SUMMARY OF CANAL TRAFFIC

During the month of August, 4,021 vassels aggregating 3,969,839 registered nat tons and transporting 4,148,708 tons of freight were locked through the Canadian canals. This amount of fraight is not only a new high for the month of August but almost equals the modern high for any month namely 4,150,931 tons, atteined in May of this year, and exceeds the total of 3,955,413 tons which were carried by 3,988 vassels of 3,700,769 nat tons in August of last year by 4.9 per cent. Hasvier traffic of barley, soft coal and iron ore through the Welland Ship canel was mainly responsible for this encouraging gain. A slight increase through the Sault Ste. Marie canal was offset by a slightly larger decrease in activity on the St. Lawrence system.

The number of passengers carried was also at a record level at 48,325 and surpassed the August, 1951 total of 43,597 by 10.8 per cent and accents the increased popularity of the Sault Ste. Marie route. The number of pleasure craft using the canals rose from 14,467 last year to 15,378.

SAULT STE. MARIE CANALS - CANADIAN AND UNITED STATES LOCKS: With the settlement of the United Statas steel strike, traffic through the Sault Ste. Marie canal resumed its normal tempo to which was edded the drive to make up for the tonnage lost during the suspension of iron ore shipmants. As a result, the total volume of iron ore shipped asstwards rose to 14,503,432 tons, axceeding the August, 1951 total of 13,324,212 by 1,179,220 tons, and was the main reason for the 5.7 per cent rise in total cargo locked through the system during the month which amounted to 18,174,411 tons. Eastward movement of crude oil (largely Canadian) advanced to 413,571 from &4,472 tons, a gain of 149,099 tons or 56.4 per cent. Other grains also showed a marked increase, advancing from 355,053 to 439,332 tons while wheat and pulpwood declined from 882,366 and 123,354 tons to 606,959 and 96,382 tons, respectively.

Total cargoes westbound were down this August at 2,014,721 tons as against 2,149,709 one year earlier, due mainly to lighter movements of soft coal which fell to 1,570,413 tons or 122,820 tons under that in the corresponding month last year.

Vessel passages numbered 3,863 or 78 more this August and aggregated 13,816,673 net tons as compared to 13,279,242 tons.

WELLAND SHIP CANAL: The tonnage of freight shipped through the Welland canal during August amounted to 2,301,171 tons, a new high for the month and exceeding the August, 1951 total of 2,071,423 tons by 229,748 or 11.1 per cent. Important gains were recorded for soft coal, iron ore and barley. Soft coal cargoes advanced to a total of 732,611 from 609,715 tons, iron ore increased to 33,055 from 323,871 tons and barley was up to 196,-922 tons from 111,955. Small increases were also reported for corn, oats, coke, and all other freight while the totals for wheat, gasoline, pulpwood and sand were down this August though to a limited extent. The number of vessels using the facilities of the canal was 1,152 of 2,047,924 net tons and exceeded the August, 1951 total of 1,045 vessels of 1,796,084 tons.

ST. LAWRENCE CANALS: Total traffic through the St. Lawrenca system was down slightly from the previous August at 1,378,790 tons as compared to 1,397,170. This decline of 18,380 tons was due mainly to lighter tonnages of gasoline, petroleum including crude oil, pulpwood, soft coal, and sand. Tonnages of the above commodities with the August, 1951 totals given in brackets were as follows: gasoline, 113,568 (191,932); petroleum and crude oil, 75,793 (120,834); pulpwood, 129,782 (141,518); soft coal, 305,449 (369,324); and sand, 32,470 (54,695). Heavier quantities of grains were responsible for the maintenance of a high level of activity. Wheat advanced to 280,259 tons from 196,487, oats to 31,246 from 5,023, and barley to 191,766 from 99,988 tons. The pettern of the petroleum movement is changing as greater quantities of western crude bacome available for refineries in the Great Lakes area. Lass dependency on foreign sources reduces volume entering the St. Lawrence Canals. Products pipelines now under construction across eastern Ontario will likely further accentuate the current trend.

Activity on the smaller canals was generally a little lighter this August than a year ago.
