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## CHEQUES CASHED AGAINST INDIVIDUAL ACCOUNTS, DECEMEIR, 1947

Financial transactions in the form as represented by cheques cashed in clearing centres were greater in 1947 than in any other year. The total was $\$ 74,498 \mathrm{mil}$ lion, compared with $\$ 69,248$ million in the preceding year. The previous record was established in 1946, and the total for the year recently ended was consequently 7.6 per cent greater than the previous maximum. Each of the five economic areas recorded increases over 1946, the greatest percentage advance having been shown in British Columbia. Thirty-two of the 33 clearing centres rose to a higher position. Cheques cashed in Ottawa are dependent to a certain extent upon Government transactions, and a considerable percentage decline was shown from the level of 1946.

Each of the five economic areas, except Ontario, showed greater financial transactions of this class than in any other year. The increase in the Maritime Provinces over 1946 the preceding maximum was 9.1 per cent, Moncton and Saint John each showing gains of 12.2 and 12.1 respectively。 The gain in Quebec which broke all preceding records in 1947 was 10.5 per cent over 1946. A gain of 130 per cent was shown over 1938, the last full peace-time year. The advance over 1929, when the preceding major economic cycle reached a high point, was 39 per cent. While Toronto showed a gain of 1.5 per cent, the total for Ontario was slightly above 1946. The maximum in history for Ontario was reached in 1945 when the total was $\$ 31.5$ billion compared with $\$ 30.4$ billion during the year under review. Chatham recorded the greatest percentage increase in 1947 over the preceding year. The total was 245 million compared with $\$ 186$ million in 1946 。

The increase in the Prairie Provinces over the preceding year was 15.5 per cent, each of the ten clearing centres recording advance in this comparison. The largest percentage increases weye shown in Regina and Medicine Hat. The total for the area was greater than in any preceding year, an increase of 181 per cent having been shown over 1938. The increase in British Columbia was nearly 22 per cent, the absolute increase being greater than in any other province except Quebec and the Prairie Provinces. The gain in Vancouver was 22.2 per cent, and marked increases were shown in New Westminster and Victoria. The increase in British Columbia over 1938 was no less than 237.6 per cent, while a gain of 123.8 per cent was recorded over 1929.

Cheques cashed in Canad during December were 14.8 per cent greater than in the same month of 1946. Appreciable increases were shown in each of the five economic areas. Only 3 of the 33 clearing centres recorded a lower standing than in the same month of the preceding year. The increase in the Maritime Provinces was 17.5 per cent, Halifax and Saint John showing gains of 19 per cent. The advance in Montreal was 17.8 per cent, contributing to an increase of 18.3 per cent in the province as a whole. Ottawa and Kingston showed declines from the same month of the preceding year. While twelve centres in Ontario recorded increases, the gain in Toronto was 10.8 per cent, contrasting with the advance of nearly 5 per cent in Ontario as a whole.

The gain in the Prairie Provinces was 28 per cent, a decline having been shown in Lethbridge. The advance in Medicine Hat was 38 per cent, while a gain of 30.8 per cent was shown in Regina. Business was active in Winnipeg, the increase in financial transactions by cheque having been 31 per cent. Marked gains in business transactions were shown in each of the three centres of British Columbia. The New Westminster total rose 70 per cent, while Victoria showed an increase of 44 per cent. Cheques cashed in the province rose from $\$ 483$ million to $\$ 621$ million a gain of nearly 29 per cent.

## DEPOSIT TURNOVER

The turnover of current accounts was 2.34 in November against 1.98 in the same month of 1946. Current deposits showed a decline while cheques cashed against current accounts rose from $\$ 5.8$ billion to $\$ .4$ billion. A minor recession was shown in the turnover of the savings deposits in November, as compared with those in the same month of 1946.

## MONEY SUPPLY

The money supply at the end of November showed a decline of nearly 1 per cent from the same date of 1946. The notes in the hands of the public and the circulating medis, including subsidiary coin, each showed an increase of 1 per cent. The notice deposits were 7.2 per cent greater, while a decline of 2.5 per cent was shown in demand deposits. The net result was a decline of 1.2 per cent in the sum of six classes of deposits considered in this connection. The minor decline of the money supply in November constitutes a reversal of the upward movement in evidence for a considerable period.
