SUMMARY OF CANAL TRAFFIC

FOR

DECEMBER

AND

SEASON OF NAVIGATION

1935

Sault Ste. Marie Canals - Canadian and United States Locks: The Canadian lock at Sault Ste. Marie closed for the season on December 17 and the United States locks closed on the day previous. This was three days later than in 1935 but December traffic was lighter by 67,120 tons, decreasing from 440,117 tons to 372,997 tons due mainly to light grain shipments in 1936.


For the season of navigation total freight passed through the locks increased from 48,292,973 tons in 1935 to 69,523,795 tons which was by far the greatest tonnage since 1930 and was over three times the traffic through the locks in 1932. This improvement was due largely to a revival of east-bound iron ore shipments which increased from 29,277,506 tons in 1935 to 47,069,935 tons, or by 61 per cent. Up-bound soft coal increased from 8,953,942 tons to 12,185,849 tons, or by 36 per cent. Wheat shipments were lighter by 9.5 per cent, but other grains increased by 16 per cent. The number of vessel passages through the locks was 16,614 as against 12,959 in 1935. Of these, 3,235 used the Canadian lock and they carried 2,277,899 tons of freight and 22,668 passengers in 1936.

Welland Ship Canal: Navigation opened two weeks later than in 1935 and closed a week earlier but freight traffic for the canal was a new high record, amounting to 10,437,802 tons, as against 8,953,383 tons in 1935 and 9,280,452 tons in 1934, the previous record. The large gains over 1935 were 448,024 tons of wheat, or 14,934,133 bushels, 448,403 tons of soft coal, 149,847 tons of iron ore, 85,540 tons of other ore, 95,170 tons of pulpwood, 76,832 tons of gasolene, 48,006 tons of barley and 52,089 tons of iron and steel. The only large decreases were in agricultural products, rye decreasing by 49,611 tons, oats by 7,326 tons and other mill products by 22,023 tons. The number of vessels using the canal increased from 5,092 in 1935 to 6,399 and the number of passengers carried from 1,354 to 2,054. Prior to the construction of the new canal practically no passengers were carried through this canal.

St. Lawrence Canals: Freight using the canals amounted to 8,288,416 tons, almost reaching the record made in 1928 of 8,411,542 tons, and was 1,414,761 tons greater than the 1935 total. Wheat shipments reached 2,375,807 tons, or 900,991 tons above the 1935 shipments, soft coal was heavier by 176,446 tons, pulpwood by 100,742 tons, paper by 68,617 tons, gasolene by 33,298 tons, petroleum and other oils by 65,208 tons, coke by 99,081 tons, iron ore ty 55,840 tons, and other ore by 25,947 tons. Rye showed a decrease from 87,265 tons to 37,006 tons, oats from 124,961 tons to 101,433 tons, wood pulp from 380,878 tons to 323,507 tons, and hard coal from 426,422 tons to 339,148 tons. The number of versels using the canals decreased from 10,326 in 1935 to 10,405 and the number of passengers carried declined from 2,324 to 2,197.

The Chambly, St. Feters, Trent and St. Andrews canals also showed greater freight tonnage than in 1935 and the Murray, Ottawa and Rideau canals showed decreased traffic. The total for all Canadian canals was 21,467,809 tons, as against 18,205,989 tons in 1935. These totals include considerable duplications where cargoes use two or more canals in being carried from origin to destination.


