## SUMMARY OF CANAL TRAFFIC

## APRIL. 1951

The season of navigation opened on April 8th on the St. Lawrence two days earlier than last year, the Welland on March 29th one day sooner, while the Sault was delayed a week later than in 1950 to April 30th to permit completion of repairs to the retaining dam. However, the American locks there were open on April 2nd or 20 days earlier than last year. The tonnage of cargo through all Canadian canals in April was a promising 1,980,673 tons, an increase of 830,745 tons or 72.2 p.c. over that passing in the first month last year. Total vessel passages numbered 1,208 or 441 above April of 1950. The movement of grain was spectacularly above last year.

Sault Ste. Marie Canals - Canadian and United States Locks: Something new has been added to the traffic through the Sault Canals with crude oil moving in a fleet of giant new tankers from the outlet of the prairie pipeline at Superior, Wisconsin, to the refineries at Sarnia. In the opening month 57,238 tons of crude were reported and this volume will increase. The "Imperial Leduc" and "Imperial Redwater" now in service have each a capacity of 115,000 barrels and can make a round trip between the above mentioned ports in five days. Smaller vessels have also been assigned to this movement. Total freight through the combined system during April totalled 8,025,132 tons compared with only 144,382 tons in April of 1950 and 12,030,022 tons in 1949. Wheat eastbound weighed 949,133 tons this April against a mere 10,410 tons last year while iron ore downbound amounted to 5,621,068 tons against none in April of 1950. Soft coal upbound totalled 834,591 tons, up from 91,918 tons while stone grossed 120,433 tons compared with no shipments one year earlier. Total eastbound traffic measured 6,965,856 tons against 25,695 tons in April last year and westbound increased from 118,687 to 1,059,276 tons.

Welland Ship Canal: An active month was reported at the Welland as 1,536,514 tons of freight were locked compared with 838,725 tons in April, 1950, and 1,425,684 tons in April of 1949. Grains were much heavier with wheat up tenfold from 24,321 tons last year to 245,138 tons. Gasoline increased from 109,035 to 123,776 tons and petroleum from 109,059 to 211,139 tons. Autos and parts totalled 35,600 tons, up 15,927 tons. Soft coal rose from 469,921 to 594,227 tons. Iron ore, sand and miscellaneous freight posted good gains over the preceding April. Vessel passages numbered 735 against 423 one year earlier.

St. Lawrence Canals: With an additional two days, St. Lawrence freight totalled 436,806 tons compared to 285,457 tons in April of 1950 and 511,244 tons in the same month of 1949. Some delay was experienced at the Lachine locks on April 22nd-23rd due to power failure. Some 372 vessels used the canals against 263 in April of 1950. Barley, corn, oats and wheat passed in much larger volume this April. Gasoline was heavier while petroleum declined. Paper advanced from 5,628 to 16,969 tons. Coal was lighter but "all other freight" increased from 43,636 to 56,650 tons.

Four of the seven smaller canals were open and vessel passages increased considerably over the preceding April.
