BANK DEBITS TO INDIVIDUAL ACCOUNTS, JUNE, 1943.

The amount of cheques cashed recorded a gain of 15.5 p.c. in June over the same month of last year. The total was \$4,350 million compared with \$3,767 million, the advance in business operations and in wholesale prices accounting for the acceleration in banking transactions. Increases were recorded in each of the five economic areas. Only six of the thirty-three centres showed declines in this comparison. The gain in the Maritime Provinces was 12 p.c., the total rising from \$87.6 million to \$98.2 million. Gain in the cashing of cheques occurred in Montreal and Quebec, resulting in an increase of 32 p.c. in the provincial total. The rise was from \$976 million to \$1,287 million.

Ten of the fourteen clearing centres of Ontario showed advances over the same month last year. The aggregate for the province was \$1,928 million against \$1,889 million, a gain of 2.1 p.c. Each of the ten centres in the Prairie Provinces recorded marked gains over the same month of the preceding year. The provincial total was 33 p.c. higher at \$779 million against \$586 million in June last year. The advance in British Columbia was from \$229 million to \$257 million, a gain of 12 p.c. A considerable increase was recorded in Vancouver where the total rose from \$176 million to \$202 million.

Bank debits in the first half of 1943 were \$25,467 million against \$21,592 million in the same period of last year. The gain was \$3,876 million or 17.9 p.c. The greatest percentage increase was recorded in the Prairie Provinces where the gain was \$855 million or 27.4 p.c. The total in the first half of the present year was \$3,979 million against \$3,124 million in the same period of 1942. The aggregate for Quebec rose 23.3 p.c., the total in the elapsed portion of the present year having been \$7,310 million. The aggregate for Ontario was \$12,017 million against \$10,686 million, a gain of 12.4 p.c. The increase in Quebec was \$1,379 million, while that of Ontario was \$1,330 million. Bank debits in the Maritime Provinces were \$604 million, a gain of 15 p.c. over the same period of last year. Cheques cashoù in British Columbia rose \$233 million to \$1,558 million, a gain of 17.5 p.c.

Owing to heavy payments on the fourth Victory Loan in May, bank debits in the month under review showed a decline of 19.4 p.c. Bank debits in May were \$5,424 million while the June total, as mentioned above, was \$4,350 million. The decline in the Maritime Provinces, after seasonal adjustment, was 50.4 p.c. compared with the recession of 10.3 p.c. in Quebec. The decline in Ontario was of greater proportions, the drop having been 25.6 p.c. in Toronto, and 26.1 p.c. in Ontario as a whole. Bank debits in the Prairie Provinces were 2.8 p.c. less, while the adjusted increase in Winnipeg was 0.4 p.c. over the preceding month. The aggregate for British Columbia declined 35.2 p.c., the total for Vancouver being 30.5 p.c. lower.

The turnover of current accounts including Dominion, Provincial, and demand deposits, was 1.72 in May against 2.48 in the preceding month. Savings accounts also recorded a slackening in turnover, the rate being .102 against .164 in May. Cheques cashed against current accounts of the three different classes were \$4,173 million in June against \$5,108 million in the preceding month. Debits against notice deposits receded from \$316 million in May to \$177 million in June.

The index of bank debits on the base of 1935-39 was 147.5 against 127.7 in the same month last year. The standing in May after seasonal adjustment was 183.0. From June, 1942, to May of the present year, the advance in the index of the physical volume of business was from 200.0 to 231.8 Employment in manufacturing rose from 202.0 to 220.9 at the beginning of May this year. The indexes of the physical volume of business and of employment in manufacturing reflect the acceleration in productive operations established in response to war demand.

The increase in wholesale prices was from 95.8 in June last year to 99.5 in the month under review. The cost of living, based mainly on retail prices, rose from 116.7 to 118.5. A much greater percentage increase was recorded in common stock prices, the index in June having been 86.3 against 62.8 in the same month last year, a gain of more than 37 p.c.

The circulating media in the hands of the public consisting of bank notes and subsidiary coin was \$731 million against\$557.4 million in June last year, a gain of more than 31 p.c. The notes in the hands of the public rose from \$507 million to \$675 million. The sum of the four classes of deposits was \$4,152 million against \$3,117.6 million, a gain of more than one-third during the last twelve months. It is estimated that the cash and cheque payments in June were \$5,898 million against \$5,121 million in the same month last year, a gain of about 15 p.c. The money supply consisting of circulating media in the hands of the public and the bank deposits of the chartered banks rose from \$3,675 million to \$4,883 million, a gain of about 33 p.c.
