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SUMMARY OF CANAL TRAFFIC

NOVEMBER, 1950

The tennage of all freight through Canadian canal systems during November totalled 3,279,726 tens to register a gain of 775,163 tens or 31 p.c. over that for November, 1949, and establish a new high for the month. There were 2,522 vessels-locked through during the period against 2,281 in 1949, and 2,321 in 1948. Commodities showing good gains in total over November 1949 volume included wheat, barley, pulpwood, soft coal, coke, iron ore, sand, autos and parts and petroleum.


To facilitate construction of the Mackenzie King Bridge in Ottawa, the Hartwell-Ottawa section of the Fideau was drained one month earlier then usual in October. Lachine Canal traffic was held up from November 5th to 9th for repairs caused by a leak in one lock.

Sault Ste. Marie Canals-Canadian and United States Locks: Total freight traffic during Nevember recovered to 10,873,102 tens for the combined system, or over 3 times the volume of the preceding strike-ridden Nevember at 3,548,422 tens, and an increase of 7,327,680 tens or 207 p.c. This spectacular advance was principally in dewnbound iron ore which scared from 795,219 to 7,496,506 tens and in soft ocal upbound which rose from 856,501 to 1,524,389 tens. The total tennage eastbound at 9,037,757 compares with 2,369,860 tens in Nevember, 1949 while westbound volume spurted from 1,178,562 to 1,836,345 tens. Wheat downbound was up from 894,470 to 916,552 tens but other grain declined from 597,035 to 503,861 tens. Pulpwood totalled 33,700 tens against 7,400 tens one year earlier. The westbound traffic showed gains in soft coal, iron ore, stone and other freight while hard coal, cil and gaseline, salt and structural steel were lighter. Vessel passages during the month numbered 2,241 in both directions compared with 1,007 in Nevember of 1949, and 2,486 in 1948 when the grain traffic was much heavier.

Walland Ship Canal: Traffic reported for November was a bumper 1,666,431 tens compared with 1,279,347 tens in the same menth of 1949 and 1,510,615 tens in 1948. This is the best November over reported for the Walland. The increase over the similar period of 1949 was thus 387,084 tens or 30.3 p.c. Vessel passages advanced from 657 to 784. Commodities featured were barley up 17,850 tens to 53,426 tens, wheat advancing from 180,232 to 323,586 tens, pulpwood at 31,108 tens against none in the preceding November, paper, soft coal up from 243,795 to 560,652 tens, coke, sand and in iron ore climbing to 165,644 tens from 59,254 tens one year earlier. Corn, cats, gaseline, cils, woodpulp and miscellaneous freight were reduced.


St. Lawrence Conals: Tennage rose to a new peak for the month of 1,245,732 against 924,708 tens in Nevember 1949 as barley, wheat, petroleum, pulpwood, autos, soft coal and sand registered good gains. Wheat was up from 143,873 to 243,056 tens and petroleum from 79,881 to 165,634 tens, while soft coal increased 188,393 tens to 288,141 tens. Vessels numbered 1,169 compared with 1,074 one year earlier.

Traffic improved on the Ottowa but was lower on the Michelieu and St. Peter's Canals.
