CHEQUES CASHED AGAINST INDIVIDTAL ACCOLNTS, JUNE, 1946
Cheques cashed in the clearing centres of Canada were considerably greater in the first half of the present yoar than in the same period of 1945. The total was $\$ 34.5$ billion against \$32.7 billion, the increase having been 5.6 p.c. Advances were recorded in each of the five economic areas except the Prairie Provinces. The greatest percentage increase was shown in British Columbia where business transactions of this class ware nearly a third greater than in the same period of last year.

Cheques cashed in the Maritime Provinces rose 8.3 poc. over the high level of the first half of 1945. Cheque transactions in quebec were $\$ 10.2$ billion. an inc crease of $8.9 \mathrm{p.c}$. economic area. The total in Ontario was 15.15 billion, the increase having amounted to $4.2 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. Cheques cashed in the Prairie Provinces were 6.3 poc. less in the elapsed portion of 1946. The tctal was $\$ 5,069$ million compared vith $\$ 5,407$ million. Cheques cashed in British Columbia were nearly a third greater then in the same poriod of 1945 . The total was $\$ 2,662$ aillion compared with $\$ 2,022$ million the abo solute increase was nearly as great as that of Ontario.

Cheques Cashed in June Compared with the same Montr of 1945. -
The majority of the centres recorded an increase in cheques cashed in June over the same month of last year. Twenty-five of the centres showed gains compared with. the eight centres recording a lower level. The total for Canada was $\$ 5,609$ million against $\$ 6,086 \mathrm{million}$ in June last year. Increuses were shown in the Maritime Proa vinces, \&uebec and British Columbia, while a decline was recorded for Ontario and the Prairie Provinces.

The increase in the Maritime Frovinces was more than 14 puc.n advances having been shown in each of the clearing centres. The total was $\$ 139$ million compared with $\$ 122$ million in June, 1945. The aggregate for the Province of Quebec, \$1, 801 milli . compared with $\$ 1,705$ million. The increase of $5.6 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. reflected mainly the advance in the business transactions of kontreal. Increases were also shown, however, in Quebec and Sherbrooke.

Nine of the fourteen centres in Ontario recorded advances over the same month of last year. The totals for Ottawa and Toronto were at considerably low levelsa the deeline in these oities being the main influence in reducing the Provincial total by about 13 p.c. The aggregate for the Province was $\$ 2.445$ million comparar with "2, 817 milifon.

Seven of the ton centres in the Prairie Provinces recordod increases but the docline in three centres more than counter abalanced the upard movement in the mafaity of oities. Declines wero showr in Edmonton, Regina and Kinnipeg. The aggregate for the three Provinces was $\$ 796 \mathrm{million}$ against $\$ 1,089 \mathrm{million}$ in June last year, a dec cline of 27 p.c. Marked increase were shown in each of the three centres in British Columbia, the total for the province rising about 22 p.c. The Vancouver cheques cashed rose from 288 million to $\$ 341 \mathrm{milli}$.

Cheques Cashed against Current and Savings Accounts. -
The turnover of current deposits receded from 2.16 in Vay to 2.04 in June, while Dominion and Provincial balances and demand deposits receded from $\$ 2,660 \mathrm{million}$ to $\$ 2,576$ million. The cheques cashed declined in greater proportion. The turnover of
savings accounts was also at a lower position in the latest available pariod．The notice deposits rose from $\$ 3,238$ million to $\$ 3,306$ million whereas the cheques cashed against such deposits receded from $\$ 360$ million to $\$ 343$ million。

Comparison with Other Factors．$=$
The index of bank debits after seasonal adjustment recoded from 206 in June， 1945 to 190.2 a decine boing also shown from May of the present year．The factors indicating the volume of business receded from June of last year．The indexes of the physical volume of business and of employment in manufacturing plants were at a cona siderably lower level due mainly to the termination of war productiono Factors in－ dicating the trend of prices on the other hand were at a higher level．The index of camon stook prices advanced from 97.2 in May last year to 124.4 in the same month of this year．while more moderate advances were shown in wholesale prices and cost of living。

## Money Supply $=$

The money supply which had been $\$ 6.679$ milion in May last year rose to $\$ 7.106$ million in the corresponding month of 1946．A recession，however，was shown from the preceding month when the total was $\$ 7.190$ million Six classes of deposits with the chartered banks and the Bank of Canada showed an increase from $\$ 5,682$ million at the end of May 1945，to $\$ 6,047$ million on the same date of this year．The four classes of deposits with the chartered banks taken into consideration are the Dominicn and Provincial balances and the demand and notice deposits．The deposits with the Bank of Canada held for the Dominion Government and other parties exclusive of the chartered banks are also included．The notes in the hands of the public were $\$ 995.6$ million at the end of May compared with $\$ 937.2$ million on the same date of last year．The sube sidiary coin in the hands of the public was $\$ 62.7$ million compared with $\$ 59.8$ million one year ago．The three categories of deposits，bank notes and coin constitute the money supply．

Long Term Comparisons $=$
Statistics of cheques cashed in Canada and in five eoonomic areas are presented in Table 5 by halfeyears for the period from 1924 to 1946 ．In each of the five areas marked increases are shown in the last six months over the transactions of 1329．the culmination of the last major economic cycle。 An increase of $51 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$ ．was shown in the country－wide debits．The Maritime Provinces．Ontario and British Columbia recorded a greater percentage increase than the Dominion totals．The cheques cashed in the Maritime Provinoes were more than twice as great．while increases of 74 poco and 66 poc． were shown in British Columbia and Ontario．The gains in the Prairie Provinces and Quebeo were 43.5 poc．and 29 poc．respectively。

Marked increases were shown in the first six months of 1946 over the same period of 1938，the last full peace－time year．The Canadian total was more than two and oneo third times greater．The total for British Columbia was nearly three times as great． while increases of $176 \mathrm{p}, \mathrm{c}$ 。 and 131 poco were shown in the Prairie Frovinces and in Ontario．The gain in quebeo over the first half of 1938 was 117 poc．The two charts of this number portray the trend of debits in six centres from 1924 to 1945 and other centres will be presented in following issues．
