The season of navigation closed for the Sault Ste. Marie Canadian Canals on December 14th, and for the United States Locks on December 16th; for the Welland Ship Canal on December 18th, and for the St. Lawrence Canals on December 6th. The St. Peter's Canal was open at the end of the year, and the other canals were closed during November and early December.


Sault Ste. Marie Canals - Canadian and United States Locks: The traffic through the Canadian and United States Locks during the 1948 season of navigation increased to 115,894,650 tons from 110,887,970 tons in 1947; the peak of 120,200,814 tons was reached in 1941. Iron ore downbound increased from 80,576,904 tons in 1947 to 85,231,804 tons and upbound soft coal increased from 15,529,045 to 16,558,048 tons, hard coal from 342,686 to 360,671 tons and stone from 1,214,760 to 1,322,999 tons, but downbound wheat declined from 7,591,376 to 6,613,419 tons. The number of passengers passing through canals increased from 90,568 to 112,516.

Welland Ship Canal: Total traffic using the Canal during the season increased from 11,805,575 tons in 1947 to 13,437,849 tons. Wheat shipments decreased from 1,798,378 to 1,748,323 tons, petroleum and other oils from 1,571,579 to 1,432,719 tons, cement, brick, lime and plaster from 65,139 to 55,215 tons and iron and steel from 26,413 to 10,041 tons. Shipments of flaxseed increased from 51,145 to 172,367 tons; barley and corn also were heavier. Gasoline increased from 814,216 to 842,458 tons, pig iron from 30,693 to 79,200 tons, sugar from 8,932 to 27,822 tons, salt from 48,061 to 72,789 tons, wood pulp from 22,184 to 36,667 tons, pulpwood from 501,199 to 522,598 tons, soft coal from 4,152,753 to 5,044,710 tons, iron ore from 1,176,069 to 1,645,952 tons and other ore from 78,345 to 156,547 tons.

St. Lawrence Canals: Due mainly to heavy shipments of gasoline and oils total traffic using the canals increased to 7,378,010 tens from 7,179,594 tens for 1947. Gasoline increased from 477,971 to 590,844 tens, petroleum and other oils from 696,529 to 788,642 tens, barley from 75,538 to 186,430 tens, flaxseed from 13,944 to 125,902 tens, salt from 36,526 to 66,829 tens, wood pulp from 20,549 to 42,554 tens and pulpwood from 559,913 to 588,774 tens. Corn declined from 75,284 to 55,375 tens, wheat from 940,355 to 887,947 tens, flour from 22,545 to 6,388 tens, iron and steel from 20,221 to 9,020 tens and soft coal from 2,940,259 to 2,644,484 tens.


