

## CHEQUES CASHED AGAINST INDIVIDUAL ACCOUNTS, FEBRUARY, 1948

The amount of cheques cashed was \$5,551 million in February, a decline of about one per cent from the same month of last year. Advances were recorded in twenty-five of the thirty-three clearing centres, and the totals for the Maritimes, Prairie Provinces and British Columbia were greater than in the same month of last year. A gain of 25 per cent was shown in the Maritime Provinces, while the total for the Prairie Provinces was 15 per cent greater. The increase in British Columbia was limited to 4.3 per cent.

Advances were shown in cheques cashed in each of the three clearing centres of the Maritime Provinces, over February of last year. The greatest percentage increase was shown in St. John, where the total rose from \$37 million to \$59 million. Owing to the reduced level of the business transactions of this type in Montreal, the aggregate for the province of Quebec was 4.3 per cent less than in the same month last year. Considerable percentage increases were shown in Quebec and Sherbrooke, the total for the province having been \$1,593 million compared with \$1,770 million in February last year.

Eleven of the fourteen centres in Ontario recorded advances in this comparison. Owing to the decline in Ottawa, Toronto and Chatham, the provincial total was 5 per cent less. The greatest percentage increase was shown in Hamilton, where the total rose from \$11.5 million to \$140 million. The total for Windsor was one-fifth greater than in February last year, the standing having been nearly \$91 million. The net result for the province was \$2,412 million against \$2,539 million, one year ago.

Seven of the ten centres in the Prairie Provinces recorded gains in this comparison. The total for the whole was 15 per cent at \$808 million. The greatest percentage increase was shown in Brandon, where a gain of 30 per cent was recorded. An excellent showing was made by Winnipeg and Saskatoon, where an increase of about 20 per cent was shown. The gain in British Columbia was 4.6 per cent, Vancouver and New Westminster contributing to the result. A considerable recession was shown in Victoria, where the total was \$60 million compared with \$87 million last year.

LONG TERM COMPARISON

Cheques cashed in the first two months of 1948 were greater than in any other similar period in history. The total was \$12,042 million compared with \$11,815 million in the preceding year. The increase over 1958 was 161 per cent while the level was 60 per cent greater than in 1929, when conditions in Canada were part-

icularly prosperous. Three of the economic areas recorded a new maximum for the first two months of the year, Quebec and Ontario showing a somewhat lower level than one year ago. The maximum for Ontario was reached in the first two months of 1946, while the maximum for the province of Quebec was recorded in 1947.

The total for the Maritime Provinces was 134 per cent greater than in the same period of 1929, and was about three times as great as in 1938. The gain in British Columbia, where the total for the first two months exceeded \$1 billion for the first time, was 124 per cent over 1929, and 268 per cent over 1938.

#### CURRENT AND SAVINGS ACCOUNTS

Cheques cashed against current deposits were \$6,130 million in January compared with \$5,895 million in the same month of 1947. As the current deposits showed a decline, the turnover rose from 2.01 one year ago, to 2.28 in the first month of this year. An increase was also shown in the velocity of notice deposits.

#### RELATION TO OTHER FACTORS

As stated above, a minor decline was shown in the cheques cashed in February, compared with the same month of last year. The cost of living advanced 17.4 per cent during the same interval. Common stock prices, on the other hand, receded nearly 7 per cent. Two additional factors considered in this connection recorded increases during January over the same month of 1947. The index of employment in eight industries rose 7 per cent, while wholesale prices were 28.6 per cent greater. Unemployment, however, was somewhat greater in January than in the same month one year ago.

MONEY SUPPLY

The money supply showed a decline of nearly 1 per cent at the end of January, compared with the dame date of last year. The total was \$7,479 million against \$7,545 million. The money in the hands of the public, consisting of notes and subsidiary coin, was placed at \$1,094 million, an increase of 1.3 per cent. The deposits subject to cheque receded from \$6,466 million to \$6,386 million at the end of January, a decline of 1.2 per cent. Notice deposits rose 8.2 per cent, while current accounts were somewhat lower.
