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## CHEQUES CASHED AGAINST INDIVIDUAL ACCOUNTS, JULY, 1947

Further advances in economic activity and prices were reflected by an increase of 10.4 per cent in the cheques cashod during July compared with the same month of last year. The total was $\$ 6,124$ million, compared with $\$ 5,547$ million. Increases were shown in each of the five economic areas, the greatost percentage gain having been shown in British Columbia. Iwenty-eight of the thirty-three clearing centres recorded advances over July, 1946.

Maritimes - The increase in the total for the Maritime Provinces was 6 per cent, the tatal in July having been $\$ 152$ million. Moncton showed the greatest percentage increase followed by Saint John and Halifax in the order named.

Qusbec - The total for Quebec in July was $\$ 1,970$ million, an increase of 9.6 per cent over a year ago. The gain in Montreal was 12 per cent, while Sherbrooke showed an advance of nearly 16 per cent. A recession was recorded in Quebsc where the total receded from $\$ 185$ million to $\$ 164$ million.

Ontario - Ottawa and Toronto alone of the fourteen centres in Ontario showed declines in July. A minor advance was reported in the aggregate for the province, the total in July having been $\$ 2,376 \mathrm{milli}$ on. The greatest percentage increase was shown in Winds or followed by Sudbury and Peterborough.

Prairis Provinces - Prince Albert and Brandon were the only contres in the Prairie Provinces recording a decline. The total for the whole-area was $\$ 1,061$ million compared with $\$ 832$ million, the increase being no iess than 27.5 per cent. A marked gain was shown in Winnipeg, where the total rose from $\$ 430$ million to $\$ 592$ million. Large gains were also recorded in Regina, Medicine Hat, Moose Jaw, Edmonton and Lethbridge.

British Columbia - Cheques cashed in British Columbia were $\$ 565$ million against $\$ 4 \overline{13}$ million, an increase of 36.7 per cent. The advance in Vancouver was no less than 42.4 per cent, the total having been $\$ 469$ million against $\$ 329$ miliion.

Comparison with the First Seven Months of 1946 - Thirty one of the clearing centres in Canada recorded advances in the first seven months of 1947 over the same period of the preceding year. The total was $\$ 42.5$ billion compared with $\$ 40$ billion in the same period last year. Advances were shown in each of the five economic areas except Ontario, where the decline in Ottawa and Toronto resulted in a recession.

Maritimes - The increase in the Maritime Provinces was 7.8 per cent, the total having been $\$ 1,002$ million compared with $\$ 929$ million. An increase of 13.4 per cent was shown in Moncton, while appreciable advances were reported in Saint John and Halifax.

Quebec - The aggregate for the Province of Quebec was $\$ 13.6$ billion, an in-

billion, resulting in a cain of 13.9 per cent.

Ontario - The total for Cntario was about 3 per cent less in the first seven months of the present year. 'Welve of the fourteen clearing centres recorded advances in this comparison. The increase in Hamilton was 20.4 per cent, the total in the present year having been $\$ 984$ million. The total for Windsor advanced fror \$528 million to $\$ 622$ million, an increase of 17.8 per cent having been indicated.

Prairie Provinces - The total for the Prairie Provinces in the first seven months was $\$ 6,605$ million compared with $\$ 5,901$ million. Each of the ten centres participated in the advance of 11.9 per cent in the acgregate for the economic area. The greatest percentage increase was show in Medicine Hat where the total was 27.5 per cent greater. Marked increases were also recorded in Regina and Lethbridge.

British Columbia - The active conditions in British Columbia wore reflected in the increase of 20,3 per cent in the first seven months over the same period of 1946. The main influence was or advance of 22 per cent in Vancouver, the total in the present year having been \$3,040 million.

Long Term Comparisons - Cheques cashed in the first seven months of the present year were greater than in any other year in history. The total of \$42,533 million was greater by 58.5 per cent than in 1929 and 149.4 per cent above 1938 . Each of the five economic areas except Ontario recorded bank debits ereater than in the same period of any other year. The total for Ontario was exceeded only by the maxima reached in 1945 and 1946. The liaritime Provinces showed the greatest percentage incroase over 1929, the maximum of the last major econoaic cycle, while British Columbia recorded the greatest relative increase over 1933, the last full pre-war year.

The increase in the Maritime Provinces over 1929 was from $\$ 466$ million to $\$ 1,002$ million. The gain in British Columbia in 1947 over 1938 was 251 per cent, the total rising from ${ }^{\text {Bla }} 1,054$ million to $\$ 3,700 \mathrm{million}$. The Prajrie Provinces showed a gain of 209.6 per cent over 1938, and British Columbia recorded an increase of 110 per cent over 1929, compared with 115 per cent in the Maritime Provinces.

Relation of Cheques Casher to Other Factors - The index of cheques cashed on the basis of 1935 - 39 was 219.9 in July against 199.1 in the sane month last year, a gain of 10.4 per cont. During the same interval, the index of wholesale prices rose 20.5 per cent from 142.4 in July last year. Cost-of-1iving was 8.6 per cent higher, while a decline of 0.7 per cent was shown in the index of common stock prices. Employment in eight main industrial groups, exclusive of finance, rose from 156.4 in June 1946 to 169.9 in the same month of this year, a gain of 8.6 per cent. A sharp decline was shown in the percentage of unemployed as reported by the Unemployment Insurance Branch. The increase in the index of industrial production in June over the same month of last year was about 11.6 per cent. The increase in hank debits was consequently based upon advances in productive operations and in commodity prices.

Turnover in Current and Saving Accounts - The turnover in current deposits showed an appreciable increase in june over the same month last year. The cheques cashod against such accounts rose from $\$ 5,267$ million to $\$ 5,611$
million, while the current deposits rose only from $\$ 2,639$ million to $\$ 2,644$ million. The net result was that the velocity of current accounts was 2.12 in June against 2.00 in the same month of last year.

Owing to the greater increase in savings doposits than in the cheques cashed against such accounts, the turnover receded slightly in June from the same month of last year. Cheques cashed against savings accounts were $\$ 364$ million in June against $\$ 343$ million in the same month of last year, while the deposits rose from $\$ 3,335$ million to $\$ 3,663$ million. The turnover in June was 0.101 against 0.103. The turnover of both current and savings accounts was less in June than in the preceding month. The statistios are given in Tables 4 and 5 on Page 9.

Monoy Supply - The money supply, consisting of notes and subsidiary coin in the hands of the public and deposits subject to cheque with the chartered banks and the Bank of Canada, was 6.1 per cent greater at the end of June than on the same date last year. The deposits showed an increase of 7 per cent, the total having been $\$ 6,312$ million compared with $\$ 5,900$ million. Notice deposits recorded an increase of 8.3 per cont, while the total deposits with the chartered banks, considered in this connection, were 6.9 per cent greater. The circulating media in the hands of the public. consisting of bank notes and subsidiary coin, recorded an increase of 1 per cent only during the twelve-month period.
