SUMMARY OF CANAL STATISTICS

FOR

APRIL 1922.

Sault Ste. Marie Canal

Canadian and American locks both opened for traffic on April 17th, 8 and 10 days respectively later than last year and the number of vessels and total freight through the canals for the month showed corresponding reductions, although wheat showed an increase of over a million bushels.

Welland Canal opened April 17th two days later than last year and showed a slight increase in traffic, especially in American corn.

St. Lawrence Canals opened April 19th one day later than last year. Corn showed an increase of 23,365 tons and oats a decrease of 12,253 tons, while wheat shipments were practically the same as last year.

The Ottawa Canal opened April 22nd, Murray Canal opened April 19th, and the St. Peters Canal opened April 27th. The other canals had not been opened at the close of April.


The charts on the last two pages show graphically the total tons of freight and tons of the principal commodities for the years 1910 to 1921 inclusive that passed through the Canadian and American locks at Sault Ste. Marie and through the Welland and St. Lawrence Canals. Wheat and other grain are in tons and not bushels. The rise in other grain for the Welland and St. Lawrence Canals for 1921 was due almost entirely to shipments of American corn.

The following is a table showing the principal items of traffic on the several canals.






FREIGHT TRAFFIC
