

# THE MOTOR VEHICLE

## 1954

#### Registrations

The registration year 1954 brought a 6.2 p.c. increase in the number of motor vehicles operated by residents of Canada at 3.644,589 compared with 3,430,672 in 1953. Passenger car registrations were 6.9 p.c. higher at 2,688,465 against 2,513,754 in 1953. Commercial vehicle registrations were up 4.7 p.c. from 876,741 to 918,459.

Motor cycles, including motorized bicycles, fell from 40,177 in 1953 to 37,665 in 1954. At the end of 1945 there were 1,497,081 motor vehicles on Canada's roads and these were composed of 1,160,058 passenger cars, 322,829 commercial vehicles and 14,194 motor cycles. Thus a rise in the nine-year period from 1945 to 1954 of 143.4 p.c. in all motor vehicles, 131.7 p.c. in passenger cars, 184.5 p.c. in commercial vehicles and 165.3 p.c. in motor cycles has taken place. The peak post-war year for motor cycle registrations was reached in 1950 when 43.670 were on the road. On the other hand passenger and commercial vehicles have climbed steadily in numbers, though there was a distinct drop in the rate of increase for 1954 especially in Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, Manitoba and Saskatchewan where only small increases were recorded in the period reported. Trucks continue to be utilized in a constantly increasing variety of jobs and more specialized units are appearing on the road every year.

At the end of the 1954 registration year there were ten motor vehicles registered for every 42 Canadians. Albertans have the largest number of motor vehicles in relation to population with ten for every 31 persons while Omtario leads in passenger cars at ten per 42 persons. All regions again showed increases over the previous year in the number of vehicles with the gains ranging from a low of 2.7 p.c. in Nova Scotia to a high of 16.4 p.c. in Newfoundland. Other increases were: The Yukon and Northwest Territories 9.3 p.c.; Quebec 9.1 p.c.; British Columbia 6.5 p.c.; Alberta 6.2 p.c.; Ontario 6.0 p.c.; New Brunswick 5.5 p.c.; Saskatchewan 3.8 p.c.; Manitoba 3.3 p.c.; and Prince Edward Island 2.8 p.c.

#### Sales

New passenger car sales were down 13.5 p.c. in 1954 at 310,546 units against 359,172 units the previous year. European passenger cars held a

smaller share of the Canadian market in 1954 with 20,248 sold compared with 26,378 in 1953. There were 1,610 European commercial vehicles sold in Canada during the year compared with 1,647 in 1953. Total sales of commercial vehicles were down 30 p.c. from 103,354 units in 1953 to 72,082. Commercial vehicle sales accounted for less than 19 p.c. of the total sales of all new motor vehicles in 1954 in contrast to 22 p.c. of the previous year's total. Installment buying of new motor vehicles accounted for a slightly smaller portion of total sales with 40 p.c. of passenger cars and commercial vehicles financed in 1954 compared with 41 p.c. in 1953.

#### Revenues

Provincial and Territorial governments collected \$329,552,161 in revenues from gasoline taxes and the licencing of vehicles, drivers, dealers etc. during 1954. The increase over 1953 revenues amounted to \$21,887,997 or 7.1 p.c. In 1953, the latest year for which complete data are available, expenditures on provincial highways, development roads etc. by Provincial governments totalled \$341,501,941 and exceeded the revenues for that year by more than \$33 millions. Provincial governments also paid out \$6,378,276 in subsidies and grants-in-aid to cities and large towns for road work. In addition the outlays of Federal and Municipal governments and others for highways, roads and streets during 1953 amounted to \$132,169,095.

#### Gasoline

The consumption of taxable gasoline (which is used almost entirely for automotive purposes) rose 6.2 p.c. from 1,902 million to 2,021 million gallons in the year. Newfoundland raised its gasoline tax from 15 to 17 cents with effect May 1, 1955 and Nova Scotia raised their gasoline tax to 17 cents per gallon on April 1, 1955.

