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## CHYQUES CASHED AGAINST INDIVIDUAL ACCOUTTS，NOVE：RER 1945

Cheques cashed in clearing centres in November were $\$ 8,581$ million compared wh th $\$ 6,671$ million in the same month of last year．The increase，due mainly to heavy pay－ ments on the 9 th Victory Lcan condecuently，was 28.6 per cent．Increases of considerable proportions were indicated for each of the five economic areas．Thirty of the 33 clear－ ing centres recorded advances in this comparison．

The increase in bank debits of the three clearing centres in the Maritime Provinces Wes more than 28 per cent over November，1944，the total having been $\$ 200$ miliion against $\$ 156$ millicn，Advances were shown in each of the three clearing centres of the area．The cheques cashed in the three clearing centres of Quebec recorded a gain of 29．7 per cent．Debits in Muntreal were nearly $\$ 2,300$ million as compared with $\$ 1,712$ million． A recession was shown in the city of Quebec，while Sherbrooke registered an inc rease．The greatest absolute increase for the five economic areas over liovember 1944 was recorded in Ontario，where the toth manced from $\$ 2,969$ million to $\$ 4.037$ million． 400 of the 14 clearine centres recorded advances in this comparison．The tota．for Toronto was $\$ 2,417$ million against $\$ 1,697$ million。 The increase in Ottawe was from $\$ 784$ million to \＄1，042 million。

The percentage increase for the Prairie Provinces was elightly more than 5 per cent． The total for the area ruse fron $\$ 1,237$ million to $\$ 1,300$ million．Advances were gene ral in each of the ten centres of the area．The advance in Winnipeg was more thon $\$ 10$ million to $\$ 769$ million．Each of the throe centres of British Colurbia showed advances in November． The total was $\$ 566$ million against $\$ 398$ million in the same month of 1944．A marked in－ crease was shown in the cheques cashed in Vancouver，the total rising from $\$ 330$ million to $\$ 472$ million．
Comparison with the Firet Fir even Months of 1944
Bank debits in the ilisss 11 months of the present year rose to a new high total of $\$ 62,300$ million．The total for the same period of last year was $\$ 55,614$ million．The consequent increase of $\$ 5 . y$ billion or 12 per cent represents a substantial advance in financial transactions during the yoar just drawing to a close。

The greatest percentage increase was shown in the Maritime Provinces where bank debits were $\$ 1,2 \mathrm{C}$ miliion in the elapsed portion of the present year compared with $\$ 1,207$ zillion in the sarie rionths of 1944．The increase was no luss than $\$ 209$ gillion or 17 per cent．The total for quevec rose $\$ 1,815$ rillion or 11.5 per cent，the total in the first $l l$ months for the province having been $\$ 17.6$ billion．

The absolute increase in Ontario was larger than in any other economic area，the total advance having been $\$ 4,064$ milion or 16 ．j per cent．The total during the first 11 months of the present year was nearly $\$ 28$ c 7 billion． 1 slight increase was shown in the cheques cashed in the ton centres of the Prairie Provinces．A gatn of nearly \＄41 rillion to $\$ 10.6$ billion was reconded．The cheques cashed in British Columbia were $\$ 4,008$ million， an increase of 16.2 per cent over the sarae period of 1944.

Cheques cashed in clearing centres during the first 11 ronths were greater in 1945 than in any other year in history．Inc reases were shown in each of the five economic areas over the preceiling jear，and the totals for each area were consequently at a new high position．The total foi the Maritime Frovinces was $\$ 1,416$ fillion compared with $\$ 733$ चillion，the noxitiun of the last major oconomic cycle culninating in 1929。 During the sane period cheques cashed in the Province of Quebec rose from $\$ 15_{\mathrm{s}} 1$ billion to $\$ 17.6$ billion．The total of $\$ 17.1$ billion cashed in Catario in 1929 advanced to $\$ 28.7$ billion in the period under reviewe Cheques casiod in the Prairie Provinces were $\$ 10.6$ billion compared with \＄＂， 2 billion in the year of reference．The advance in British Colurbia wes substantial，the total rising from $\$ 2.7$ billion to $\$ 4.0$ billion． Relation of Cheques Cashed to Other Factors

The index of bank debits on the base of $1935-39$ rose froin 220,4 in lioverber last year to 283.5 in the month under review．Cost of living and wholesale prices showod moderate advances durine the lasi 12 months．The index of conmon stocks which had been 86.0 in November last year rose to about 106．7．On the other hand，the indexes of the physical volune of business and employnent in manufacturing were at considerably lower levels in the latest month for which statistics are available．
Money Supply and Parmeais
During the lamoniri period ended October last，the money supply rose from $\$ 6,038$ million to $\$ 6,726$ million．The noney supply is regarded as consisting of bank deposits and of bank notes and subsidiary coin in the hands of the public．The advance in the 12 months was $11_{0} 4$ per cent or $\$ 688$ milion．The increase in financial transactions as denoted br cheques cashed and cash payments was 15.4 per cent greater during October than In the same nonth of 1941，The increase was from $\$ 7.068$ nillion to $\$ 8.156$ million．It was estinated that cash payments were $\$ 1.508$ cillion in October，while the total cheque payments mounted to $\$ 6,648$ ntilionc
