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CHEQUES CASHED AGAINST INDIVIDUAL ACCOUNTS, DECEMBER AND THE YEAR 1945.

Cheques cashed in the clearing centres of Canada rose to a new high position during the year recently ended. The total was \$68.4 billion compared with \$60.7 billion in 1944. Each of the five economic areas recorded increases not only over the preceding year but over any other year during the period of observation from 1924 to the present. A new maximum had been reached in 1944 and advances were recorded last year in each of the five economic areas. The increase in the Prairie Provinces was of moderate proportions while pronounced gains were shown in the other regions. The increase of 12.7 p.c. in the Dominion total reflected investment and speculative activities and slightly higher levels in prices.

The gain in the Maritime Provinces was 17 p.c., the total in 1945 having been \$1,554 million. Bank debits showed an increase of \$2,087 million in the three centres of Quebec. The total in the Province was \$19,309 million in 1945 compared with \$17,222 million in the preceding year. The greatest absolute increase was recorded in Ontario where the advance was \$4,640 million or 17.2 p.c. The total in the fourteen centres of the Provinces during the year just ended was \$31,543 million.

An increase of more than \$74 million was recorded in the Prairie Provinces, the total in 1945 having been \$11,562 million. The percentage increase in British Columbia was greater than in any other economic area. The total for the Province was \$4,416 million, an increase of 18.2 p.c.

The advance from 1929 the culmination of the last economic cycle was of pronounced proportions in each of the five economic areas. The Dominion total in 1929 was \$46,671 million, the increase to 1945 having been more than 48 p.c. The advance in the Maritime Provinces was from \$798 million to \$1,554 million. The Quebec total was \$19,309 million in 1945 compared with \$16,444 million at the peak of the last economic cycle. The increase in Ontario was from \$18,543 million to \$31,543 million. Cheques cashed in the Prairie Provinces in 1929 amounted to \$7,923 million, the advance having been to \$11,562 million in the year under review. The total in British Columbia was \$4,416 million in 1945 against \$2,923 million in the year of reference.

Cheques cashed in December were \$6,085 million, a gain of 20.2 p.c. over the preceding year. The gain in the Maritime Provinces was 14.3 p.c., the total last December having been \$138 million. Bank debits in the three clearing centres of Quebec were \$1,744 million in December against \$1,472 million in the same month of 1944; the increase having been 18.5 p.c. The aggregate for the fourteen clearing centres in Ontario for 1944 was \$2,268 million. The advance to last December was 25.4 p.c., the total having been \$2,846 million. Seven of the ten centres in the Prairie Provinces showed an increase in December over the same month of 1944. The total for the area was \$949 million against \$916 million. A marked increase was shown in British Columbia where the total in December was \$408 million against \$285 million, a gain of no less than 43.2 p.c.

Owing to the high level of November, 1945, due to heavy payments on the 9th Victory Loan, a considerable decline was shown in the last month of the year from the total of November.

An index of bank debits on the base of 1935 - 1939 rose from 171.5 in December, 1944, to 206.1 in the month under review. The indexes of the physical volume of business and of the employment of manufacturing, recorded considerable decline during the twelve months ended November. On the other hand, the index of prices of common stocks rose sharply from 86.6 in December, 1944, to 111.8 in December last. A minor advance was shown in wholesale prices during the twelve-month period. The money supply in November, the last month in which statistics are available, was \$7,261 million compared with \$6,213 million in the same month of the preceding year, the increase having been nearly 17 p.c. Deposits subject to cheque rose from \$5,252 million to nearly \$6,200 million. Advances were also shown in bank notes and subsidiary coin in the hands of the public.

Cash and cheque payments were estimated at \$12,179 million against \$9,361 million, the last quarter of 1945 having been characterized by heavy investment and speculative activities.
