

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THE HIGHWAY AND THE MOTOR VEHICLE IN CANADA, 1938.

The statistics in this report were collected from the highway and motor vehicle officials of the several provinces and from the Dominion Public Works and Mines and Resources Departments except the highway statistics for Prince Edward Island and British Columbia.

We regret that we have been unable to secure replies to our numerous requests from the Public Works Departments of these two provinces and lacking this co-operation we have attempted to extract the data from the published Public Accounts and Public Works reports of these provinces. These reports, however, do not give sufficient information on the nature of the work to make an accurate segregation between construction and maintenance. Also, it is quite possible that gross expenditures are not included for all items. The Prince Edward Island report does not show mileages of different classes of road surfaces and the British Columbia report evidently does not include all roads in rural municipalities. Consequently these data for Prince Edward Island are somewhat out of date and for British Columbia are not complete. These deficiencies should be borne in mind when using the data.

All rural roads in Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are under the jurisdiction of the provinces, in Quebec the province constructs and maintains all improved roads, in Ontario the province has been assuming responsibility of an increasing mileage of highway and subsidizes rural municipalities for highway expenditures when work is up to certain standards, and in the four western provinces the principal roads are under the jurisdiction of the provinces. Consequently the expenditures reported by the provinces include the bulk of the expenditures on rural roads.

The Dominion Government subsidized mine roads, the Trans-Canada Highway and certain other roads constructed by the provinces; Ontario subsidized certain county and township roads and the municipalities contributed towards work done by the province in the eastern provinces. The Dominion Government also constructs and maintains roads in national parks. All these expenditures are shown in the respective provinces in Table 3. The lower portion of the Table shows the net expenditures by each class of government in each province, the grand total for the year being \$103,863,791.

The Dominion expenditures were for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1939 and the provincial expenditures were for their respective fiscal years as shown in the Table. The Dominion Government subsidies were those reported by the provinces as received for the work done.

Highway Debt.

The table below shows the debt incurred for highways and the interest, sinking fund and principal payments for the year. In some provinces debentures have been issued for highway purposes and in others a portion of the total debt outstanding chargeable to highways was estimated, and interest and sinking fund payments were also estimated by the provincial authorities.

PART 2. - MOTOR VEHICLES

The motor vehicle registrations include all motor vehicles which require a license to operate on the public highways and consequently include privately owned and publicly owned vehicles. The total includes motor cycles as well as motor vehicles with four or more wheels but it does not include electric street cars nor trackless trolley buses. The greatest concentration of motor vehicles is in Ontario and this province also has by far the largest mileage of paved highways.

New registrations include all motor vehicles registered for the first time in the respective provinces and consequently are not exclusively new cars. Saskatchewan and Alberta do not make this segregation and Alberta does not require trailers to secure licenses. In Table 5 the total numbers of trucks and trailers licensed are shown. It is rather absurd to add small trailers of a half ton or less capacity such as are hauled behind passenger automobiles, with eight to ten ton commercial trailers, but only three provinces have so far made a segregation. In Table 6 trucks and trailers registered in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Ontario are shown classified according to gross weight or weight of vehicle plus weight of load licensed to be carried. From a transportation point of view the carrying capacity is the important figure and from the highway engineer's point of view the gross weight is the important figure. An ideal classification would include both bases and would segregate cabin trailers, oil tanks, and other special service vehicles from the ordinary freight vehicles. The weight classification would, of course, segregate the multitude of small trailers used for carrying a few cans of milk or other light loads from the larger trailers. Undoubtedly when the true importance of the motor vehicle in Canada's transportation industry is more generally realized such informative statistics will be made available for all provinces.

All the provinces exercise some control over operation of motor vehicles in common carrier business, the control in some provinces being more strict over motor buses than over motor trucks. The provinces grant certain reciprocal privileges to motor vehicles registered in other provinces and this accounts for vehicles registered outside the respective provinces operating under Public Service licenses.

Table 7 shows the registrations of motor vehicles in municipalities as far as these statistics are available from provincial compilations.

Revenues.

The increase in the number of motor vehicles registered was more than offset by reductions in unit fees in some of the provinces and the revenues were reduced, particularly in Ontario where registrations increased by 7.2 per cent and revenues from registrations of cars, drivers, etc., declined by \$836,813 or 9.7 per cent.

Revenues from Public Service Vehicles are exclusive of motor vehicle registration fees, being special fees assessed against operators of motor vehicles in common carrier business. The gasoline tax is a provincial sales tax on motor vehicle fuel and in some provinces gasoline used for a few other purposes is also taxed. The tax also includes a tax of (one and two cents per gallon) on all gasoline used in Manitoba, Alberta and British Columbia. The Dominion Government does not impose a sales tax on gasoline but a custom duty is imposed on gasoline imported. Imports however, are relatively small, most of the refining being done in Canada.

In most cases the gasoline tax is collected by local agents who deduct their commissions before remitting to the provincial authorities and these commissions are not generally reported by the provinces as revenue. The gross tax should be considered as revenue and the commission as an expense. To make the data uniform for all provinces, Table 8 shows the commission separately and the gross tax paid.

The gross and net sales of gasoline are shown in Tables 9, 10, 11, and 12. The net sales are those on which the full tax is levied and not refunded and the gross sales include net sales and also gasoline on which the tax is refunded in full or in part and gasoline exempt from the tax at time of sale. Gasoline which is sold two or more times is not duplicated in these tables. They do, however, exclude exports from Canada; the exports for 1938 being 2315 gallons reported by Prince Edward Island and 145,711 gallons reported by Nova Scotia. Diesel oil used by motor vehicles is taxed and reported separately by some of the provinces. These sales are shown in Table 13. It is not taxed in Manitoba and Prince Edward Island and a segregation from gasoline is not made in Saskatchewan and Nova Scotia.

Table 14 shows the rate of the gasoline tax in each province and the effective dates.

Motor Vehicle Accidents.

Motorists are required to report accidents in most of the provinces, but comprehensive statistics are not available in all cases. The Vital Statistics Branch of the Bureau compiles statistics on all deaths from motor vehicle accidents and these are shown in Tables 15 to 18. A direct comparison of such statistics for provinces is of little value due to differences in size, population, motor vehicle density, etc., but to put them on somewhat the same basis the average number of deaths per 10,000 registered motor vehicles has been computed and tabulated in Table 17. Although this treatment puts the data on a better footing than the raw figures it still gives no weight to differences in use of motor vehicles, differences in climate, roads, tourist cars, etc., all of which are factors in accidents. The Maritime Provinces, Quebec, Ontario and British Columbia showed reductions from 1937 averages but the three Prairie Provinces showed increases.

Statistics in Table 18 include victims of accidents outside these municipalities who have been taken to hospitals in the cities and died within the municipalities, and consequently will not check with Table 20 which deals only with accidents in these municipalities as recorded by the urban police.

Tourist Automobiles

The number of United States automobiles entered for touring purposes and also the number of Canadian cars crossing into the United States, as recorded by the Department of National Revenue showed decreases from the previous year and the expenditures by United States tourists in Canada dropped from \$181,332,000 in 1937 to \$180,258,000. These expenditures were close to two-thirds of the total foreign tourist expenditures in Canada.

Table 21 shows the number of cars entering via the various ports in each province. Entries through the Maritime Provinces are shown in one group because practically all United States tourists visiting Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island enter via the New Brunswick border.

As an appendix to this report there is a table showing the expenditures by urban municipalities in Canada during 1938 on streets, sidewalks, bridges, and culverts, and the mileage of each class of pavement in these municipalities. The footnote to the table explains the scope of the census.
