

1938

After showing increases for four successive years, gross revenues of Canadian railways for 1958 declined to \$556,855,400 from \$555,105,271 for the previous year. Earnings for September and October were larger than in 1957 but for all other months decreases were recorded. Operating expenses were reduced by \$4,946,910 or from \$500,652,548 in 1957 to \$295,705,658. Maintenance of way and structures and maintenance of equipment were reduced by \$5,091,798 and \$5,958,546 respectively, but transportation expenses were increased by \$1,239,155 despite a reduction in revenue train miles of 1.5 per cent, in revenue ton miles and in passenger miles. This was due largely to restoration of reductions of basic wage rates. These restorations were made as follows: two per cent April 1, 1957; one per cent June 1, 1957; one per cent August 1, 1957; one per cent December 1, 1957; three per cent February 1, 1958 and two per cent April 1, 1958. This completed the reduction of ten per cent which had been in effect for several years.

Railway taxes showed a reduction of \$509,117 or from \$10,045,535 to \$9,736,416. Interest charges increased from \$77,819,294 in 1957 to \$79,215,535 and the net corporate income transferred to profit and loss account was a debit of \$55,025,359 compared with a debit of \$51,222,715 for 1957. The large debit in

this item was \$54,470,997 for the Canadian National System which was computed on the same basis as in 1937 but which is not comparable with debits of previous years as explained in the 1937 report.

There was practicelly no change in the monthly average miles of road operated, elthough at the close of the year there was a net increase of 15.48 miles. Freight train miles were reduced by 5.8 per cent and passenger train miles were increased by 5.0 per cent. Tons of revenue freight carried declined from 82,220,574 tons in 1937 to 76,175,305 tons. Agricultural products showed an increase of 3,800,099 tons but other groups showed decreases, particularly manufactures and miscellaneous, which declined from 25,170,702 tons to 19,786,746 tons; about half of this decrease was in foreign freight, including imports and in-transit freight. Because of the increase in the long-haul grain traffic the decrease in revenue ton miles was less than one per cent, despite the decrease in total tons carried of 7.3 per cent. The number of passengers carried decreased by 1,127,513 or 5.1 per cent and passenger miles declined by 7.6 per cent.

The number of employees was reduced from 153,467 for 1937 to 127,824 or by 5,643 or 4.2 per cent. The pay roll, however, was increased by \$1,752,767. The average hourly wage of those employees on an hourly basis was 62.1 cents or 6.7 per cent above the 1957 average and the average daily wage of general officers, clerks, and all employees on a daily or monthly wage was \$5.91 or 5.8 per cent above the 1957 average.

Four passengers, 45 employees and 235 other persons were killed in train accidents during the year, compared with 4 passengers, 59 employees and 268 other persons killed in 1937. The number of persons injured in train accidents decreased from 2,120 in 1937 to 1,741 or by 17.9 per cent. Accidents at highway

crossings resulted in 96 fatalities and 235 persons injured, compared with 117 fatalities and 338 injured in 1937. These accidents for 1958 included 85 motorists, 10 pedestrians and 1 trainman killed and 205 motorists, 24 occupants of other vehicles, 3 pedestrians and 3 trainmen and passengers injured. These motorists will be classed in vital statistics as motor vehicle accidents. The classifications have no connection with the person or company responsible for the accident; in many cases motorists drive in front of trains or crash into the sides of moving trains and are here classed as highway crossing accidents to motorists.

The instructions on reporting accidents are to count as deaths persons dying from the results within 24 hours of the accident. All other serious injuries are to be reported as injuries. Injuries include employees who are absent more than three days in the aggregate during the ten days immediately following the accident and for other persons those whose injuries prevent them from following his or her customary mode of living for more than one day. During the year 11 employees, 5 trespassers and 1 other person were injured and subsequently died from the results of train accidents, also 7 persons committed suicide which were not included in the above statistics.

In non-train accidents such as when handling rails, ties, or other material, or in the railway shops, freight sheds, etc., 11 persons were killed and 4,139 persons were injured. Of the total number killed, 9 were employees, and of the injured 4,063 were employees, shopmen and trackmen comprising the major portion of both deaths and injuries.

Employees were absent from work because of injuries for 142,502 days compared with 159,332 days in 1957.

In non-train accidents, 4 persons committed suicide and 2 others attempted suicide, which are not included in the total persons killed and injured.


