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

SUMMARY OF CANAL STATISTICS FOR DECEMBER AND SEASON OF NAVIGATION 1931

Sault Ste. Marie Canals: Canadian and United States Locks:

The Canadian lock was opened for traffic April 13th, three days after the United States locks, and they all closed on December 15th. Total traffic through all locks amounted to 44,614,168 tons which was the lightest tonnage since 1908 and was only 61 per cent of the 1930 tonnage. The big decrease was in iron ore which decreased from 47,050,854 tons in 1930 to 24,259,899 tons. This, with the exception of 1921 with only 22,595,323 tons, was the lightest since 1904. Wheat shipments were also light, amounting to 189,272,600 bushels as against 243,832,889 bushels in 1930. This also was a new low record for the past 10 years. Other grains were slightly heavier than in 1930 amounting to 56,316,914 bushels as against 55,455,443 bushels in 1930. Except for 1922, bituminous coal at 9,889,144 tons created another low record for the past 21 years.

Welland Canal:

The new Welland Ship canal had a marked influence on the traffic using the canal and instead of decreases, as recorded by the St. Lawrence and Sault Ste. Marie canals, it showed an increase for the season of 1,185,976 tons over the 1930 tonnage. Coal and iton ore to Hamilton and Toronto were responsible for a large part of the increase. Total shipments of bituminous coal amounted to 2,041,940 which was an increase of 717,401 tons and iron ore amounted to 295,592 tons, or 254,730 tons over 1930 shipments. Theat showed a decrease of 399,656 tons, rye a decrease of 38,630 tons and flar a decrease of 3,683 tons; all other grains showed increases, barley being heavier by 250,188 tons and oats by 122,681 tons.

St. Lawrence Canals:

Total freight tonnage using the St. Lawrence canals amounted to 6,036,980 tons which was 142,043 tons less than for 1930. Wheat, pulpwood, bituminous coal and iron and steel with decreases of 452,315 tons, 299,877 tons, 161,313 tons, and 44,610 tons, respectively, accounted for the majority of the decrease, petroleum, oils and gasolene were heavier by 190,283 tons, barley was heavier by 335,644 tons, oats by 122,104 tons, merchandise and paper by 84,931 tons and anthracite coal by 23,786 tons.

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


