



## PART VI

(Employment Statistics)

Presented in this report are employment statistics of common carrier railways operating in Canada for the calendar year 1961. On pages 6 to 9 are details concerning the two class I roads, the Canadian National Railways and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, while on pages 10 and 11 are those of nineteen class II railways (others having average gross revenues of \$500,000 or more annually). Statistics of class III and IV carriers (those averaging less than \$500,000 annually and other companies such as terminal, bridge, tunnel and pullman) are shown in condensed form on page 14.

The classification of employees followed in reporting the data contained herein is that prescribed by the Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada and the Dominion Bureau of Statistics entitled, "Canadian Classification of Railway Employees and their Compensation", which became effective January 1, 1956. To assist in interpreting the data given, the method of compilation used generally by the reporting railways is explained briefly in the following paragraph.

For the "Number of Employees - Monthly Average", as shown in column one in this report, employees are counted once each month and the average of the twelve monthly counts for each division are entered. Employees whose assigned day off may fall on the day of the count and employees absent on vacation or leave with pay are included in the count; employees on leave without pay are excluded. Under "Time on Duty", the number of hours actually worked, or held for duty under pay, are ascertained and recorded for each class of employee. Holidays and part holidays not worked, vacations, absences on leave, etc., whether paid for or not, are excluded. Meal periods are included when paid for but excluded when not paid for. The column headed, "Total Compensation" contains salaries and wages earned by the employees and charged to operating, capital and other accounts, including vacations and holidays with pay and before deduction for income tax, unemployment insurance, etc.

Compensation data for 1961, as presented in this report, reflects certain retroactive wage increases relative to the year 1960. As part of a two-year agreement entered into during 1961 by Canadian railways and unions representing non-operating employees, the latter were awarded two cents per hour from January 1 to August 31, 1960 and a further five cents per hour from September 1 to December 31, 1960. Amounts so included, by division totals, are presented in the following table.

Railway employment in Canada continued to decline in 1961, dropping 5.4 per cent to an average 166,081 persons from 175,537 in 1960. The aggregate payroll, on the other hand, rose to \$748,097,831, an increase of 1.0 per cent above that of the previous year. The average hourly wage per employee was \$2.26, up 15 cents from 1960, and average annual earnings increased to \$4,504 per person in contrast to \$4,218 a year earlier.

The Canadian National Railways employed an average of 92,238 persons during the year under review, a 4.1 per cent decline from 96,227 in 1960. The total time on duty dropped 3.8 per cent to 182,917,794 hours from 190,064,711, while salaries and wages aggregated \$411,275,133, up 2.8 per cent from \$400,057,088 a year earlier. C.N.R. employees worked an average of 1,983 hours as against 1,975 in 1960 and the average hourly rate was \$2.25 in contrast to \$2.10. Annual earnings per employee averaged \$4,458, up from \$4,157 in the previous year.

The Canadian Pacific Railway Company also reported a decline in the average number of employees on payroll, dropping 6.3 per cent to 63,694 from 67,973 in 1960. The number of hours worked were down 7.0 per cent to 126,683,407 from 136,280,399 but the total compensation paid rose slightly to \$284,276,315 from \$284,012,292. On the average, C.P.R. employees worked fewer hours during 1961, dropping to 1,989 from 2,005 in 1960, and received an average wage of \$2.24 per hour as against \$2.08 a year earlier. The average annual salary was \$4,463 in contrast to \$4,178.

The number of persons employed by class II railways declined 8.7 per cent to 9,461 in 1961 from 10,615 in 1960 and time on duty decreased to 20,029,101 hours from 23,678,310. The average hourly and annual wage rates rose to \$2.48 and \$5,260, respectively, as compared with \$2.26 and \$5,048 in 1960.


