BANK DEBITS TO INDIVIDUAL ACCOUNTS, MAY, 1937.

The amount of cheques cashed in the 32 clearing centres of Canada was \$2,769 million in May compared with \$2,979 million in the same month of last year. The decline of slightly more than 7 p.c. was due to the reduction in the number of working days and a recession in speculative trading. Three of the five economic areas recorded advances in this comparison, the exceptions being Ontario and the Prairie Provinces.

The gain in the Maritime Provinces was more than 14 p.c., increases being shown in each of the three clearing centres. While a decline of 3.4 p.c. was shown in Montreal, marked gains in the other centres of the Province resulted in a slight gain in the provincial total. The amount of cheques cashed in the province of Quebec was \$893,722,000 against \$891,798,000 in May of last year. A considerable decline was shown in Ontario, debits having been \$1,215 million, a recession of nearly 7 p.c. Nine of the thirteen centres in the Province recorded increases. The decline in Toronto was 8.8 p.c. and Ottawa showed a recession of considerable proportions.

Seven of the ten centres in the Prairie Provinces recorded increases over May of last year. The totals for Winnipeg and Regina, however, were at considerably lower levels and the net result for the economic area was a decline of 23.8 p.c. The total for British Columbia showed a gain of 3.4 p.c., gains being recorded in Vancouver and New Westminster, while Victoria showed decline.

Comparison with April after Seasonal Adjustment.

Declines were general in the five economic areas from the preceding month after seasonal adjustment. The Dominion total of \$2,769 million against \$3,376 million, showed an adjusted decline of 28 p.c. The drop in the Maritime Provinces was 20 p.c. Debits in Montreal were 29 p.c. below April after seasonal adjustment, and the total for the province of Quebec was down 28.4 p.c. A similar trend was shown in the province of Ontario, Toronto declining 36.4 p.c., while the provincial total was nearly 33 p.c. less. A contra-seasonal decline was shown in the Prairie Provinces, the adjusted total being down 23 p.c. Debits in Winnipeg normally increase between April and May, but a decline of 25 p.c. was shown after seasonal adjustment. The same trend was shown in British Columbia but the declines were of moderate proportions amounting to slightly more than 5 p.c. in Vancouver and well as in the Province as a whole.

Comparison with the First Five Months of 1936.

Twenty-eight out of thirty-two clearing centres recorded gains in the first five months of the present year over the same period of 1936. The total was \$15,294 million against \$14,111 million, a gain of 8.5 p.c. Each of the thirty-two centres in Canada, except Ottawa, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat and Winnipeg recorded gains in this comparison.

The increase in the Maritime Provinces was 30.5 p.c., Halifax recording the greater part of the advance. In the province of Quebec, marked gains were shown in the City of Quebec and Sherbrooke, while the increase at Montreal was 15.3 p.c. The net result for the Province was a gain of 16.5 p.c., the total for the first five months of the present year having been \$5,050 million. Toronto recorded a gain of 17.6 p.c., Hamilton was up 10 p.c., while a slight decline was shown in Ottawa. The total for the Province was \$7,082 million, a gain of nearly 15 p.c.

Owing mainly to the marked decline in Winnipeg, the total for the Prairie Provinces showed a decline of \$584 million from last year, amounting to 23 p.c. The gain in British Columbia was slightly more than 7 p.c., Vancouver having been 7.3 p.c. greater.

Comparison with Other Factors,

The index of bank debits on the base of 1926, after seasonal adjustment was 101.7 in May against 109.4 in May of last year. During the interval, the index of wholesale prices advanced from 71.8 to 85.1 and the index of common stock prices was more than 17 p.c. greater. Marked increase was also shown in the indexes of the physical volume of business and in employment in manufacturing plants. Speculative

trading was at a considerably lower level than in May of last year.

The sum of four classes of bank deposits in Canada amounted to \$2,383 million. As bank debits were about \$2,769 million, the percentage of debits to deposits was 116.2. This compared with 133.7 in May, 1936, and 142.5 in April of this year.
