

SUMMARY OF CANAL STATISTICS FOR DECEMBER AND SEASON OF NAVIGATION 1 9 4 9

The 1949 season of navigation closed at the Canadian Sault on December 14th while the United States locks ceased operations a few days later. The Welland Ship Canal passed the last vessel on December 20th and the St. Lawrence canals closed on December 11th compared with the 6th of the month in 1948. All of the smaller canals were closed by the end of November with the exception of the St. Peter's canal, which ceased operation on January 13, 1950. The major canals enjoyed a season which averaged a week longer than in 1948.


Soult Ste. Mirie Canals - Canadian and United States Looks: Traffic through the system during the open days of December was down rather sharply from the corresponding period of 1948, with total tennage at 862,702 tens, declining 770,104 tens. Eastbound volume dropped from 1,590,419 to 687,050 tens as wheat was 347,294 tens lighter at 331,821 tens and iron one decreased from 656,606 to 177,775 tens. Other grains were down to 126,977 from 233,307 tens. Westbound freight, however, rose from 42,387 to 175,652 tens due to a gain in soft coal from 12,970 to 157,164 tens.

During the 1949 season of navigation total freight for the system grossed 96,187,769 tens, down 19,706,881 tens from 1948 and compares with 110,887,970 tens in 1947.

The Canadian canal passed 2,301,514 tens during 1949 as against 2,371,062 tens in the previous year, a drop of 69,548 tens. Declines were shown here in soft coal, flax-seed, gasoline, cils, barley, pig iron, pulpwood, coke and other freight, while cats, rye, wheat, paper, hard coal were heavier.

Total eastbound freight for both systems was 84,047,570 tons compared with 95,764,029 tons during the 1948 season, while westbound volume at 12,140,199 tons declined more sharply from 20,130,621 tons due to the decrease in the soft coal movement. Passenger traffic increased slightly from 112,516 in 1948 to 113,005.

Welland Ship Canal: Total freight passing through the Welland in December aggregated 493,527, a gain of 107,037 tons over the 386,490 tons reported for December of 1948. Soft coal rose from 75,463 to 271,001 tons and accounted for most of the advance.



Barley, oats, suger and paper also increased but corn, wheat, gasoline and oils, iron ore and all other freight were under December 1948 volume.

The 1949 season of navigation totals show a new record of 13,692,209 tens compared with 13,437,849 tens during 1948, a gain of 254,360 tens or 2 p.c. Wheat increased 1,442,331 tens over 1948 to 3,190,654 tens for the season, corn was up from 61,425 to 410,727 tens, cats from 76,512 to 211,025 tens and all other grains, except barley, registered advances. Petroleum cils at 1,599,864 tens were up 167,145 tens over 1948, but gaseline eased 101,777 tens to 740,681 tens for the season. Building products, iron, steel, sugar, paper, hard coal and other freight also moved in greater volume but soft coal dropped 1,471,401 tens to 3,573,309 due to strikes and 3 day work weeks in the U. S. pits. Iron ore was down from 1,645,952 to 1,236,365 tens while other ores declined from 156,547 to 91,183 tens.

St. Lawrence Canals: A total of 42,428 tons of freight were reported for the eleven days of navigation in December, 1949, nearly double the traffic of 21,827 tons in the preceding December. Coal, gasoline and oils, corn and oats were heavier while no wheat passed against 1,920 tons in December, 1948. Lumber and other freight were considerably lower.

An active season of navigation was shown for the St. Lawrence system with a total of 7,960,194 tens of cargo against 7,378,010 tens in 1948 and 7,179,594 tens during 1947. The increase over 1948 was 582,184 tens or nearly 8 p.c., and the total constitutes a high since the 1939 total of 8,340,165 tens.


Wheat shipments aggregated 2,223,162 tons, up 1,335,215 tons over 887,947 tons shown for 1948. All other grains, except barley, were heavier. Gaseline rose 305,593 tons to 896,437 but petroleum cils declined 204,363 tons in line with reduced foreign imports. Sugar, iron, paper and iron ore advanced. The shipments of cold coal sagged from 2,644,484 to 1,309,931 tons. Pulpwood was down 168,292 tons to 420,482 tons while other ores and sand and gravel also declined.
