As a result, net income after fixed charges, rents, etc., was down at \$38.8 million from \$50.4 million in 1965.

Freight revenues, excluding payments relating to the National Transportation Act at \$1,331 million, increased 5.0 per cent over 1968, while pasenger revenues at \$63.0 million eased 1.7 per cent from 1968 and 4.2 per cent from the 1965 figure.

Excluded throughout this report are passenger details respecting "GO Transit," an expanded rail commuter service inaugurated May 23, 1967 by the Province of Ontario and operating between Hamilton and Pickering under an agreement with Canadian National. Passenger revenues relative to this service would have added \$1.3 million to 1967 passenger revenues, \$2.6 million to 1968, and \$3.0 million to the 1969 total.

Transportation expenses, the largest of the expense accounts rose \$36.3 million from 1968 to \$582.6 million in 1969, up 6.6 per cent from 1968 and 18.1 per cent over the 1965 figure. Road and equipment maintenance costs were also higher in 1969.

Traffic

Tonnages of revenue freight by rail (including traffic interchanged between Canadian lines but excluding intermediate switching) showed a decline of 4.1 per cent from the previous year. Ton-miles (a practical measure of the volume of freight service performed) however was up, aggregating 96.5 billion, an increase of 1.4 per cent over 1968 and 8.4 per cent above those generated in 1965.

Major decreases in tonnage were registered by iron ore and copper-nickel ores, as strikes were a major factor in 1969. Sizeable decreases were also registered by wheat and coal while significant increases occurred in carryings of pulpwood, woodpulp, barley and vehicle parts.

Passenger travel continued to decline with a 5.5 per cent dip in passengers carried and an 8.5 per cent drop in passenger miles as commuter traffic continues to holdup better than long distance travel. The average passenger journey dropped to 123.8 miles from 128.0 miles in 1968.

Equipment

Freight carrying cars in service at December 31, 1969 (including privately-owned units) totalled 188,269, virtually unchanged from the previous year, but 5,583 more than at the close of 1965. The average capacity of these cars over the same periods increased 0.6 and 2.9 tons respectively.

The number of passenger cars in service declined, dropping by 57 units between 1968 and 1969 and by 705 cars over the five-year period.

Locomotives in service changed very little from 1965 to 1969 dropping by 24 units to 3,316. By 1965 all common carrier railways operating in Canada had completely eliminated their steam locomotives.

Fuels

Consumption of diesel oil by locomotives in 1969 was virtually unchanged from 1968 at 414.3 million gallons, but was 3.2 per cent over the 1965 total. During 1969 the railways used no coal, fuel oil or crude oil and very little gasoline. The latter was consumed entirely by rail motor cars. The cost of diesel oil per gallon increased slightly in 1969 to 13.8 cents from 13.6 cents in 1968 and 13.4 cents in 1965.

Accidents

Deaths in the industry resulting from train accidents declined to 195 in 1969 from 215 in 1968 and 229 in 1965. Injuries were also lower at 1.852 compared with 1,910 in 1968 and 2,082 in 1965. Most of the reduction in injuries occurred among passengers as employee injuries were little changed from the 1965 total.

A total of 109,614 days were lost by employees through both train and non-train accidents in 1969 compared to 109,081 days in 1968 and 102,804 days in 1965.

Highway Crossings

Highway crossings in Canada at the close of 1969 aggregated 33,943 as against 33,963 in the preceding year and 33,848 in 1965.
