SUMMARY OF CANAL TRAFFIC

FOR

OCTOBER, 1927

Sault Ste. Marie Canals:

Canadian and United States Locks:

Traffic through the canals was lighter than for October, 1926, by 1,648,442 tons. Iron ore decreased by 2,335,568 tons and bituminous coal decreased by 21.777 tons, but wheat was heavier by 14,761,873 bushels and other grains increased by 9,297,627 bushels.

Welland Canal:

Total traffic was again over one million tons and reached a new high record of 1,130,277 tons, exceeding the record made in September by 39,630 tons and the October, 1926, tonnage by 296,686 tons. Wheat was heavier than in 1926 by 184,935 tons, barley by 97,358 tons and rye by 25,417 tons. No anthracite coal was reported and bituminous coal showed a decrease of 35,372 tons, the strikes at United States mines being a factor in the decreases. Pulpwood declined by 6,313 tons, but merchandise increased by 13,607 tons and sand by 3,881 tons.

For the season from the opening of navigation until October 31 total traffic was heavier than in 1926 by 1,769,080 tons and heavier than for the entire season of 1925, which was the previous record; by 699,433 tons.

St. Lawrence Canals:

The total traffic on the canals was heavier than for October last year by 275,901 tons, grain traffic being particularly heavy, barley increasing by 102,316 tons, wheat by 178,658 tons, rye by 22,540 tons and corn by 10,505 tons. Of the total of 17,571 tons of corn carried, 12,791 tons were upbound Argentine corn. Coal showed decreases, pulpwood was lighter by 15,923 tons, and iron and steel decreased by 13,633 tons. Merchandise was heavier by 19,908 tons and sand by 2,010 tons.

The cumulative total for the season to date was heavier than in 1926 by 1,582,383 tons and heavier than for the entire season of 1925 by 743,972 tons.
