CHEQUES CASHED IN CLEARING CENTRES OF CANADA, DECEMBER, 1944

The cheques cashed at branch banks in thirty—three centres were \$60,677 million during 1944. As the standing during the preceding year was \$53,797 million, an increase of 12.8 p.c. or \$6,880 million was shown over the preceding year. Due to the record levels of economic activity and relatively high prices, the amount of cheques cashed in clearing centres was greater in 1944 than in any other year. In 1929, the culmination of the last prosperity period, the cheques cashed amounted to slightly less than \$47 billion, the increase over that year having been no less than 30 p.c.

Each of the five economic areas recorded considerable increase over 1943. The gain in the Maritime Provinces was 6.7 p.c., the amount having been \$1,328 million against \$1,244 million. The increase in the province of Quebec was from \$15.4 billion to \$17,2 billion, amounting to 12 p.c. The increase in Ontario was 9 p.c. over the high level of the preceding year. The gain was \$2.2. billion, resulting in a total of \$26.9 billion in the year under review. The greatest increase among the five economic areas was shown in the Prairie Frovinces where the gain was 24.9 p.c. or \$2,288 million. Cheques cashed in 1944 amounted to \$11,488 million against \$9,200 million. The increase in British Columbia was 13.3 p.c., resulting in a total of \$3,736 million.

Comparison with December, 1943

Cheques cashed in December were \$5,063 million compared with \$4,850 million in the same month of the preceding year. The gain during the twelve months consequently was 4.4 p.c. Each of the five economic areas, except the Prairie Provinces, recorded a gain in this comparison. The increase in the Maritime Provinces was 12.6 p.c., the advance having been from \$107 million to \$120.5 million. The increase in Quebec was from \$1,373 million to \$1,472 million. Advances were shown in Montreal and Sherbrooke, the net result being an increase of 7.2 p.c. in the provincial total. The total for Toronto was \$1,337 million in December against \$1,224 million in the same month of 1943. The provincial total for Ontario rose 5.1 p.c. to \$2,269 million. The total for the three Prairie Provinces was at a slightly lower position, the amount dropping from \$928 million to \$916 million. The increase in British Columbia was 1.2 p.c., the total in December having been \$285 million.

Equation of Exchange

The money supply on the latest available date was \$6,213 million against \$5,352 million twelve months before, an increase of 16 p.c. A somewhat similar percentage increase was shown in bank deposits subject to cheque, the gain having been from \$4,536 million to \$5,252 million. The circulating media in the hands of the public, consisting of notes and subsidiary coin, showed a gain of nearly 18 p.c., the total having been \$961.6 million against \$815.6 million.

Cash and cheque payments in the latest month for which statistics are available were placed at \$9,361 million against \$8,339 million. The cheque payments were estimated at \$7,692 while the cash payments were placed at \$1,669 million. An allowance of $12\frac{1}{2}$ p.c. is made for cheques cashed outside of clearing centres and estimated debits against accounts (except accounts of other banks) with the Bank of Canada. The velocity of circulating media, consisting of notes and coin, is assumed to be $16\frac{1}{2}$ p.c. greater than the velocity of bank deposits.

An index of bank debits on the base of 1935 - 39 = 100, rose considerably in the latest months for which statistics are available over the same month of 1943. The index of the physical volume of business and of employment in manufacturing showed recession. The index of common stock prices rose from 79.6 to 86.0 and the index of wholesale prices remained unchanged at 102.4.
