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
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
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MOTOR TRANSPORT TRAFFIC - BY COMMODITIES

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This quarterly publication has been designed to provide commodity detail which has become available from the sample surveys of commercial motor vehicles conducted in each of the ten provinces on a continuing quarterly basis. For a complete description of the original design of the sample as well as the methods and procedures, reference should be made to the publication "Motor Transport Traffic - National Estimates, 1957", Catalogue No. 53-207.

In the quarterly publications for 1963 intercity operations (both for hire and private) were divided into two sets of data, the first set included the urban movements of intercity licenced vehicles, the second set excluded the urban movements of intercity licenced vehicles. In the 1964 quarterly publications the urban movements of intercity vehicles were excluded. Similarly the publications for 1965 exclude these urban movements.

The quarterly series covers the operation of intercity vehicles, both private and for hire. The operations of vehicles classed as farm and urban are described in the annual Motor Transport Traffic reports but are excluded from this publication. For both for hire and private intercity vehicles data are broken down to show operations on trips up to and including 50 miles and on trips over 50 miles as well as total operations.

Appendix A contains the list of commodities into which all freight transported by for hire trucks are grouped. Appendix B contains the list of commodities into which all freight transported by private intercity trucks are grouped. These lists are based on the Standard Commodity Classification Manual published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The Standard Commodity Classification class numbers are included to facilitate comparison with other Dominion Bureau of Statistics publications which contain commodity data.

Commodities are shown in five major groups: (i) live animals, (ii) food, feed, beverages and tobacco, (iii) crude materials, inedible, (iv) fabricated materials, inedible, and (v) end products, inedible. Commodities shown separately in quarterly Motor Transport Traffic reports prior to 1961 were those transported in large volume. These commodities will continue to be shown individually and in many cases the description of such commodities was only slightly changed in the revised classification.

Where sufficient descriptive detail was not reported for a particular item or the quantity carried was not sufficiently large to be shown separately, it was necessary to assign it to an n.e.s. (not elsewhere specified) class. In addition mixed truckloads of goods which were within the same commodity group were assigned to the n.e.s. class for that group. However, when the commodities reported for a mixed truckload belonged to more than one of the five main commodity groups, they have been assigned to the "General Freight" group. Therefore, the totals shown for individual commodities are understated in proportion to the amount of that commodity which, of necessity, was assigned to one of these general classes.

To be shown separately 100,000 tons of a commodity should be transported within the quarter. However, to preserve continuity and enable comparisons to be made with previous quarters data are shown individually for some commodities which fall short of this mark.

The results of the provincial sample surveys were expanded to represent the estimated truck population for the thirteen weeks of the quarter and combined for a Canada total. Weight of goods carried, miles travelled with load, net ton miles and revenue have been rounded to thousands and average distance per ton has been rounded to tens. Averages were calculated before the figures were rounded. The data in this report are estimates subject to sampling error.

Clossary of Terms

Average distance per ton - Average distance each con was carried. We: con miles divided by the total weight of goods carried.

Average weight carried - Total net ton miles performed divided by miles travelled with load.

For hire vehicles - Those vehicles (common and contract) which were operated for compensation on intercity and rural routes and, in most provinces, were identified by a distinct series of licence plate numbers.

Net ton miles - Average weight of goods carried per trip multiplied by the number of loaded miles.

N.e.s. - Not elsewhere specified. (As a result of insufficient descriptive detail for some of the commodities recorded in the questionnaires, it has been necessary to assign these commodities to the n.e.s. classes rather than to a more specific class.)

Private intercity vehicles - Privately owned trucks (both intercity and rural) which were operated beyond urban areas and were not used directly in connection with farm operations.

Weight of goods carried - Total weight of goods loaded on the vehicles.

For Hire Trucks - Excluding Urban Operations

In the fourth quarter of 1965 for hire trucks carried an estimated 29,597,000 tons of goods compared with 26,690,000 in the same quarter of 1964, an increase of 10.9 per cent. Although more tonnage was carried than in the same quarter of the previous year, the average distance each ton was carried increased 3.3 per cent to 125 miles from 121 miles. This resulted in a increase of 14.2 per cent in the net ton miles performed - 3,692,701,000 compared to 3,232,701,000 in the corresponding quarter of 1964.

The revenue received from the transportation of these goods increased 21.5 per cent to \$202,-901,000 from \$167,001,000 while the revenue per ton mile rose slightly to 5.5 cents from 5.2 cents in the same period of 1964.

For trips over 50 miles, fabricated materials, inedible, and general freight accounted respectively for 36.8 and 21.4 per cent of the weight of goods carried, 26.4 and 32.2 per cent of the net ton miles performed and 23.0 and 32.1 per cent of the revenue for these for hire trucks.

Private Intercity Trucks - Excluding Urban Operations

Private intercity vehicles in the fourth quarter of 1965 carried an estimated 41,299,000 tons of goods compared with 24,711,000 tons in the same quarter of 1964, an increase of 67.1 per cent. The average weight of goods carried increased to 6.9 from 4.9 tons while the average distance each ton was carried decreased to 43 miles from 45 miles; consequently net ton miles for the fourth quarter rose 59.5 per cent to 1,788,068,000 from 1,121,248,000 in the same quarter of 1964.

For trips over 50 miles fabricated materials, inedible, and food, feed, beverages and tobacco accounted respectively for 33.4 and 28.3 per cent of the weight of goods carried and 36.8 and 27.5 per cent of the net ton miles performed by these private intercity trucks.
