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## CHEQUES CASHED AGAINST INDIVIDUAL ACCOUNTS, JUNE, 1947

Business transactions as measured by the amount of cheques cashed recorded a considerable advance in June over the same month of last year. The total was $\$ 5,975$ million compared with $\$ 5,609$ million, the indicated increase having been 6.5 per cent. productive operations were at a much higher level in the current period than in the same month of last year. The level of employment was about 10 per cent higher than one year ago and the percentage of unemployment receded from 4.6 to 2.8 . The index of wholesale prices advanced from 141. 6 in June, 1946 to 164. 3 , while the index of the cost of living rose from 123.6 to 134.9 . Comnon stock prices were at a lower position in June than in the same month of last year, but a Hoderate increase was shown over the preceding month.

Cheques cashed recorded an advance in twenty-eight centres out of thirty-three. The aggregates for the central provinces showed recession, while the Mari imes, Prairic Provinces and Eritish Columbia recorded important increases over June of 1946.

## Maritimes

The increase in Halifax over one year ago was spectacular, a gain of 60.2 per cent having been recorded. The increasesfor Saint John and Moncton were relatively moderate. The advance in the aggragate for the area was 36 per cent.

## Quebec

The cities of Quebec and Sherbrooke recorded some advance over the levels of one year ago. The showing in the two centres was counteracted by a recession in Montreal, where the decline was 1.5 per cent. The total for the province was $\$ 1,786$ million against $\$ 1,801$ million in June, 1946。

## Ontario

Eleven of the fourteen centres in Ontario recorded gains over June of last year. Recessions in Ottawa and Toronto were 10.3 per cent and 4.7 per cent, respectively, while a minor recession was show in Samia. The net result was that the total for ontario at $\$ 2,402$ million was 1.7 per cent below the standing of last year.

## Prairie Provinces

Each of the ten centres in the Prairie Provinces recorded important gains in this comparison. The greatest percentage gain was recorded in Regina where the total rose from $\$ 67$ million to $\$ 95$ million, a gain of 43 per cent. An important increase was also shom in Winnipeg, the total amounting to $\$ 594$ million. The total for Calgary rose from $\$ 123$ million to $\$ 174$ miliion, a gain of no less than 40.8 per cent. The increase in Edmonton was 77.2 per cent, resulting in a total of $\$ 130$ million. The increase in the total for the three provirices at 36.4 per cent was
greater than in any other economic area. The total was \$1,085 million against \$796 million one year ago.

## British Columbia

The gains in Vancouver and New Westminster were 24.5 and 12 per cent,respectively, while Victoria showed a ninor recession. The gain in the provincial total was 19.5 per cent, the amount in June having been $\$ 512$ million.

Comparison with the First Half of 1946.
The advance in the f'irst half of 1947 over the same period of 1946 was again demonstrated when the cheques cashed anounted to $\$ 36,409 \mathrm{million}$ compared with $\$ 34,484$ million. The increase was $\$ 1,925$ miliion or 5.6 per cent. Ottawa and Toronto were the only centres among the thirty-three showing a recession from the same period of last year. Each of the five economic areas except Ontario recorded important advances.

Maritimes - The total for the Maritime Provinces was $\$ 850$ million, an increase of $\$ 64$ million over the first six months of 1946. The advances in Moncton and Saint John were 12 per cent or more, while an increase of 4.7 per cent was shom in Halifax.

Quebec - The relative increases in the three centres of Quebec were of a similar character, ranging from 14 per cent to 16 per cent. The increase in Montreal was $\$ 1.3$ biliion, the total in the first half of the present year having been $\$ 10.6$ billion. The consequent increase in the provincial totill was $\$ 1,459$ milion or 14.3 per cent. The standing for the province was $\$ 11,657$ miliion against $\$ 10,197$ million in the first half of 1946 .

Ontario - Twelve of the fourteen centres in Ontario recorded advances in the present comparison. The greatest percentage increase was shown in Chatham where the debits which hac been $\$ 87$ million in the first half of 1946 rose to $\$ 116$ million. The indicated increase was no less than 33.3 per cent. St. Catharines recorded the second relative advance, the total having been $\$ 145$ miliion against $\$ 117$ million. The consequent increase was 24 per cent or $\$ 28$ million. Cheques cashed in Turonto amounted to $\$ 10,116$ million, a decline of 3.2 per cent. The net result was a recession of 3.5 per cent in the provincial total. The anount for the first half of the present year was $\$ 15.2$ biliion.

Prairie Provinces - Bach of the ten centres in the Prairie Provinces recorded advances in the first half of the present year. The greatest percentuge increase was shown in Medicine Hat where the totai was $\$ 42$ million, a gain of nearly 26 per cent. An increase of 17.7 per cent was shown in Calgary where the total checiues cashed amounted to $\$ 843$ million. The debits in Winnipeg exceeded $\$ 3$ billion, the increase over the first half of 1946 having been 6 per cent. The total for the three provinces was $\$ 5,544$ million compared with $\$ 5,069$ million.

British Columbia - An increase of 17.8 per cent was recorded for the three centres of Eritish Columbia. The greatest percentage advance was shown in Vancouver, which mored up 19 per cent. The standing in the first six months was $\$ 2,571$ million against $\$ 2,161$ million. The total for British Columbia was $\$ 3,135$ million against \$2,662 million.

## Long Term Comparison

The cheques cashed in Canada were greater in the first six months than in any similar period of any year since the statistics were first collected. An advance of 59.4 per cent was shown over 1929 and 149.6 per cent over 1938. The totals for each of the five economic areas, except Ontario, were greater than in any other similar period. The total for Ontario was less than in 1946, but exceeded any other year. The preceding maximum for the Prairie Provinces was reached in 1944, but the total for 1947 attained a higher position.

The Maritime Yrovinces showed a greater relative increase over 1929 than any other economic area, while British Columbia recorded a greater relative increase over 1938. The gain in the Maritime Provinces over the culmination of the last economic cycle reached in 1929, was nearly 120 per cent. The advance in British Columbia over the first six nonths of 1938 was no less than 250.8 per cent. The Prairie Provinces showed an increase of more than 200 per cent over 1938, while the Province of Quebec recorded an advance of 148 per cent over the same half-year.

## Tumover of Current and Savings Accounts

The turnover of current deposits was 2.30 in May compared with 2.04 in the same month of last year. Deposits of this type receded from $\$ 2,824$ million in May last year to $\$ 2,802$ million in the latest month for which statistics are available. Cheques cashed against these accounts however, rose from $\$ 5,756$ million to $\$ 6,442$ million.

The turnover of savings accounts was slightly lower in May than in the same month of last year. The deposits averaged $\$ 3,660$ million against $\$ 3,272$ million. The increase in the cheques cashed against savings deposits was from $\$ 360$ million to $\$ 399$ million. By division it is determined that the turnover in May was . 109 against . 110 in the same month last year.

## Money Supply

The money supply of Canada consisting of currency and deposits rose 4 per cent over the same month of 1946. The total was $\$ 7,594$ million, the increase in the deposits having been greater than in the amount of currency. Notice deposits at the end of May were 13.4 per cent greater than on the same date of last yeur. Demand deposits, on the other hanc, showed a decline of 7 per cent. The net result was that the deposits consisting of four classes with the chartered banks and two classes with the Bank of Canada showed an increase of 4.3 per cent. Notes and subsidiary coin in the hands of the public amounted to $\$ 1,091$ miliion, an increase of 3 per cent.
