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BANK DEBITS TO INDIVIDUAL ACCOUNTS, SEPTEMBER, 1942.

The amount of cheques cashed in the clearing centres of Canada was \$3,516 million in September compared with \$3,301 million in the same month last year. The increase of 6.5 p.c. indicated expansion in business activity at a somewhat higher level of commodity prices.

Each of the five economic areas, except the Prairie Provinces, recorded increases over September last year. The gains in the Maritime Provinces, Ontario and British Columbia ranged from 10 p.c. to 11.7 p.c., the greatest percentage gain having been shown in the Maritime Provinces. Advances were recorded in each of the three clearing centres of the area, the total moving up from \$78.4 million to \$87.6 million.

Gains were shown in the three centres of the province of Quebec. The net result was an increase from \$945 million to \$1,004 million. Bank debits in Toronto receded from \$961.6 million to \$888.1 million, but gains in other centres led to an increase in the aggregate of 10.7 p.c. The total was \$1,701 million against \$1,536 million in September last year. Eight of the ten centres in the Prairie Provinces recorded gains in this comparison, but a considerable decline in Winnipeg was reflected in a drop of 7.1 p.c. in the aggregate for the economic area. Bank debits in British Columbia were \$221 million compared with \$201 million in September last year, a gain of 10.1 p.c.

Comparison with the First Five Months of 1941.

Bank debits in the first nine months of the present year were \$32,292 million against \$28,502 million in the same period of last year, an increase of \$3,789 million or 13.3 p.c. The largest gain was shown in Ontario where the total rose \$2,518 million or 19 p.c. The increase in Quebec was from \$8,001 million to \$9,041 million, representing 13 p.c. Each of the areas recorded increases except the Prairie Provinces, the gain in the Maritime Provinces and in British Columbia having been 14.4 p.c. and 14.3 p.c., respectively.

Comparison with August after Seasonal Adjustment.

The amount of cheques cashed in August was \$3,480 million, a decline of 1.1 p.c. having been shown in September after seasonal adjustment. Quebec and Ontario recorded declines in this comparison while the three other economic areas showed advances.

Comparison with Other Economic Factors.

Cheques cashed against current accounts including demand and government deposits amounted to \$3,384 million in September against \$3,358 million in the preceding month. Charges to savings accounts rose \$10 million to \$131.9 million in September.

The circulating media in the hands of the public, including notice and subsidiary coin amounted to \$615.5 million in September against \$467.9 million in the same month last year. During the same interval, the four principal classes of deposits rose from \$3,031.4 million to \$3,311.1 million. It was estimated that the sum of the cash and cheque payments amounted to \$4,809 million against \$4,378 million in the same month last year. The increase in the money supply consisting of circulating media in the hands of the public and bank deposits recorded a gain of \$428 million during the last twelve months, amounting in September to \$3,927 million.

The national income according to a tentative computation was \$634,164,000 in August against \$571,462,000 in the same month of last year. The index on the base of 1935-1939 was 186.5 against 168.1 in the same month one year ago. The national income for the year 1942 was tentatively estimated at \$7.5 billion against about \$6.5 billion in the preceding year. Pending the receipt of further information, the estimates for the last two years must be regarded as subject to considerable change.




