

The business transacted by the Canadian people was greater in January than in the same month of last year. Cheques cashed in clearing centres exceeded $\$ 7$ billion, being greater than in the same month of any other year. The increase in the countrywide total over one year ago was 5.5 per cent. The advance occurred in the three eastern economic areas, recessions having been shown in the totals for the Prairie Provinces and British Columbia. The largest percentage increase in January occurred in Edmonton where debits were greater by $\$ 30$ million or 22 per cent.

## The Centres

The situation in the Maritimes was affectad by the inclusion of St. John's, Newfoundland where the cheques cashed in January were $\$ 37$ million。 An increase of 9.2 per cent was shown in Halifax while recessions were observable in Moncton and Saint John.

Due mainly to advances in Montreal and Guebec, particularly the former, the total for the province rose 10.2 per cent. The business transactions of this type were more than $\$ 2$ billion in Montreal, an increase of 11.2 per cent over last year.

Ten of the fourteen centres of Ontario recorded advances over January 1949. The greatest percentage increase was shown in London, the total moving up 17 per cent to over $\$ 100$ million. Relative advances over last year were also shown in Windsor, St. Catherines and Hamilton. The gain in Toronto was 5.6 per cent, resulting in a total of $\$ 2,115$ million. The aggregate for the province was $\$ 3,105 \mathrm{million}$, representing a gain of 6.8 per cent.

Three of the centres in the Prairie Provinces including Edmonton, Regina and Brandon showed a betterment in this connection. The gain in Regina was 12.7 per cent or nearly $\$ 13$ million. The decline in the total for the province was 2.1 per cent.

A recession was shown in the cheques cashed in Vancouver and Victoria while a minor increase was recorded in New Westminster. The net result for the country as a whole was an increase of nearly $\$ 379$ million to a total of $\$ 7,307$ million.

Historical Comparison

The cheques cashed in Canada and in three of the economic areas were greater in Janyary than in any other year. The total for Ontario exceeded $\$ 3$ billion for the first time. The aggregates for the Maritime Provinces and Quebec were in excess of the totals in January, 1949. The standing in the Prairie Provinces was more favourable in January than in any other year except 1949. The total for British Columbia was surpassed in the same month of 1948 and 1949.

## Economic Setting

Cheques cashed during 1949 exceeded, month by month, the standing of the preceeding year. The tuilding permits issued in 58 municipalities were also, except. for the summer months, ascendant over the corresponding month of the preceeding year. The record of railway freight loadings was less favourable last year than in 1948. The general index of inventories of manufacturing concerns remained considerably greater during the early part of 1949 than in the same months of 1948. More recently, commencing with October, the general index has shown a decline below the standing of the preceeding year. The lower level in recent months suggests that excessive inventories have been reduced. A rise in bond prices in the last twelve months is indicated by the section on bond yields plotted on an inverted scale.

The volume of production in December as shown by the index of Industrial Production was only slightly higher than one year before. The volume of production in manufactures and mining showed declines in this comparison. The index of wholesale prices was 1.8 per cent below the level reported in December, 1948.

The cost of living index for January showed an increase of 0.9 per cent over January, 1949.

A factor which contributes to the high level of cheque transactions is labour income. The standing in this line, aside from September when the conditions of the preceding year were exceptional, showed a considerable margin over the corresfonding months of 1948.

The value of sales in retail stores at $\$ 791$ million, showed an increase of 2.7 per cent over December 1948. The gain in department stores sales over the same month was 4.5 per cent. Wholesale sales exceeded the dollar volume of December 1948 by 1 per cent.

The money supply at the end of December of $\$ 4.4$ billion was 2 per cent greater than one year ago. The standing in each month of 1949 was consistently greater than the corresponding months of 1948.