#### **Tourist Traffic**

Foreign vehicles entering Canada dropped from a peak of 8,235,313 passenger cars in 1953 to 8,137,617 in 1954 and commercial vehicles entering were down from 372,489 to 365,671. Canadian vehicles returning to Canada were again above the previous year.

#### Part I

#### REGISTRATIONS

All motor vehicles licensed to operate on public highways are included in the registration tables published in this report. Motor bicycles and motor cycles are classified as motor vehicles. Ontario and Nova Scotia consider trolley coaches as motor vehicles but other provinces in which these vehicles operate classify them in the same category as tram cars, which are excluded.

Table 1 is an historical summary showing the increase in motor vehicle registrations in Canada since 1904 when Ontario became the first province to register the "horseless carriage".

Table 2 presents a tabulation of trucks and trailers in Ontario by gross vehicle weight which is the weight of the vehicle plus the weight it is registered or licensed to carry. Similar data is not available for other provinces.

Table 3 shows the number classified by type, etc., of vehicle as well as other licences issued in each province. New registrations include vehicles registered for the first time in the reporting province and include "used" as well as new vehicles. Six provinces and the Territories supplied data giving this breakdown in 1954. British Columbia passed legislation bringing a five-year driver's licence into effect on January 2, 1951. The 491,091 licences shown in Table 3 include those issued prior to the 1954 registration year but still in force during 1954.

Gasoline Stations and Garages as enumerated in table 3 should not be construed as being only service stations which sell gasoline to the motorist

and garages which engage in the task of repairing motor vehicles. Licencing laws in the several provinces vary considerably as to what may be included in these categories. For example, Ontario lists as a retail gasoline outlet any place having (a) a gasoline pump and (b) a licence to sell gasoline. Included in the group termed "Garages" are many not performing automotive repair work such as used car lots, storage for vehicles, parking lots, etc. The 1951 Census of Distribution shows that at the time of the census there were 2,575 motor vehicle dealers, 3,694 garages and 8,394 filling stations whose business in retail trade was predominantly one of the above. The Census of Distribution classifies businesses by the main source of dollar volume of sales, and accordingly firms whose principal sales volume in dollars was derived from other classes of retail trade are not included in the totals shown above. Examples of the type of gasoline outlets not classed as filling stations are grocery stores, tourist motels and motor vehicle dealers which have gasoline pumps but whose sales of gasoline represent a minor portion of their total sales volume. Similar restrictions apply in the case of businesses which repair motor vehicles as a side-line to their main retail occupation.

Table 4 shows the vehicle licences issued in municipalities, counties, etc., for all provinces (except Prince Edward Island and Quebec). The Territories which have very few vehicles are not included in this table. The totals represent numbers of licences issued and do not necessarily reflect the exact number of vehicles located in or near the registration area.

#### Part II

#### REVENUES

Provincial governments obtain a large percentage of their revenues through the levying of various taxes and licences on the users of public highways. Table 5 gives Canada totals of provincial revenues from the registration of motor vehicles, licencing of drivers, chauffeurs, etc., and other miscellaneous operating fees, fines and licences. Gasoline tax revenues over the 33-year period from 1922 to the end of the 1954 licence year are also shown.

Details of 1954 revenues from registrations, licences, fines, etc., are given in table 6. These data, furnished by the provinces, are based on the nearest fiscal year with the actual year end dates for each province shown at the top of the table.

Data on gasoline tax revenues for 1926, 1933, 1939, and 1945 to 1954 are contained in table 7. The table shows the amounts collected by the Federal authorities for the years 1945, 1946 and 1947 through the three cent wartime gasoline tax which was levied from April, 1941 to March 31, 1947. Also indicated are the amounts paid to the provinces from federal gasoline tax receipts during those years under a guaranteed minimum arrangement based on provincial revenues in 1940.

