

BANK DEBITS TO INDIVIDUAL ACCOUNTS

. Amount of Cheques charged against Bank Accounts at the Clearing Eouse Centres in October 1925.

The bank debits to individual accounts at the clearing house centres of Canada, as reported to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics were \$2,869,086,000 in October as compared with \$2,195,900,000 in September, representing an increase of about 30 p.c. Provided adjustment were made for seasonal tendencies according to the experience with bank clearings in the past 10 years, the October debits would show a very slight gain. The debits of last month were also greater than October 1924, a gain of more than 5 p.c. being shown,

The clearings in October were \$1,710,200,000 as compared with \$1,332,400,000 in September and \$1,771,900,000 in October, 1924, indicating a gain in the short comparison of 28 p.c. and a decline in the other of 3.4 p.c.

CUMULATIVE TOTALS IN DIRST TEN MONTHS

The total debits for the first 10 months of 1925 were \$22,213,800,000. as compared with \$21,924,000,000 in the corresponding period of 1924. The cumulative debits for Quebec province during the first ten months of 1925 were \$6,843,000,000 as compared with \$5,516.000,000 in this corresponding period of 1924, representing an increase of about 5 p.s. The debits for British Columbia have shown steady increases, the total for the 10 months of the present year being \$1,503,000,000 as compared with \$1,413,000,000 in the corresponding months of 1924. This is an increase of \$90,000,000, or more than six p.c. In the Prairie Provinces the debits were \$4,596,500,000 in the first 10 months of 1925 as compared with \$4,531,700,000 in the corresponding period of 1924, a gain of 1.4 p.c. The other economic areas show declines in this comparison, with the net result that the cumulative total for Canada during the present year was 1.3 p.c. greater than for the corresponding period of 1924.

ECONOMIC AREAS.

Maritime Provinces .- Mach of the three centres of the Maritime provinces showed increases in October when compared with the corresponding nunth of 1924. Halifax debits were \$26,173,008 as compared with \$21,159,069 in October, 1924, an increase of nearly 24 p.c. The debits of St. John increased nearly 4 p.c. in the same comparison. The debits in the Maritime profiles in October were \$50,908,754 as compared with \$45,033,785 in the corresponding month of 1924, an increase of about ! p.c.

Quebec .- The October debits of Quebec province showed in the long term comparison an increase of 9 p.c., the totals being \$863,844,000 in October last as compared with \$790,484,000. The advance was owing to the greater activity at Montreal where the debits increased 10 p.c. The totals at Montreal were \$803,234,483 in October, 1925, and \$729,605,285 in October 1924.

Ontario. Notwith standing that the October debits of 6 centres of Ontario showed increases in the long term comparison, while 5 showed declines, the debits for the whole province were 8 p.c. less than in October 1924. The increases at Brantford, Hamilton, Kitchener, Peterborough and Windsor were more than offset by declines at the remaining centres, especially at Toronto and Ottawa. The October debits in the whole province were \$1,103,188,000, as compared with \$1,203,024,000 in October 1924.

Prairie Provinces.— The October debits of the Prairie provinces showed a considerable gain in the long term comparison, the result was chiefly due to a gain at Winnibeg where the debits in October last were \$494,450,000 as compared with \$347,661,491 in October, 1924. Increases were also shown at six centres, including Brandon, Edmonton, Moose Jaw, Prince Albert, Saskatoon and Regina, the increase at the latter being 47 p.c.

British Columbia.— The debits in British Columbia in the month under review were \$168,106,832 as compared with \$157,492,663 in October 1924. Increases were registered at each of the centres, the gains at Victoria and New Westminster being 28 p.c. and 22 p.c. respectively.

The sublication of the October bank debits which would in regular course have been made on November 20th, was delayed until December 15th in view of the necessity of making an enquiry into the accuracy of the figures presented by the Winnipeg clearing house. As a result of the checking of the debits of Winnipeg, the published totals for October 1924 were revised and the Winnipeg totals for October of the present year are still subject to revision.




THE TURNOVER OF BANK DEPOSITS

The turnover of bank deposits, so far as it may be ascertained from the ratio of the debits to individual accounts at the clearing house centres during a given month to the bank deposits in Canada as at the end of the preceding month, was greater in October than in September last. There was an increase in bank deposits between September and October of 5.7 p.c. The ratio of bank debits to deposits for October was 154.3 p.c. as compared with 125.0 p.c. in September.


Bank Deposits and Bank Debits, and Ratio of Debits to Deposits, January 1924 to October 1925.








Note:- The bank debits during the first ten months of 1925 show a gain over the corresponding period of 1924. The bank clearings, on the other hand, exhibit a loss. This variation is doubtless due to the recent bank amalgamations, which have reduced the number of Canadian chartered banks from 15 to 12, obviously causing a curtailment of interbank transactions.
