1. Oil Pipeline Transport - February 1966

Net receipts of crude oil and equivalent,
liquefied petroleum gases and petroleum
products through Canadian oil pipelines during the month of February rose 7.0 per
cent to 42,523,554 barrels from 39,732,388 for the same period in the preceding year.
The principal receipts were 26,928,813 barrels of crude oil and equivalent (up 7.1
per cent), 8,577,270 barrels of imported crude (up 9.5 per cent) and 6,045,230 barrels of L.P.G.'s and products from refineries and bulk plants (up 1.6 per cent).

Net deliveries of petroleum and its products during the month increased 5.9 per cent to 42,444,835 barrels from 40,094,824 last year. Included in the month's deliveries were 25,379,670 barrels of crude oil and equivalent (up 2.7 per cent), 10,045,919 barrels of domestic crude for export (up 19.2 per cent) and 6,-191,307 barrels of L.P.G.'s and products to bulk plants and terminals (up 2.4 per cent).


Net receipts of all commodities for the two-month period rose 4.4 per cent to 88,078,341 barrels from 84,359,763 received for the same period in 1965. The principal receipts included 54,922,762 barrels of crude oil and equivalent (up 2.3 per cent), 18,387,527 barrels of imported crude (up 11.8 per cent) and 12,790,531 barrels of L.P.G.'s and products from bulk plants and refineries (up 1.5 per cent).

Net deliveries during this period rose 4.5 per cent to 87,913,443 barrels from 84,136,861 delivered in the previous year. Included in these deliveries were 54,136,878 barrels of crude oil, L.P.G.'s and products to refineries (up 1.8 per cent), 19,585,914 barrels of domestic crude for export (up 12.5 per cent), and 13,086,584 barrels of L.P.G.'s and products to bulk plants and terminals (up 3.5 per cent).

Trunk line deliveries for February averaged 1,507,864 barrels per day with total traffic amounting to 17,702 million barrel miles. The average length of haul was 419.3 miles.

Total oil held by Canadian pipeline systems amounted to 17,248,451 barrels by the end of February. Inventories of crude oil and equivalent held in Canada increased by 36,941 barrels while inventories of crude oil and equivalent held in Canada and the United States decreased by 35,516 barrels.

2. Refined Petroleum Products
Output of refined petroleum products rose 2.9% in
February to 29,560,094 barrels from 28,734,286 in
the same month last year, according to an advance release of data that will be contained in the February issue of the DBS report "Refined Petroleum Products".

Receipts of crude oil advanced 3.6% in February to 28,985,026 barrels from 27,982,537 a year earlier, comprising 0.7% less domestic crude at 17,042,148 barrels versus 17,154,032 and 10% more imported crude at 11,942,878 barrels versus 10,828,505. Domestic disappearance of finished petroleum products rose 4.9% to 37,846,278 barrels from 36,066,146 in the same month last year.



3. Crude Oil Requirements, First Seven Months 1966

Crude oil requirements of Canadian oil refineries for

the first seven months of 1966 are estimated to reach 1,032.5 thousand barrels per calendar day (M bbls/c.d.), an increase of 7.1% over actual receipts for the same period during 1965 (963.8 M bbls/c.d.). This estimate falls closely in line with the revised annual estimate of 1033.6 M bbls/c.d. which indicates a 6.9% increase over the actual 1965 refinery receipts of crude oil of 966.6 M bbls/c.d.

Crude oil imports for the first seven months of 1966 are estimated to increase 5.7% and reach 426.6 M bbls/c.d. (403.3 M bbls/c.d. 1965) while domestic sources are estimated to provide 605.9 M bbls/c.d. for 1966, an increase of 8.1% over 1965 receipts of 560.4 M bbls/c.d. for the same period.

Actual refinery receipts of crude oil as published in Refined Petroleum Products (No. 45-004) for the first two months of 1966 were 1,023.9 M bbls/c.d. (1,004.0 M bbls/c.d. 1965) and increase of 2.0%. Imports during this period remained the same during both years at 420.3 M bbls/c.d. with domestic sources during 1966 increasing 3.4% to 603.6 M bbls/c.d. from 583.7 M bbls/c.d. in 1965. Imports of refined petroleum products during this same two month period dropped from 65.7 thousand barrels per calendar day 1966 to 60.4 M bbls/c.d. 1965.
