# CHEQUES CASHED AGAINST INDIVIDUAL ACCOUNTS MARCH, 1949

Business transactions in the form of cheques cashed rose 10.8 per cent in March over the same month of last year. Thirty of the 33 clearing centres participated in the advance. The aggregate for each of the five economic areas except the Maritimes showed a gain over the same month of 1948. Business activity showed expansion throughout the greater part of the country. Industrial production in February, however, was at a slightly lower level than in the same month of last year, while wholesale prices recorded a gain of 7.3 per cent.

The increase in the bank debits of Moncton was 14.6 per cent over March, 1948. Due to the recession in Halifax and Sairt John, the aggregate for the Maritimes showed a decline of 2.7 per cent. Gains were general in the three centres of the province of Quebec, the total in Montreal having been \$1,704 million in March. A considerable percentage gain was shown in the city of Quebec, the total moving up 18.4 per cent. Cheques cashed in the province were \$1,995 million against \$1,892 million one year ago.

Thirteen of the 14 centres in Ontario recorded gains over the same month of last year, Fort William having been the exception. The greatest percentage increase was shown in Ottawa, the total having moved up 55.4 per cent. Important relative gains were also shown in Chatham, Sudbury and Windsor. The total in Toronto showed a slight percentage gain over March of last year, the amount having been \$1,871 million. The aggregate for the 14 centres was slightly more than nine per cent greater than in the same month last year.

Each of the ten centres in the Prairie Provinces recorded an advance, a marked percentage increase having been shown in Regina, Calgary, Edmonton and Lethbridge. The gain in Winnipeg was 25.2 per cent, the total in March moving up to \$580 million. The net result for the economic area was a gain of no less than 28.3 per cent, the total having been \$1,124 million compared with \$876 million. In Vancouver, the cheques cashed amounted to \$524 million, an increase of 15 per cent. The grand total for British Columbia was \$621 million, an increase of 13 per cent having been indicated.

The general result for Canada was \$6,868 million, a gain of 10.8 per cent having been shown over the \$6,196 million, the total for March, 1948.

## Comparison With the First Quarter of 1948.

The cheques cashed in the first quarter of this year were greater for Canada and for each of the economic areas than in any other similar period. The country-wide total was \$19,772 million compared with \$18,238 million last year. The Prairie Provinces recorded the greatest percentage increase in this comparison, nine

of the ten centres having shown advances. The gain in Winnipeg was 10.6 per cent while the total for the three provinces recorded an advance of 15.7 per cent. British Columbia was second in respect to the percentage increase during the first quarter. The gain in Vancouver was 10.4 per cent, contributing greatly to the advance of the total for the province.

Fort William was the only centre in Ontario to show a decline, advances having been recorded by thirteen of the fourteen centres. The gain in Chatham was 31.5 per cent followed by Sudbury with an advance of 25.7 per cent. Cheques cashed in Montreal rose 8.6 per cent compared with the first quarter of 1948. Appreciable increases were indicated for Quebec and Sherbrooke. Halifax and Moncton showed gains in the Maritime area while St. John showed a recession of seven per cent.

### Long-Term Comparison

Cheques cashed in the first quarter of 1949 recorded an increase of 71.9 per cent over the same period of 1929 and the level of 1938 was exceeded by 183 per cent. The greatest percentage gain of the five economic areas over 1938 was shown in British Columbia, followed closely by the Prairie Provinces. The Maritimes showed an increase of 132 per cent over 1929 and 201 per cent over 1938.

#### Deposit Turnover

The turnover of current accounts placed on an annual footing was 22.20 in February against 24.99 in the same month of last year. Increases were shown both in cheques cashed and in deposits but the increase in the deposits was relatively greater. The turnover of savings deposits increased slightly. On an annual basis the turnover was 0.95 against 0.93 in February, 1948. Savings deposits during February were \$4,139 million against \$3,852 million in the same month of 1948. Cheques cashed against such accounts rose from about \$300 million to \$327 million.

#### Economic Setting

Cheques cashed rose in March by 10.8 per cent over the same month of 1948. The rise in wholesale prices according to the general index number was 7.3 per cent during the twelve-month period ended last February. Producers' goods had advanced 10.8 per cent, while consumers' goods were 4.5 per cent greater. The increase in raw and partly manufactured goods was 9.4 per cent, contrasting with the increase of 3.6 per cent in fully and chiefly manufactured. The cost of living in the twelve months ended March showed an increase of 5.6 per cent.

The index of employment in nine leading industries showed a gain of 1.2 per cent on the first of February over the same date of 1948. Mining rose 16.4 per cent. As the average weekly earnings were 10.5 per cent greater, the aggregate payrolls rose 12.3 per cent.






