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## CHEQUES CASHED AGAINST INDIVIDUAL ACCOUNTS SEPTEMBER 1947

As measured by the amount of cheques cashed economic activity was greater in September than in the same month of last year. While the gain was less than in preceding months the favourable comparison with corresponding periods in 1946 was continued in september. The aggregate was $\$ 5,934$ million, a gain of nearly one per cent over September last year. Increases were recorded in three of the five economic areas, the exceptions being Quebec and Ontaric. The greatest percentage increase was shown in the Meritime Provinces, while the advance in British Columbie was of large proportions.

## Maritime Provinces.-

Each of the three centres in the Maritime Provinces recorded gains over the same month of last year. The net result for the area was an increase of 22.5 per cent. Halifax and Moncton showed increases greater than the average for the economic area. The total for the three centres was $\$ 142$ million against $\$ 16$ million in September 1946.


#### Abstract

Quebec. Owing to the recession in Montreal, the total for Quebec was at a lower position than in September one year ago. Advances of nearly 40 per cent and 22 per cent were shown in Quebec and Sherbrooke, while Montreal recorded a decline of slightly more than 10 per cent. The provincial total was $\$ 1,714$ million against $\$ 1,828$ million.


## Onterio.-

Twelve of the fourteen centres in ontario recorded advances in this comparison. The greatest percentage increase was shown in Kitchener, where the cheques cashed were more than one-third greater than in September 1947. An excellent showing was made in Chatham, Sudbury, Windsor and Fort William. Fecessions from the high level of last year were shown in Ottawa and Sarnia. The totel for Toronto was $\$ 1,602$ million compared with $\$ 1,546$ million. The total for the province was 3.5 per cent lower at $\$ 2,426$ million.

## Frairie Proyinces.-

Eight of the ten centres in the Prairie Provinces reported cheques cashed in larger amount than in the same month of last year. The exceptions were Famonton and Moose $J_{2}{ }^{*}$. The total for Winnipeg showed an increase of 15.3 per cent at $\$ 678$ million. The total for the ten centres in the area advanced 13.7 rer cent.

## British Columbia.-

Each of the three centres in British Columbia recorded advances. The increase in Vancouver was more tian 21 oer cent to 408 million. The total for the province rose from $\$ 424$ million to $\$ 507$ million, an increase of 19.4 per cent.

## Comparison with the First Nine Months of 1946.-

Thirty-one of the thirty-three clearing centres recorded advances in the first nine months of the present year over 1946. The total for Canada was 5.7 per cent greater at $\$ 53,704 \mathrm{million}$, an increase of $\$ 2,916 \mathrm{million}$, reflecting the greater business activity and the higher level of prices.

## Maritime Provinces.-

Increases were shown in each of the three clearing centres of the Maritime Provinces in the first nine months. The total was $\$ 1,272$ uillion, a gain of 8.4 per cent. The greatest percentage increase was shown in Moncton, followed by Saint John and halifax in the order named. The greatest absolute increase, however, was recorded in Halifax where tine total was \$679 million.

Quebec.-
The total for the province in the first nine months was 10 per cent greater at $\$ 16,888$ million. The advance in Montreal was 9.5 per cent, the total of $\$ 15,277$ million comparing with $\$ 13,954$ million in the same period of last year.

## Ontario.-

In the Ontario area recessions were shown in Ottawa and Toronto, the remaining centres reporting advances over the first nine months of 1946. The cheques cashed in Toronto amounted to $\$ 14,625$ million compared with $\$ 22,101$ million in the clearing centres of the province. The cheques cashed in Ottawa and Hamilton were also in excess of one billion dollers in the period under review. The total for Ottawa was $\$ 2,946$ million compared with $\$ 3,850$ usllion. An increase of nearly 20 per cent, however, was shown in Hamilton. The grontest percentage increase was recorded in Chatham, where the total moved up from $\$ 130$ ailion to $\$ 171$ million。Important increases were shown in Sudbury and St. Catharines, where the percentage gus.is were 25.1 and 21.6 , respectively.

## Prairie Provinces.-

Each of the ten clearing centres in the Praivie Provinces recorded advances in the first nine months. The increase in Winnipeg wes 12 per cent, the total in the first nine months of this year having been $\$ 4,855 \mathrm{million}$. Calgary reported second place in this connection. The total was $\$ 1,288$ million, an increase of nearly 16 per cent having been indicated over the first nine months of 1946. The greatest percentage increase was shown in Mediclne Hat where the total moved up from $\$ 53$ million to $\$ 69$ million. An absolute increase of $\$ 154$ million was shown in Regina, the percentage increase having been 22.6 The total for the Prairie Provinces was $\$ 8,698 \mathrm{million}$, an increase of 12.8 per cent.

## British Columbia.-

Each of the three centres in British Columbia recorded increases, the total for the province having been $\$ 4,745$ million, an advance of 22 per cent. The increase in Vancouver was outstanding at 23.6 per cent, tie total in the first nine months having been $\$ 3,890$ million.

Long-Terra Compari Son:-
Four of the five economic areas showed a larger amount of cheques cashed In tine first nine montins of 1947 than in any other year on record. The exception was Ontario where the total for 1946 was somewhat greater than for the first nine montis of the present year. The Canadian total was 143 per cent greater than in 1938 and 58.1 per cent larger than in 1929, the high point of the last major economic cycle. The Maritime provinces recorded an increase of 115.6 per cent over 1923, while the gain in British Columbia was 239.5 per cent over 1938. British Columbia also showed an increase of 114.7 per cent over 1929 and the Prairie Provinces held second place in the percentage increase over 1938.

## Turnover of Current and Savings Accounts.-

Cheques cashed against current accounts were $\$ 4,926$ million in August of the present year against $\$ 4,566$ million in the same month of 1946. The current deposits showed an increase from $\$ 2,605$ million to $\$ 2,678$ million. The outcome was that the turnover of current accounts was 1.84 in August against 1.75 in the same month of last year. The turnover of savings accounts receded from 0.087 to 0.083 . Cheques cashed against savings accounts were $\$ 310$ million in August against $\$ 300$ million in the same month last year. The savings deposits rose from ${ }^{2} 3,438$ million to $\$ 3,731$ million. Consequently the velocity of current accounts was slightly greater than in August 1946, while the turnover of savings accounts was slightly less.

The index of cheques cashed was 227 in September against 225.4 in the same month of 1946. Volume and prices are ruling at a much higher level this year The employment index in eight industries in August was 177.3 against 159.1 in the same month last year. The unemployment percentage dropped considerably from the levels of one year ago. The index of wholesale prices was 169.7 in August against 141.8 and the cost of living in September was 139.4 against 125.5. Common stock prices were slightly lower in September this year than in the same month of 1946.

Money Supply:-
Money supply was 5 per cent greater at the end of August tian on the same date of last year. The deposits showed a gain of 5.6 per cent, while the circulating media, consisting of notes and coin in the hands of the public, were nearly 1.8 per cent greater. Demand deposits receded 4.2 per cent, while notice deposits rose nearly 9 per cent.
