CHEQUES CASHED AGAINST INDIVIDUAL ACCOUNTS, JANUARY, 1944.

Cheques cashed in the clearing centres rose 15.7 p.c. in the first month of the year over January, 1943. The total was \$4,512 million compared with nearly \$3,900 million in the same month last year. The higher level of economic activity and a slight advance in wholesale prices was mainly instrumental in raising the amount of cheque payments.

Increases were shown in each of the five economic areas, the advances in the western provinces being of greater proportions than in the East. The total for the Maritime Provinces was \$96.8 million against \$83.8 million, a gain of 15.5 p.c. Active business conditions in the Montreal district were indicated by a considerable increase in bank debits, the total rising from \$1.025 million to \$1,199 million. The total for the Province of Quebec rose 16.4 p.o., the payments in January having been \$1,347 million. Ten of the fourteen centres in Ontario recorded advances, the aggregate having been 3.8 p.c. greater. The total for January was \$1,947 million. A total of \$1,098 million was recorded in Toronto while the increase in Ottawa was from \$437 million to \$486 million.

Each of the ten centres in the three Prairie Provinces recorded gains in January. The total was \$812 million, a gain of nearly 49 p.c. The rise in Winnipeg was from \$316 million to \$471 million. British Columbia made an excellent showing in this connection, the total having been \$310 million against \$238 million in January last year, an increase of 30.5 p.o. Gains were shown in each of the three clearing centres, the total for Vancouver rising from \$193 million to \$260 million.

Comparison with December after Seasonal Adjustment.

After seasonal adjustment, debits in January were 20.8 p.c. above the preceding month. Gains were general in the five economic areas in this comparison. The increase in the Maritime Provinces after the usual adjustment was 13.6 p.c. A gain of 26.3 p.c. was recorded in Montreal, while the aggregate in the Province of Quebec was 29.3 p.c. greater. After seasonal adjustment, cheques cashed in Winnipeg recorded a gain of 36 p.c., the total in January having been \$471 million.

Advances of 25.4 p.c. and 24.6 p.c. were shown in Vancouver and in the aggregate for British Columbia in the same comparison. The amount of cheques cashed in January is normally considerably less than in the preceding month. While the actual amounts shown for January in the present case were lower than in Docember, it is found that after seasonal adjustment the advances were fairly general.

Comparison with other Factors,

Estimating the grand total of cheques cashed in Canada by adding $12\frac{1}{2}$ p.c. to reported totals in the 33 clearing centres, the indicated amount in January was \$5,077 million compared with \$4,387 million in the same month last year. Total deposits at the beginning of the month were \$4,395 million, an increase of about 20 p.c. over the same date twelve months before. Dividing the amount of cheques cashed by the deposits, we find that the turnover in January was 1.16 times compared with 1.20 times one year ago.

The circulating modia in the hands of the public rose from \$681.5 million in January, 1943 to \$849 million in the month under roview. A considerable gain was shown in the notes in the hands of the public as well as in the subsidiary coin in circulation. Adding the circulating media in the hands of the public and the four main classes of bank deposits, the money supply amounted to \$5,244 million compared with \$4,334 million in January one year ago.

Cheques cashed against current accounts amounted to \$4,337 million in January compared with \$4,664 million in the preceding month, while cheques cashed against savings accounts declined from \$186.5 million to \$175.1 million. Each of the four classes of deposits showed marked advances during the twelve months. Notice deposits rose from \$1,673 million to \$1,948 million while Dominion deposits were \$662 million against \$417 million.

The advance in the amount of choques cashed against individual accounts was not an isolated phenomenon in January. The index of bank debits rose from 148.3 to 171.6 during the twelve months. Marked gains were shown in the index of the physical volume of business while significant increases occurred in employment in manufacturing plants and in wholesale prices. The index of the cost of living in January was 119.0 against 117.1 in the same month last year. The index of common stock prices rose about 7 p.c. in the same comparison.