An historical summary of gasoline tax rates in force and exemptions granted therefrom is contained in table 8. Alberta was the first province to enter this taxation field with the introduction of a 2 cent tax per gallon on April 30, 1922. The other provinces rapidly took note of this expanding

revenue source and in May of 1928 Saskatchewan became the last of the nine provinces then in Confederation to utilize the tax. The Yukon Territory commenced charging a 3 cent tax in June, 1940 and the Northwest Territories initiated a tax of 6 cents in 1952. Present gasoline tax rates range from 1 cent per gallon in the Northwest Territories to 17 cents in Newfoundland and Nova Scotia. Exemptions now in force limit the gasoline tax almost completely to motor vehicles using the public highways.

In terms of operating taxes and licenses the average cost of operation for motor vehicles operated in Canada during the 1954 registration year amounted to over \$90, slightly higher than in the 1953 period. Lower gasoline tax rates in the five provinces from Ontario westward helped bring the average in all five below the nation average. Lowest of these provinces was Manitoba where the average was \$64, while British Columbia averaged \$75; Saskatchewan \$76; Ontario \$82 and Alberta \$83. Operating licences and taxes in the Yukon and Northwest Territories amounted to an average \$65 per vehicle. In the east only Prince Edward Island at \$86 per vehicle was below the national average. Averages for the other four eastern provinces were Nova Scotia \$108; Newfoundland \$109 and New Brunswick \$123. Quebec and British Columbia were the only provinces where a decrease occurred, the decline being from \$129 to \$126 and \$78 to \$75 per vehicle respectively. In Saskatchewan the average cost of operating taxes and licenses was virtually unchanged.



#### Part III

#### GASOLINE SALES

"Gasoline" under the provincial acts includes all petroleum oils used as fuel in internal combustion engines. Gasoline, so defined, is taxed in all provinces when used by motor vehicles on the highway and, in some provinces, gasoline used for other purposes is also subject to tax. Propane gas, now used to an increasing extent in motor buses and trucks is considered under the general classification as a "gasoline".

Net sales of gasoline during the year 1939 and the past 10 years shown in table 10 are calculated by deducting from the gross sales (1) exports (2) tax free sales and (3) gasoline on which refunds have been paid. In computing net sales all sales of aviation gasoline have been deducted from the gross sales and shown in exempt sales or in refunds. The chart on page 23 illustrates the vast growth in the consumption of gasoline in Canada during the past 14 years. Rationing and the diversion of fuel to the armed forces accounts for the sharp decline which occurred during the war years especially from 1942 to 1945.


Newfoundland net sales for 1949, 1950 and 1951 were estimated on the basis of revenue collected as data on net sales were not available until September, 1951. The gross total shown for 1951 in Newfoundland represents the last four months of the year only and includes sales of motor and tractor grades only for those months and for 1952, 1953 and 1954.

Net sales of gasoline in Alberta were not fully comparable with other provinces during the years 1946 to 1951. Marked gasoline in the province was taxable at one cent a gallon at the time of sale from April 1, 1946 until April 30, 1951. This marked gasoline has been excluded from Alberta net sales for those years in order that the pattern of sales of gasoline subject to the full tax might remain comparable throughout.

#### Part IV

#### TOURIST TRAFFIC

Foreign tourist cars travelled on Canadian highways in fewer numbers in 1954 than during the peak year of 1953. Entries on travellers' vehicle permits decreased from 2,506,114 in 1953 to 2,450,844 in 1954 whereas vehicles crossing the border for short visits dropped in number from 5,729,199 to 5,686,773 in the same period. Foreign commercial vehicles entering Canada numbered 365,671 in 1954, down from the 372,489 recorded the previous year.

Fewer long distance buses crossed from the United States there being 54,779 compared with 56,665 in 1953. Besides long distance bus traffic a considerable volume of local bus traffic not recorded in these tables flows across the Canada—United States boundary every day between such neighbouring cities as Fort Erie—Buffalo and Windsor—Detroit.
