SUMMARY OF CANAL TRAFFIC

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OCTOBER, 1952

More freight was shipped through the Canadian canals in the month under review than in any other October over the past thirty years. The total amounted to 4,158,938 tons, somewhat below the record for any month of 4,248,737 tons established in September of this year but 179,056 tons or 4.5 per cent more than in October, 1951 when the total reached 3,979,882 tons. All three of the major canal systems reported gains this October with the Welland showing the greatest improvement. The smaller canals recorded, in total, a slight decrease. Heavier shipments of barley and iron ore transported through the Welland Ship canal, and barley through the St. Lawrence canals accounted for the greater part of the betterment shown for October.

A total of 3,388 vessels, aggregating 3,830,132 net tons used the facilities of Canada's canals during the month. Although the increase in the number of vessels over the preceding October was only 44 the registered net tonnage was higher by 226,768 tons, rising to 3,830,132 from 3,603,364 tons which indicates the growing emphasis on the employment of larger vessels in Great Lakes service. The number of passengers carried and the number of pleasure craft locked through the canals were both down this October numbering 131 and 1,290 as compared to 584 and 1,447, respectively, a year earlier.

SAULT STE. MARIE CANALS - CANADIAN AND UNITED STATES LOCKS: Although the tonnage of freight moved westbound through the Sault Ste. Marie canal was lower this October, a substantial increase in eastbound traffic raised the total to 15,548,960 tons, a new high for the month, and 7.1 per cent above the October, 1951 sum of 15,456,133 tons. Iron ore shipments eastwards, which advanced 13.5 per cent to 13,119,461 tons from 11,549,378 tons in the previous October, were the main reason for the excellent showing this month. Other eastbound commodities which recorded sizeable gains include other grain which advanced to 444,296 tons from 294,974 in the same period last year, and crude oil which rose to 428,966 from 293,967 tons. The tonnage of wheat, however, was down this October to 952,234 tons from 1,192,695 a year earlier.

Traffic westbound fell to 1,438,828 tons in the month under review, a drop of 26.8 per cent from the total of 1,964,650 tons in October, 1951 due to a one-third decrease in the amount of soft coal which totalled 977,082 tons as compared to 1,472,154 tons one year ago. Eighter movements of oil and gasoline and stone were also recorded in the current month.

A total of 3,323 vessels aggregating 13,802.646 net tons were locked through the combined system during the month as compared to 3,081 vessels of 12,569,112 tons in the corresponding period last year. The number of passengers carried eased to 238 from 480.

Freight traffic through the Canadian lock registered a minor increase over the previous October while vessel passages rose from 388 to 431.

WELLAND SHIP CANAL: The volume of freight transported through the Welland Ship canal during October amounted to 2,326,346 tons, a new high for the month and the third highest total for any month being exceeded in June and September of this year, only. It exceeded the October 1951 revised total of 2,218,510 tons by 107,836 tons or 4.9 per cent. Important gains were reported for barley which advanced to 185,447 tons from 75,274, in the previous October, and iron ore up to 511,274 from 375,223 tons. Increases were also reported for petroleum and other oils, corn, rye wood pulp and all other freight. On the debit side, wheat, gasoline, pulpwood, sand and soft coal were down this October with wheat showing the largest decline, dropping to 263,526 tons from 365,442. Some 1,140 vessels representing a net tonnage of 2,074,165 passed through the canal as compared to 1,653 vessels of 1,941,664 tons in the corresponding month of 1951.

ST. LAWRENCE CANALS: Freight traffic passing through the St. Lawrence system rose to 1,381,693 tons during the month, a gain of 70,781 tons or 5.4 per cent over the October, 1951 total of 1,310,912 tons. Decreases in the amounts of corn, crude oil and petroleum, pulpwood and soft coals carried were more than offset by increases in barley, wheat, wood pulp, iron ore and all other freight. The volume of the above commodities with the October, 1951 totals in brackets are ms follows; corn 5,561 tons (16,794); crude oil and petroleum 74,742 tons (148,912); pulpwood 98,376 tons (132,626); soft coal 271,824 tons (300,355), barley204,398 tons (72,393); wheat 243,897 tons (220,633); wood pulp 12,248 tons (3,587); iron ore 51,672 tons (24,650); and all other freight 207,870 tons (177,925).

The Ottawa River and Richelieu Canals also reported improved freight volume this October.
