SUMMARY OF CANAL STATISTICS

Despite the fact that the season of navigation on the Great Lakes - St. Lawrence River system got off to a late start this year, shipments of such bulk commodities as wheat and other grains, iron ore and soft coal have been light. The Canadian lock at Sault Ste. Marie opened on April 10th, twelve days later than in the previous year while the United States locks began operating twenty-one days later, beginning April 11 as compared with March 21st in 1953, and, the St. Lawrence system reported the first vessel passage on April 13th thirteen days later. The Welland Ship canal, however, began operations on March 25th, three days earlier but as at the other canals, traffic has been light.

The total tonnage of freight transported through all Canadian canals during April amounted to 1,653,812 tons less than half the total of 3,307,044 tons reported for the same month of 1953 as very little wheat and other grains were shipped from the lakehead to eastern elevators which are filled to near capacity. Traffic through all three major canals was considerably lower than the average over the past ten years.

The number of vessels locked through the canals totalled 1,254, a decrease of 1,151 from the April, 1953 total of 2,405 while the registered net tonnage declined to 1,703,506 tons from 3,451,107.

SAULT STE. MARIE CANAL - CANADIAN AND UNITED STATES LOCKS: The Canadian locks at Sault Ste. Marie opened 12 days later than in 1953 whereas those on the United States side were 21 days later. The total amount of cargo locked through the Sault Ste. Marie canal during the month dropped to 2,360.476 tons from the April, 1953 total of 12,464,530 tons. Eastbound shipments were down to 1.959,956 tons from 11,295,924 as cargoes of wheat amounted to 152,843 tons as compared with 1,636,677 tons in the previous April, iron ore totalled 1,377,968 tons as against 8,511,305 and other grain was down to 312,707 tons from 666,381. Westbound shipments also declined this April to 400,520 tons from 1,168,606 as cargoes of soft coal dropped to 254,768 tons from 818,485 and stone to 40,027 tons from 201,969.

The number of vessel passages and registered net tonnage decreased to 608 vessels aggregating 2,154,057 net tons from 2,606 vessels of 11,236,437 tons. Traffic through the Canadian lock only was down to 151,703 tons from 364,924 with all commodities except structural steel, showing declines.

WELLAND SHIP CANAL: Opening 3 days earlier than in 1953 the Welland Ship canal reported that the volume of freight transported amounted to 1,151,543 tons, a decrease of 858,988 tons or 42.7 per cent from the April, 1953 total of 2,010,531 tons, while the number of vessels totalled 587 aggregeting 1,160,291 net tons as compared with 987 vessels of 1,876,374 tons. The tonnages of all commodities except petroleum, sugar and autos were lower than in the previous year. Shipments of wheat amounted to 38,552 tons as compared with 433,642 tons in the previous April, cargoes of barley decreased to 37,404 tons from 197,733, soft coal totalled 630,221 tons as against 733,483 and iron ore was down to 18,609 tons from 98,239.

ST. LAWRENCE CANALS: Opening 13 days later than in 1953, this canal reported that, during the month, 361 vessels totalling 316,071 net tons transported 344,685 tons of freight through the St. Lawrence system. In the previous April, 841 vessels of 776,719 net tons carried 910,686 tons of freight. The decrease thus amounted to 566,001 tons or 62.2 per cent. As at the Sault and Welland canals, practically all of the commodities were moved in lighter quantities than in the corresponding period of 1953. Wheat shipments were down to 73,663 tons from 307,057, berley dropped to 14,442 tons from 140,908 and soft coal was down to 77,343 tons from 133,101.
